PART TWO \_ Narrative Summary

- (U) 1-30 June 1967, Marine Wing Support Group 17 continued to perform its assigned missions in support of the First Marine Aircraft Wing.
- (U) A total of 13 MEDCAPs were held, treating 1087 Vietnamese, at HOA VANG, PHU LOC and AP BO TAY.
- (U) In June the Chaplain sponsored and directed Civic Action, reached the proportions of a significant part of the total Group effort. The term "CHAPCAP" has been originated in recognition of the merit and magnitude of this program.
- (U) On 1 June 1967, Group Supply created a typewriter repair unit. 22 machines were repaired during June for a considerable saving in time out of service time.
- (U) On 2 June 1967, a Viet Little League" baseball project was initiated. Four games of demonstrations were accomplished during this month.
- (U) Ten deliveries of food, materials and assistance were made to the Civic Action village, Catholic School, WEC Orpanage, ARVN Hospital, and Sacred Heart Hospital by the CHAPCAP program.
- (U) On 7 June 1967, a breezeway between the Commanding Officer and S-1 offices was completed.
- (U) On 9 June 1967. Task Force Alpha mustered on order of CG, 1stMAW.
- (U) On 12 June 1967, a new line shack was completed.
- (U) Two signs were erected on 13 June 1967 by C.O., H&MS\_17, C.O., WERS\_17, Lt. MIINE, Hamlet Chief and SSgt LUNTZ. Stating that MWSG\_17 and the Viets are working together to defeat the V.C.
- (U) On 18 June 1967, ACPU building for the messhall was completed except for the concrete deck.
- (U) On 25 June 1967, ACPU building for H&MS\_17 Material was completed except for the concrete deck.
- (U) A demonstration on how to fight in flight flare fires was given on 30 June 1967 by the Group Fire Department.

PART THREE - Significant Events

- 1. Personnel. (C) H&MS\_17 maintained a C\_1 status during the period. WERS\_17 maintained a C\_1 status.
- 2. Awards. (U) One DFC, 2rd Award, 3 Bronze Stars, one Navy Commendation with Combat "V", one Navy Unit Commendation, 8 Air Medals first award, thirty nine Gold Stars in lieu of Air Medals were awarded.
- 3. <u>Ciric Action</u>. (U) MEDCAP continued as a leading producer in the Civic Action program. A total of 1087 Vietnamese were treated. The Hardship Search Project and associated helping projects have produced visible results beneficial to the Civic Action Program.

The CHAPCAP effort rivaled the MEDCAP for the lead in overall Civic Action. English classes, Personnel contact/assistance, Viet Little League, guided Youth activities, and material assistance by CHAPCAP has been substantial and took place every day of the period.

- 4. Morale and Welfare Programs. (U) 8 personnel were authorized 30 days Special Leave to CONUS and 77 personnel participated in the R&R Program. The Chaplain delivered 21 Moral Guidance lectures to 1032 personnel.

6. Air Operations. (C) HARS Seventien's hircraft if lew a total of 561 hours during June 1967, transporting 1087 passengers and 25,765 pounds of Cargo and mail. 130 flares were expended during 15 flare missions. Total pilot hours: 967; night hours 95; instrument hours, 77. Aircraft availability was: C-117D 63.4%, US-2B 62.9% and UH-34D 75.8%.

- 8. Maintenance. (U) The 4th Echelon Repair Facility received 467 items for repair and completed 510 of which 118 were beyond economical repair. At the close of the period there were 250 open jobs orders on hand. Of these 6.72% were in process of completion, 14.9% awaiting manpower and 77.7 awaiting parts.
- 9. Engineering. (U) The engineering section continued to provide maximum support within its capability. Electric power was furnished to the Air Terminal area, VMGR-152, the TAFDS site and the MWSG-17 cantonment area. The generators assigned operated a total of 2853 hours. The assigned heavy equipment operated 1707 hours.
- 10. Logistics. (C) The TAFDS Section continued the operation of two sites, Khe Sanh and the Danang Marine Air Freight Terminal. The Khe Sanh system issued 95,747 gallons of JP-4 and 45,148 gallons of AV/gas. The system at the Marine Air Freight Terminal issued 1,135,785 gallons of JP-4 and 54,153 gallons of AV/gas. The TAFDS site at An Hoa was turned over to MAG-16 on 22 June 1967. During the period 1-22 June 1967, the site issed 40,768 gallons of JP-4 and 26,272 gallons of AV/gas. Total fuel dispensed was 1,397,873 gallons.
- 11. Motor Transport. The Motor Transport Section operated the assigned 132 prime movers a total of 70,698 miles. A total of 5,207 tons of general cargo was transported during the month.

12. Base Delvelopment/Military Construction. (U) The following projects were completed:

Breezeway between S-1 and C.O's office.

New Line Shack.

ACPU Building for Messhall except for concret deck.

ACPU Building for H&MS\_17 Material except for concrete deck.

- 13. <u>Data Processing</u>. (U) Data Processing continued normal operations during this period.
- 14. Postal. (U) The Postal Section issued 27,024 money orders in the amount of \$1,039,762.30. Stamps sales totaled \$38,658.25 during the reporting period. A total of 335,553 pounds of mail received and 127, 385 pounds of mail dispatched.
- 15. Explosive Ordnance Disposal. (U) This section responded to 157 requests for EOD assistance. 75 responses required actual EOD assistance, the remainder required inspection of suspected hazardous items or supervisory action as ordnance was found to be safe or explosively inert.
