FART TWO - Harrative Summary

- 1. General. (C) Marine Wing Support Group 17 continued to provide services and support for 1st MAW units in accordance with the missions and tasks assigned in the Proposed 8710/8715 T.O.'s. A study was conducted during this reporting period to determine the applicability of these proposed T.O.'s in the accomplishment of fiscal 67 in-country requirements. The results of this study were not submitted during this period and will be noted in the Command Theoretical Study submitted for December 1965.
- 2. <u>Personnel</u>. (C) WERS-17 remained in a C-2 status throughout the period. H&MS-17 was in a C-3 status during this period primarily as a result of a shortage of helicopter maintenance and flight crew personnel.
- 3. Administration. (U) Routine administration prevailed during this period
- 4. Awards. (U) There were no awards delivered to present members of this Command; however, the following awards fere forwarded to the individuals present unit:

- 5. Casualtics. (U) There were no hostile casualties during this period, however, there were eighteen reported injuries sustained by members of this command, the majority of which were lacerations. Two men were evacuated out of country, one for N.F. Evaluation and the other with a back sprain.
- orphanages and churches in the Danang and Xuan Hoa area. A MEDCAP was established at Xuan headquarters and school and 65 medical and 1 dental cases were treated. Four hogs and 1 bull were contributed and delivered to the WE Orphanage along with 75 gallons of messhall food waste for animal consumption one load of scrap lumber was delivered to the Xuan Hoa School.
- 7. Noralo/Welfare Programs. (U) No liberty was authorized in the Danang area, however, swimming, water sport, and related recreational services were available at China Beach for periods up to 72 hours duration. An outdoor movie was established for the enlisted personnel, and an indoor movie was established in officers country. Fersonnel were sent on R&R as follows:

- 8. Information Services. (U) A total of 125 Fleet Home Town News Releases were submitted during this period.
- 9. Intelligence. (U) S-2 completed the following:

- 10. Air Operations. (C) HMMS-17 entered this reporting period with the following aircraft: two (2) US-2B aircraft, one (1) UC-45J aircraft, six (6) H-34 helicopters and the three (3) C-117D type aircraft. On 29 Novombor 1956, one H-34 was transferred to FAR. On 11 November the UC-45J aircraft suffered Bravo damage on a flight from Damang to Chu Lai, RVN. This was a landing accident at Chu Lai, not the result of enemy action. No injuries wer incurred. The pilots of the aircraft were attached to MASS-2 at the time of the accident. During this period, HKMS-17 carried 2,323 passengers, 120,165 pounds of cargo, baggage and mail for a total of 271.0 flight hours in suppor III MAF. In addition, eight night flare missions (24.7) hours and three his relay missions (29.8 hours) were flown in support of friendly ground

These flights were flown primarily at night under adverse weather conditions and in areas where hostile fire was a possibility. On 10 November, C-117 Bullo 12435 received one round of small arms fire while on a logistics flight The elevator cable was severed. The aircraft continued to fly but was ACCP for a period of two weeks.

- 11. Ground Defense. (C) MSC-17 was assigned a portion of the perimeter defense system for the Danang Airfield Complex in addition to routine intermsecurity. To support this effort the following was accomplished:
 - 4 Defense Bunkers Constructed
 - 1 Dofense Bunker Rebuilt
 - 59 Individual Protective Bunkers Built
 Illumination lighting was installed on the perimeter.

Barbod wire (Concertina) was installed or replaced where required for perimeter defense as well as for internal security. Two Ground Alext Candition II's were simulated. Approximately 100 rounds of small arms fire were directed into the NMSG-17 area by enemy forces during this period. No injuries were sustained.

- 12. Training. (U) In support of ground defense and flight crew requirement safety lectures and familiarization firing of the MBA1, submachine guns caliber .45, N-60 machine gun and appropriate individual weapons were conducted in the following schools:
 - a. Vietnamese Language
 - b. Transistor Fundamental
 - c. Embarkation
 - d. MCO Leadership
 - e. Fixed Flant Teletype

Routine GMST training was conducted at the squadron level and all incoming personnel were given Informational and Orientation Lectures with particular reference to in-country security, safety, personal conduct, missions and civic affairs requirements. MBC training was conducted on group and squadron level.

13. Supply. (U) Routine Wing/Group supply functions were performed during this period. Materials arriving from Japan were inventoried and warehoused.

14. Engineering/Maintenance. (U) WERS-17 4th echelon repair facility recei 332 items for repair and completed 361, of which 32 were beyond economical repair. Supply support continued to exceed the capability to process the repair items. A request was submitted to the Commanding General for suffic additional personnel to allow for a full two shift operation. At the close of the period, there were 330 open jobs on hand. Of these 5.15% were in process of completion, 12.12% were awaiting space, 16.06% were awaiting sol manpower, and 66.66% were awaiting parts.

WERS-17 TAFUS Section continued the operation of two sites, Kne Sanh and the Marine Air Terminal at Danang. The system at the Marine Air Terminal, Danang issued 865,812 gallons of JP-4 and 51,250 gallons of Av/Gas. The assigned refueler trucks operated a total of 1,400 miles. The operating personnel were placed on a rotating basis staying two weeks at the Kne Sanh si and then returning.

WERS-17 Engineering Equipment Section continued to provide maximum supp within its capability. Electric power was furnished to the Air Terminal ar VMGR-152, TAFDS site and the MWSG-17 camp. The generator operated 3,621 hours during the period and an in-commission rate of 52% was maintained. T heavy equipment operated 1,739 hours and maintained and in-commission rate 56%.

- 15. Base Development/Military Construction. (U) The following projects were completed or started during this period:
- a. Completed robabilitation of 18 officers quarters, with head and shower facilities.
- b. Completed construction of 24 SNCO quarters, with head and shower facilities.
- c. In process of rehabilitating 104 enlisted quarters, which will include head and shower facilities.
 - d. Started rehabilitating of building to house IMSG-17 postal branch.
 - c. Began construction of Marino Air Terminal and aircraft parking apr
 - f. Laid form for the deck of the future Officers Club.
- 16. Communications/Electronics. (U) In addition to routine functions, rained telephone communications were installed from the Group CP to the defense perimeter positions and to the Air Base Defense Battalion CP as well as to the using units of the Group Flight Support Area and Air Fassenger Terminal areas

1. Movements of Units

- a. (U) On 19 November 1956, H&MS-17 Sub Unit#1 located at MCAS Iwakuni, Japan was disestablished with personnel and equipment being moved by air and nurface as appropriate to Danang, RVN. On 20 November 1956, H&MS-17 Detachent was established at MCAS Iwakuni, Japan for the purpose of maintaining the Full Pressure Suit Facility and maintenance of Wing non-mission material held at MCAS Iwakuni, Japan.
- b. (C) On 13 November 1966, LST TOM GREEN arrived at Danang from Iwakun Japan carrying 420 short tons of general cargo and vehicles. On 14 November 1966, a Marine C-130 belonging to VMCR-152 arrived from Iwakuni, Japan with the remaining officers and men. The air lift included 4,175 pounds of general cargo and baggage. These completed the movement of the Support Group to RVN.
