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PART TWO - Narrative Summary

(U) 1-31 August 1967, Marine Wing Support 17 continued to perform its assigned missions in support of the First Marine Aircraft Wing.

(U) 5 August 1967 - 2245 an Air Force F4C crashed into the fuel ditch on the East taxiway. The MWSG-17 Fire Department took over the runway standby, freeing the Air Force Fire Department to fight the fire. At 0005 the fire reignited spreading into the O-1/O-2 parking area. MWSG-17 EOD responded, moving aircraft out of the danger area, policing up WP rockets and flares. Simultaneously the MWSG-17 Fire Department combined forces with the Navy and Air Force Fire Departments to secure the blaze. The operation concluded at 0330.

(U) 6 August 1967 - The Air Force called the MWSG-17 Fire Department for assistance in fighting the reignited fire in the fuel ditch.

(U) 8 August 1967 - Group Communications tied the Aviation Maintenance alert phone system into the Flying Disc switchboard enabling the 13 alert phones to call the switchboard.

(U) 11 August 1967 - At 0800 the MWSG-17 Fire Department and EOD responded to a crash by Gate 16. While the Fire Department fought the fire and searched for survivors, EOD swept the area, cleaning up unexploded BLU-3/B bomblets and sparrow missiles, that were hampering the fire fighters efforts by detonating among the fires.

(U) 29 August 1967 - 33 Enlisted and 1 Officer from MWSG-17 proceeded to Dong Ha to assist in reconstruction and aircraft repairs which resulted from heavy enemy attacks.

(U) MWSG-17 Civic Action Team selected 5 students for General WALT Scholarship nominations.

(U) During August Marine Wing Support Group 17 maintained an increased, (above normal), state of defense readiness to counter ~~pre-election~~ VC action. This did not necessitate going to higher Defense Alert Condition, as it was handled smoothly by the Group Security Forces under the Commanding Officers direction.

(U) 30 August 1967 - The shotgun rider for the Vietnamese workers was hit in the head, by an unknown assailant, in "Dog Patch".

3. Civic Action. Under the CHAPCAP program 135 hours of English were taught, and almost 500 man hours of work done. 257 men were able to participate in Civic Action through CHAPCAP.

MEDCAPS went out four times for a total of 311 Vietnamese treated.

The various Civic Action teams distributed considerable amounts of building materials and Health and Comfort items in the areas they worked.

4. Morale and Welfare Programs. (U) 13 personnel were authorized 30 days special leave to CONUS and 75 persons participated in the R&R program. The Chaplain delivered 4 Moral Guidance lectures to 87 personnel, counseled 69 men with personal problems and gave 4 indoctrination lectures for 115 men.

 - c. 10½ hours of English conversation at the Police Station.
 - d. 43 children from the civic action village were taken to the beach for swimming and bathing.
 - e. 30 members of the Protestant Chapel Group took 119 Vietnamese children on a picnic and swim at China Beach.
 - f. 20 men performed 55 hours of work at the US AID Hospital.
 - g. 7 men worked 20 hours at the Catholic School.
 - h. In total about 257 men took part in some form of the Chaplains Civic Action Program, where almost 500 man hours was contributed by them.
3. The Civic Action Team recorded the following:
 - a. On 3 August, wood was delivered to the Hamlet Chief for his office. Plans were made to show movies in the Hamlet on 10 August. Met with Mr. Irish to discuss future plans and support.
 - b. On 8 August, met with Hamlet Chief to firm up movie date and distribute farm magazines to school children for their parents use.
 - c. On 10 August, the 244th Psychological Operations team showed movies to 200 people for 1½ hour.
 - d. On 17 August, sand was delivered to school site.
 - e. On 22 August, wood for school seats and benches was delivered to school site.
 - f. On 24 August, tin was delivered to hamlet for roofing repairs to school building and village homes.
 - g. 1st Marine Advisor Lt. J. H. CAO was taken on a tour of the hamlet, both schools were visited and teaching material presented.

h. On 25 August the team met with the Harlet Ch. and school teachers to discuss the General Unit Scholarship. On the 31st of August the names of 5 students were obtained and paper work is now being completed on the scholarships.

PART III

1. The school building is in use but several finishing touches need to be accomplished e.g. interior finishing of walls, painting, windows and installing screens.
2. Plans to present the scholarships are being formulated.
3. Material is being gathered to go ahead with the widening of the bridges.
4. The slow down in the activity was partly due to school recess (in the case of language conversation) partly and due to the election preparations.
