3. Civic Action. (U)

a. Two MEDCAPS were conducted at Ap Bo Tay during which 150 people were treated for various complaints. The Medical Team is giving a bar of soap to each patient and, through the interpreter with the team, stressing cleanliness. The doctor reports improvement in many cases of skin ailments.

b. 122 hours of English was taught at; the Baptist Mission, the Danang Police Station, the ARVN Hospital, the Danang Catholic School, and the Ap Bo Tay Hamlet School.

c. 30 hours of work was performed in support of Civic Action projects.

d. Six deliveries of material, machinery, and clothing were made under the Civic Action Programs during October.

e. An observation worthy of comment is the security consciousness of the Hamlet Chief. Any time people of the Hamlet may congregate (such as MED CAP or movies), the Chief and his men move thru the crowd, scanning faces for strangers. He also furnishes information for the Group Security Section that accompanies our MEDCAPS etc.

4. Morale and Welfare Programs. (U) 8 personnel were authorized 30 days special leave to CONUS and 70 persons participated in the R&R program. The Chaplain delivered 7 Moral Guidance lectures to 147 personnel, counseled 72 men with personal problems and gave 3 indoctrination lectures for 102 men.

7. Data Processing. (U) Computer meter readings indicate a usage of 233 hours for the month of October. Two 029 Card Punches were subcustodied to operational MAGs and three new 029 Card Punches were installed. The Card Punch Room was rewired to provide additional electrical outlets and decrease the load on the electrical lines.

A systems study is being conducted for the G-2 Section. This study will result in reprogramming of certain jobs now being processed for that section.

Liaison has been established with the 5th Marine Regiment concerning processing of intelligence data.

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Liaison has also been established with DFI #41 at MCAS, Iwakuni regarding the method of transferring squadron 3M data.

A procedure for updating 1st LAAM Battalion NORS requirements has been established.

Aviation Maintenance Support Action (AMSE) programming has been completed and processing will begin during November for MAG-11.

8. Postal. (U) During the month of October, Money Order Business in the amount of \$1,141,091.33 was conducted with 20,498 Money Orders being issued. Stamp sales totaled \$39,991.50 for this same period. There was a total of 389,500 pounds of Mail received for 1st Marine Aircraft Wing elements and 175,584 pounds dispatched.



PART II

1. Two MEDCAPS were conducted at Ap Bo (coords BTO23750) during which 150 people were treated for various complaints. The Medical Team is giving a bar of soap to each patient and, through the interpreter with the team stressing cleanliness. The doctor reports improvement in many cases of skin ailments.

2. The CHAPCAP featured the following:

- a. 57 hours of English conversation instruction at the Baptist Mission, (BTO30777).
- b. 24 hours of English conversation instruction at the Danang Police Station, (BTO34794).
- c. 24 hours of English conversation instruction at ARVN hospital, (BTO18767).

b. 5 October 1967, delivered School supplies to Hamlet School. Supplies were a gift of the Huffman Wolfe Company, Columbus, Ohio. A III MAF certificate of appreciation has been sent to this company.

c. Visited school where Scholar ship children attend.

d. Rice thrashing machine given to Hamlet.

e. Distributed 20 pounds of childrens clothing in Hamlet.

f. Delivered materials for porch on school building.

g. Obtained and delivered pipe to be used as culvert material for Hamlet roads. Severe erosion problems are present, and will be a continuing problem during the monsoons.

h. Weekly visits are made to the Hamlet in order to informally discuss problems with the chief.

i. Movies were shown to the Hamlet by the 244th Physical Operations Warfare Team. These movies are a great success as they provide both entertainment and instruction.

j. English language instruction began for students at Hamlet school. Students range from 4 to 14 years of age. 7 hours accomplished in October. Goal is 3 one hour periods a week.

PART III

An observation worthy of comment is the security consciousness of the Hamlet Chief. Any time people of the Hamlet may congregate (such as Med Cap or movies) I have noted the Chief and his men moving thru the crowd, scanning faces for strangers. He also furnishes information for the Group Security Section that accompanies our Med Caps etc.
