4. (U) Important Visitors

On 26 April 1967 MajGen R. E. CUSHAN attended a briefing at MSG-17 Briefing Room, toured MMS-17 Flight Line, WERS-17 4th Echelon Shops and "ICE CURE" installation.

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PART TWO - Narrative Summary

- (U) 1-30 April 1967 Marine Wing Support Group 17 continued to perform its assigned missions in support of the First Marine Aircraft Wing.
- (U) Each Saturday, during the reporting period, a REDCAF was held in AP BO: each Monday and Thursday a REDCAP was held in the HOA VANG District Health Center.
- (U) MCB-58 struck water at MWSG-17 well site. This well is prodicing over 14,000 gallons of water daily.
- (U) On 2 April 1967, 25 children of the Christian Missionary Alliance were transported to the MMSC-17 Camp, hosted for breakfast and "Adopted" by our Marines for the meal, church services and a tour.
- (U) 8 April 1967, fill was delivered to the Christian Missionary Alliance to aid a construction project and a gift of 8 cases of soda was made. Surplus clothes and scrap lumber was delivered to the HOA PHAT Buddhist Orphanage and school. 9000 roof and floor tiles were packaged for shipment to the CHU LAI Buddhist Orphanage.
- (U) Site preparations were begun for the construction of a school in AP BO on 10 April 1967.
- (U) A survey to locate wells in AP BO was completed and plans made to accomplish construction and secure materials. Funds for procurement of well casings were subsequently obtained from the latMAV Civil Affairs Officers.
- (U) Throughout the reporting period, care consisting of visits, transportation of parents, gifts of necessary sundaries and patient transportation was provided to Niguyen Tuan, a hamlet boy undergoing treatment to correct a club foot. A hamlet boy with a cleft palate was discovered and plans were made for corrective treatment.
- (U) The residents of AP BO labored at headwall construction for the last bridge in AF BO. All available stone was used and completion of the project avaits delivery of additional stone and fill.
- (U) Orphans from the WEC Orphanage were hosted for breakfast and "Adopted" by Marines for religious services and a camp town.

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MART THREE _ Significant Events

- 1. Personnel. (C) HHS-17 and WERS-17 maintained a C-1 status throughout the period.
- 2. Awards. (U) Ten men were awarded Air Medals, first award, and thirty four gold stars awarded in lieu of Air Medals.
- 3. Civic Action. (U) PEDCAR continued as the leading producer in Civic Action with a total of 2,631 Vietnamese treated in the reporting period.

 The major construction project undertaken to provide vehicle access

from east to west through the Hamlet has been 90% completed. A construction project to build a school and playgound has been planned, and the site secured and prepared. Well construction has been planned, approved and financed.

A Chaplain's Civic Action Program featuring effort in conjunction with established religious institutions, materials distribution, and a weekly tour and civic assistance effort through the Hamlet has been established.

- 4. Morale/Melfare Programs. (U) 12 personnel were authorized 30 days Special Leave to CONUS and 77 personnel participated in the REN Program. Lainting of the Chapel has been completed and kneelers have been installed.
- 5. Intelligence. (U) S-2 completed the following:

- 6. Air Operations. (C) The 2 C-117's, 2 US-2B's and 6 UH-34D's flew a total of 665 hours during April 1967 transporting 2319 passengers and 23 tons of cargo and mail. 1521 Flares were expended during 19 Flare Missions. Total pilot hours: 1055; night hours 143; instrument hours, 67. Aircraft availability was: 80.3% C-117D, 56.6% US-2B and 71.6% UH-34D.
- 7. Training. (U) 5 personnel attended the following schools:

Vietnamese Language
NGO Leadership
Communications, Field Wire

Hospital Corpsman received five hours of training in Peripheral and

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Autonomic Nervous Systems, O.R. and Minor Surgery, CMS Depressants and Stimulents, and Property Accounting.

The Security Section received twenty hours of training. Three unannounced alert drills were called, requiring the security force to man defensive positions. These drills were satisfactory.

Group Supply conducted 14 hours of formal supply training and instituted formally supervised NCI and extention courses for all hands.

- 6. Maintenance. (U) The 4th Echelon Repair Facility received 530 items for repair and completed 541, of which 59 were beyond economical repair. At the close of the period there were 275 open job orders on hand. Of these 5.48% were in the process of completion, 8.68% awaiting manpower and 85.2% awaiting parts.
- 9. Engineering. (U) The engineering section continued to provide maximum support within its capability. The nine generators assigned operated 3450 hours. The assigned heavy equipment operated 1275 hours.
- 10. Logistics. (C) The TAFDS Section continued operating the Marine Air Terminal site at Danang and the Khe Sanh site. The Marine Air Terminal system delivered 936,913 gallons of JP-4 and Av/Gas. The Khe Sanh system delivered 53,910 gallons of JP-4 and Av/Gas. Seven men, with equipment, were sent TAP to MAG-15 to establish and operate a TAFDS site in support of operation Shawnee. Refueler trucks operated a total of 639 miles.
- 11. Motor Transport. (U) The Motor Transport prime movers and trailers traveled 65,389 miles during April, transporting 2,596 tons of general cargo and 20 tons of Class VA.
- 12. Base Development/Military Construction. (U) The following projects were accomplished:

Construction began on two Butler Buildings adjacent to the 4th Echelon Naintenance Facility for use as Marine Corps Property Warehouse and Post Exchange Varehouse. Completed installation of 2000 feet of #2 wire in rewaring the Officers billeting area resulting in more effective use of electricity and correcting a future safety hazard due to the deterioration of insulation.

Began construction on the SATS Storage Facility.

Remarked Site plan approval for the construction of a basketball and volleyball court.

Public Works started work rehabilitating the NWSG-17 Communications Building.

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Completed construction and electrical wiring of the "ICE CUBE" complex.

- 13. Data Frocessing. (U) Data Processing continued normal operations during this period.
- 14. Postal. (U) The Postal Section issued 20,667 money orders in the amount of 12,006,113.35. Stamp sales totaled \$31,263.00 during this period. A total of 182 tons of mail was received and 79 tons dispatched.
- 15. Explosive Ordnance Disposal. This section responded to 1/2 requests for EOD assistance. Fifty—two of these calls required actual EOD assistance, the remainder required only checking or supervisory action, as the ordnance was found to be safe or explosively inert. The section held nine classes for various units attached to or in support of the 1stHAW. Hembers of the EOD section performed rendering safe procedures on E4 ordnance items during this period.

Salvage scrap for the month was 7000 pounds.

Wing Supply inspection was held on 17-21 April 1967.

The Non-Mission Material and Full Pressure Suit Facility at MAS Imakini, Japan was inspected and inventoried by Lt. STITCHER. A problem exists here in that the Groups do not inform Supply of arriving and departing pilots who have suits stored for them. The Material is generally in good condition. Is thaw G-4 is working on this problem.

Wing Shipping and Receiving moved 2,009,157 pounds incoming and 2,793,703 pounds cutgoing material. Air cargo has less than 24 hours on lot time and sea cargo has decreased on lot time from 21 days to 14 days.

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Supply Response Section

Status for all outstanding documents which includes His-17, WERS-17 and Section "N", 3rd and 4th Echelons, were mechanized and listings are made twice a month to reconcile these outstanding documents with the section concerned.

Due to the increased volume for support of "ICE CUBE" and to provide better supply support a Requisition Expeditor was established for "ICE CUBE".

Hanual stock record cards for the RCA Section "N", 3rd and 4th Echelon Fool were established for more effective control of these components in Supply Officers Stores.

Salvageable parts from EMR Components are (second-hand stores) maintained by the Section "N" 4th Echelon for use by the Motor Transport Maintenance Section. Records of these items are also kept for control purposes.

Figcal and SAS

FAAOPac/FIFPac Fiscal and SAS inspection was held on 29-30 April 1867. The results were satisfactory.

Tarabagusa, Third and Fourth Echelon Float

The mission of the warehouse increased with the support of Project "ICE CURE". A storage area was constructed in the warehouse to allow for a dust free, low humidity, security area to accomodate call bration components awaiting parts and eventually to house a rotable pool of such items. Arrangements were made to integrate and support Project "ICE CURE" into the supply system using the 3M System, including a "Hot Line" connecting "ICE CURE", the warehouse and the Requisitioning Expeditor Unit.

The warehousing complex is fully marked for safety and movement.

As of 21 April 1967, common components are sent to FIC for repair as per FICO 4700.2.
