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PART TWO - Narrative Summary

3 January 1968 (U) 0358 Danang Airbase under rocket attack. MWSG-17 EOD and Fire Department assisted in de-arming and fire fighting of the burning aircraft. EOD has been recommended for a award for this action.

8 January 1968 (U) MWSG-17 Fire Department responded to fire in MAG-11 messhall, caused by the explosion of a mess hall burner.

22 January 1968 (U) WERS-17 Commanding Officer received a Letter of Appreciation from CMC, and the Minute Man Flag from the Department of the Navy for Savings Bond Sales. LtCol. D. B. SMIGAY was awarded the Joint Services Commendation Award for his work at his last duty station. Assistant Wing Commander, First Marine Aircraft Wing made the presentations. USAF Airman's Medal to SSgt. W.D. PENN and Sgt. J.R. BECK.

23 January 1968 (U) MWSG-17 Fire Department put out a major fuel fire caused by fuel spill and sparks from a Crawler Crane. EOD swept a Carnival area in Danang prior to Lt General Cushman's visit.

25 January 1968 (U) EOD swept selected areas in Danang prior to visit of Lt General Cushman and the President of Vietnam.

27-28 January 1968 (U) EOD assisted in recovery of HMM-265 H-46.

28 January 1968 (U) The logistical and property support for the 11th Dental Company was transferred to MWHG-1.

30 January 1968 (U) 0325, Airbase under rocket attack, MWSG-17 Fire Department assisted in fire fighting in the MAG-11 line area and in the POL area. EOD assisted in clearing flares and M79 Grenades scattered around the area, from a fire next to the MWSG-17 parking apron in the Air Force ammunition storage area.

30 January 1968 (U) 1100 EOD helolifted to Alpha Battery LAAM Bn to dispose of explosives left by a V.C. attack.

30-31 January 1968 (U) EOD answered over thirty calls for assistance from Marble Mountain and Danang, as more rockets and mortars were received.

7. Data Processing

a. (U) Computer meter readings indicate a usage of 270 hours for the month of January.

b. Two more Card Punch Machines were installed. Four machines were decentralized during the month: two card punch machines to Wing Supply Office, one to MAG-11 and one Verifier to MWSG-17. Additionally, one 029 Card Punch Machine was installed at MWSG-17 replacing an earlier model 026 Card Punch.

c. First Wing Personnel reports were run during the month. Conversion of computer programs to be used with the 1401/1311 System has been accomplished.

d. This section is prepared to support the Wing CEO in meeting key punch requirements which will be necessary in order to transmit Pacific Fleet Ammunition Reports via AUTODIN.

6. Eleven 3M Computer Programs and Job Procedures, designed, written and developed at this section were furnished to the Data Processing Section at MCAS, Cherry Point. Computer programs were also furnished to Data Processing Installation 25, servicing 9th MAB and Data Processing Installation 41, located at MCAS, Iwakuni. Further, Data Processing Platoon 10, located at Phu Bai and Data Processing Section 34, Chu Lai, are processing 3M data with programs written at this section.

8. Postal. (U) During the month of January, Money Order Business in the amount of \$1,551,474.12 was conducted with 26,301 Money Orders being issued. Stamp sales totaled \$22,210.28 for this same period. There was a total of 362,276 pounds of Mail received for 1st Marine Aircraft Wing elements and 153,442 pounds dispatched.

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CONFIDENTIAL12. In Country Calibration Complex (IC³)

a. During the period 1-31 January 1968 ICE CUBE processed 1392 pieces of support equipment. 29% required calibration, 47% were repaired and calibrated and 24% were carried forward/awaiting parts or passed to other laboratories out of country.

b. On 30 January enemy 122mm rockets impacted 100 meters NE of the calibration complex setting off a flare dump which threw flares into the complex area. Another rocket hit a building 100 meters SE of the complex throwing debris into the complex area. Personnel on duty prevented the flares from starting fires in the complex and the unit received only minimal damage.

14. Wing Disbursing

a. Checks issued totaled \$2,747,467.53. Military rolls came to a total of \$1,653,425.00. Public vouchers in the amount of \$54,724.35 were issued. \$126,420.00 dollars were entered into the savings program by Wing personnel. Piaster sales totaled 8,871,443 RVN for \$75,181.72 U.S. MPC to and from "Green" transitions were; Green in \$23,482.60, Green out \$512,883.15.

b. The completion of a vault at the First Marine Aircraft Wing disbursing office was a milestone in achieving complete disbursing service in Vietnam. This vault is equipped with special steel doors 13½ inches thick including interlocking cage doors. It was made to specification by the Kumahira Kinkoten Corp of Tokyo, Japan. The walls of the vault are so constructed that it can withstand any rockets currently in use by the enemy. The contractor stated that 2000 pounds of TNT would be required to blow a one (1) foot hole which is the space between the steel reinforcements in the walls. The vault is the only one of its kind among Marine Corps units in Vietnam.

1. Three MEDCAPS were conducted at Ap Ba (coords BT 023750) during which 200 people were treated for various complaints. 09 Cholera shots and 09 Smallpox shots were given. A Vietnamese bilingual nurse accompanied the Medical Officer. The doctor requested this department to arrange for movies and pamphlets on sanitation to be given to the people. This is still in the planning stage.
2. The Chapeap featured the following:
 - a. Instructed 97 adults for 76 hours and 48 children for 69 hours at the Da Nang Cultural Center (coords BT 034778) in the English Language.
 - b. Instructed 36 adults for 9 hours at the Police Station in Da Nang (coords BT 034794) in the English Language.
 - c. Donated the following: CMA mission 80 pds of clothing, 350 bars of soap, 17 cartons of food, 400 sheets of scrap tin, and \$350.00 to the scholarship fund.
 - d. \$30.00 to the Lam Thi THIEN typing course.
 - e. 1 box of toys to the pediatrics ward of the USOM Hospital.
 - f. \$62.00 to Civic Action for purchase of school supplies.
3. The Civic Action Team recorded the following major items:
 - a. Made contact with the Hamlet Chief at least twice a week.
 - b. Delivered 50 sheets of tin to five new refugee families for building new homes.
 - c. Gave \$VN 2,500 to the Hamlet Chief for the General Walt Scholarship Fund. We support five students at \$VN500 a month.
 - d. Resumed English Language classes. Taught 15 students 16 hours of Basic English.
 - e. Delivered 7 well casings and 50 pounds of cement to new well site at the school.

- f. Delivered 50 sheets of tin to the Baptist Mission in Da Nang.
- g. Delivered 25 sheets of tin to the Buddhist Monestary in Da Nang.
- h. Delivered 10 strips of lumber to the school for making benches.
- i. CAO and ACAO made 2 inspection tours of the hamlet.
- j. Distributed 300 school kits to the school.
- k. Distributed 100 pds of food and 100 pds of clothing to the people.
- l. Held a "TET" party for the children at the hamlet meeting place. Distributed 500 bags of candy, 500 bars of soap, and 1000 toys. Representing MWSQ-17 were Maj Graham, CO H&MS-17, who was representing Col Hansen, CO MWSQ-17, Maj Dinegar IRO Officer who was representing LtCol Lillie CAO, who was TAD. The following Officers and men also attended: 1stLt Milne ACAO, Lt Knight USN Chaplin for MWSQ-17, SgtMaj Simmons, H&MS-17 and Sgt Clark CANCOIG. The party was deemed a success by all concerned. Special attention is given to Cpl K. E. Calhoun and SSgt T. V. Dinh VNMC, both of whom work for IRO, but still gave considerable time and effort to the success of this project.

NARRATIVE: During the period 1-31 January the Civic Action Team worked closely with the Group Chaplin, Group Medical Officer, and Group IRO Officer, in their efforts to forward the Civic Action Program. Among these were aid to the CMA Mission, Baptist Mission, Buddhist Monestary, and various orphanages in the Da Nang area. Projects discussed with the Medical Officer were classes in mid-wifery, sanitation and the proposed giving of 2000 Cholera shots. Full assistance was given to the IRO section in their interpreting and administrative needs. In return, Maj Dinegar has given us much assistance such as supplies, vehicles, and man-power. We have formed a closely knit team working for one common goal. During the past month many Officers and men, too numerous to mention, have volunteered their services to Civic Action. Their assistance is more than welcomed. However due to increased enemy activity in Ap Boy Tay many projects have come to a halt. The Civic Action Team has ready for distribution maps, posters and paint for the school. Also 2 mid-wife kits, a new water pump and fill for the roads. As soon as a damage check can be made on the results of the enemy activity in this area then all assistance within our power will be given the war victims to aid them to re-build their homes.

This vault is equipped with special steel doors $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches thick including interlocking cage doors. It was made to specification by the Kumahira Kinkoten Corp of Tokyo, Japan. The walls of the vault is so constructed that it can withstand any rockets currently in use by the enemy. The contractor stated that 2000 pounds of TNT would be required to blow a one (1) foot hole which is the space between the steel reinforcements in the walls. The construction was done by public works and is the only one of its kind among Marine Corps units in Vietnam

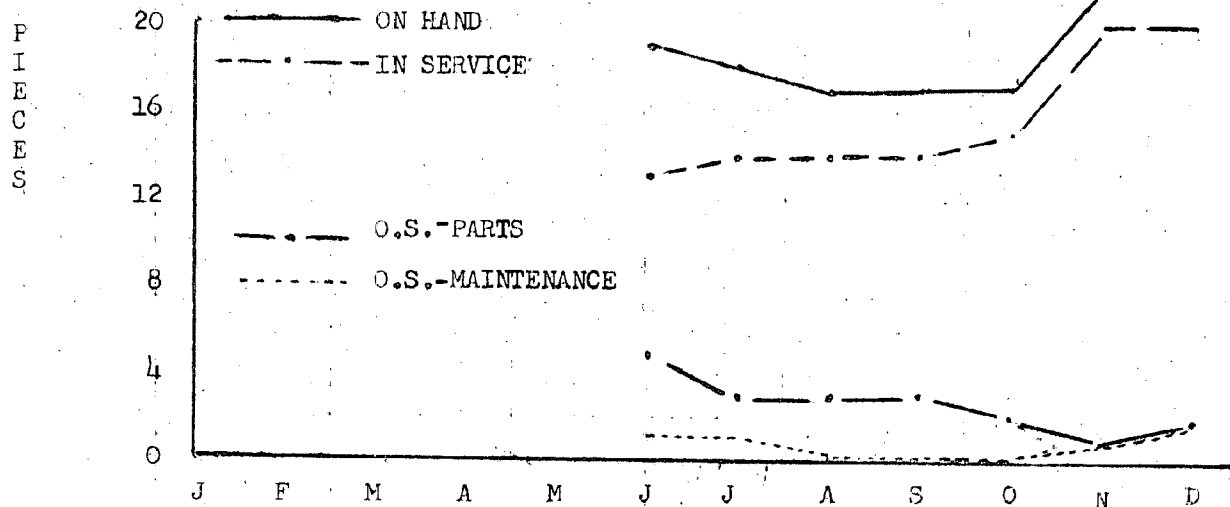
PRIMARILY ENGINEER OPERATED EQUIPMENT - HOURS

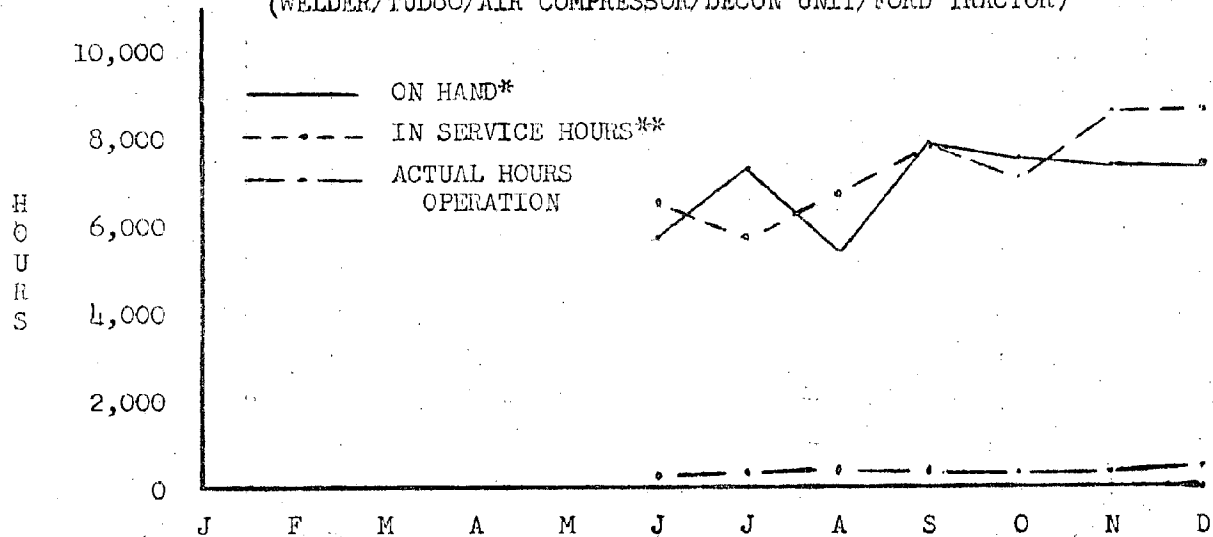
PRIMARILY ENGINEER OPERATED EQUIPMENT - AVAILABILITY

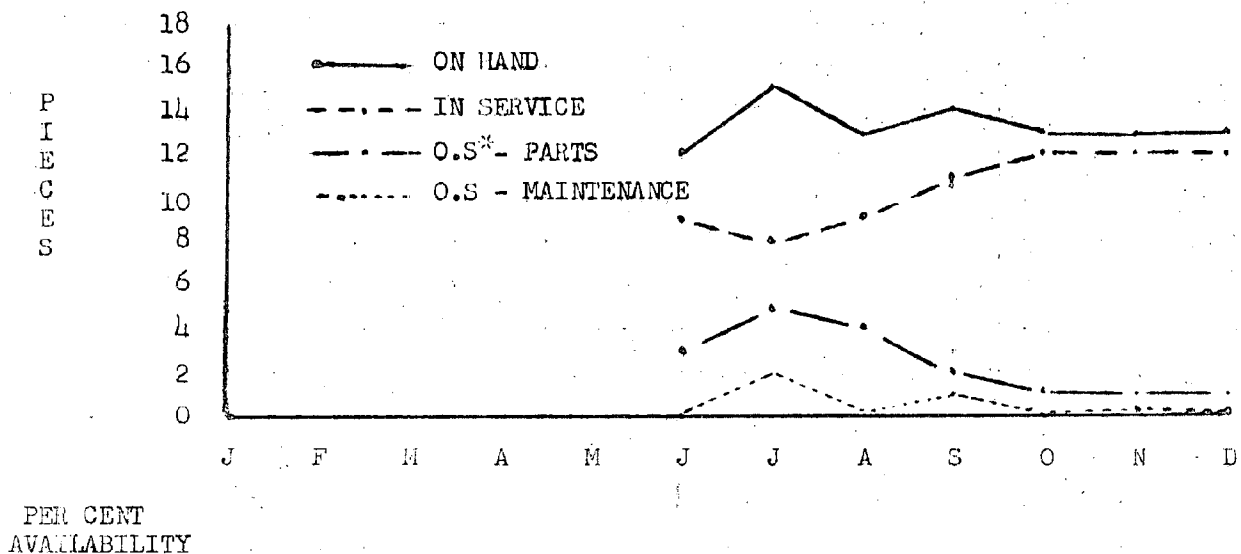

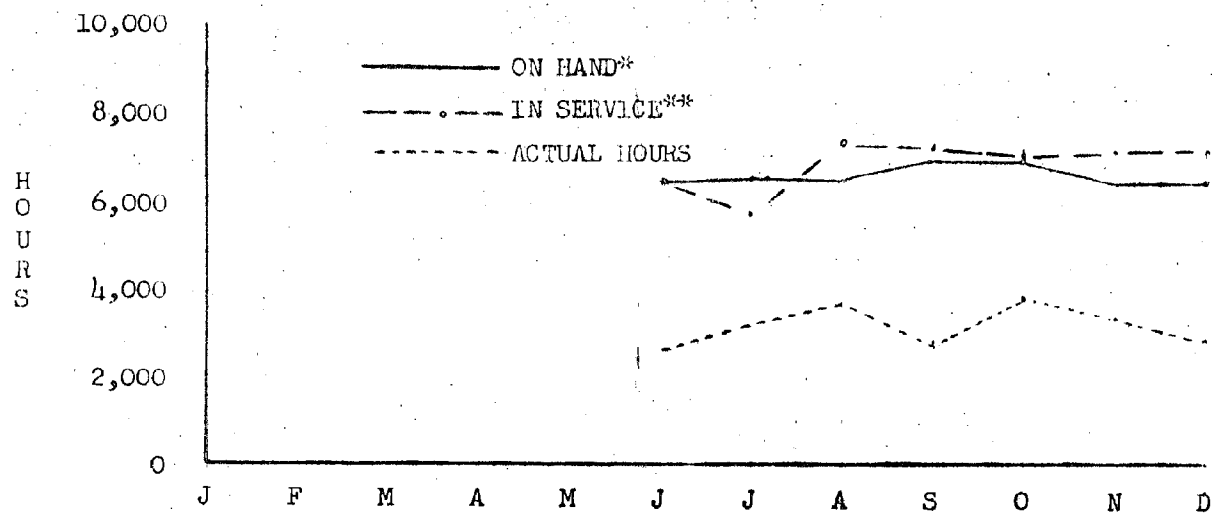
PRIMARYLY USER OPERATED EQUIPMENT AVAILABILITY

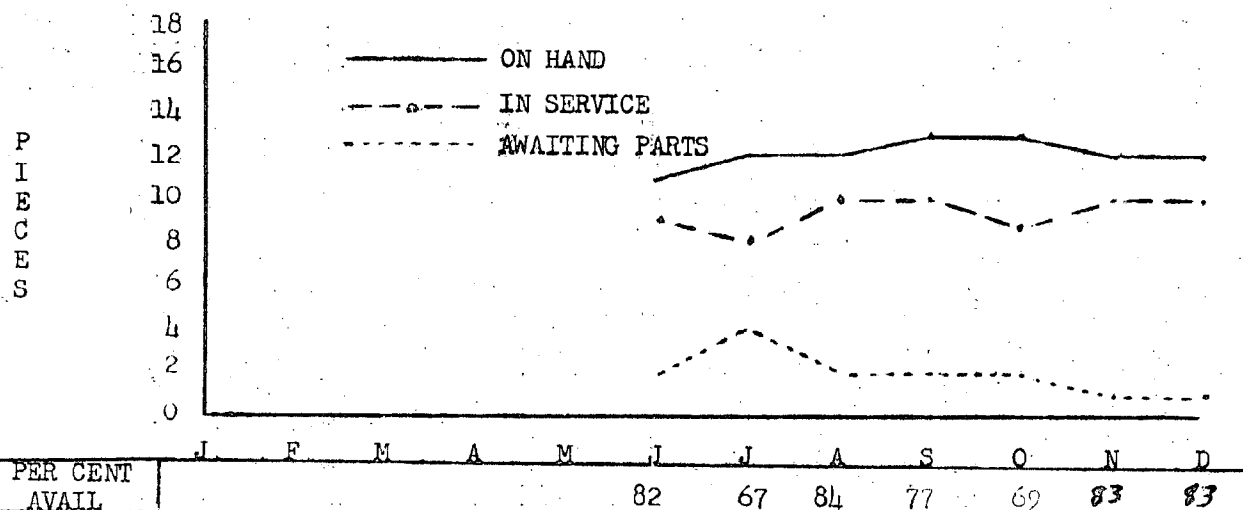
GENERATOR OPERATION

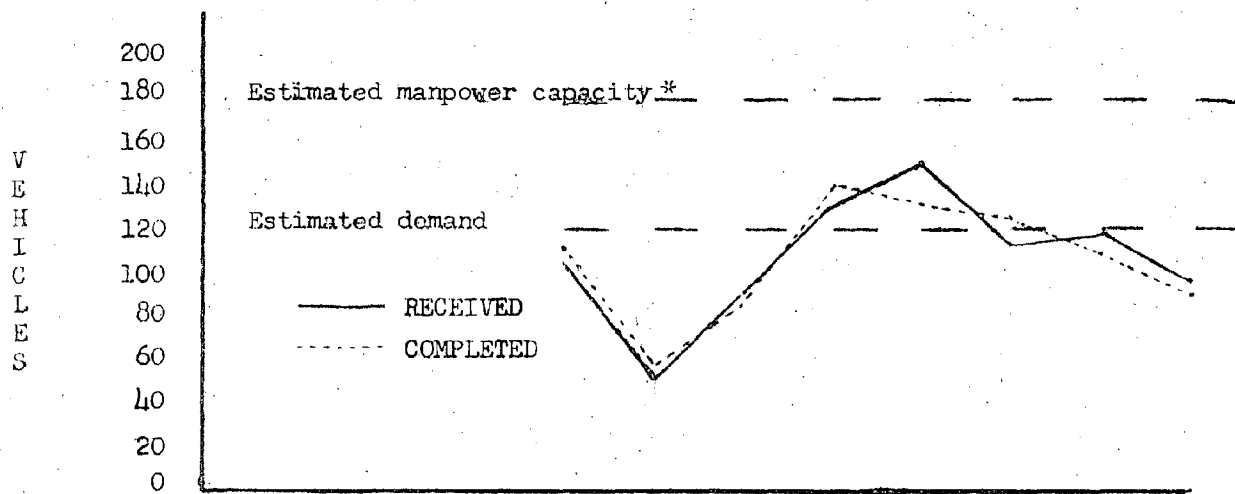


DAYS VEHICLE IN 2nd ECHELON REPAIR

OF PRIORITY 01 AND 02 ON LOT AT 0800



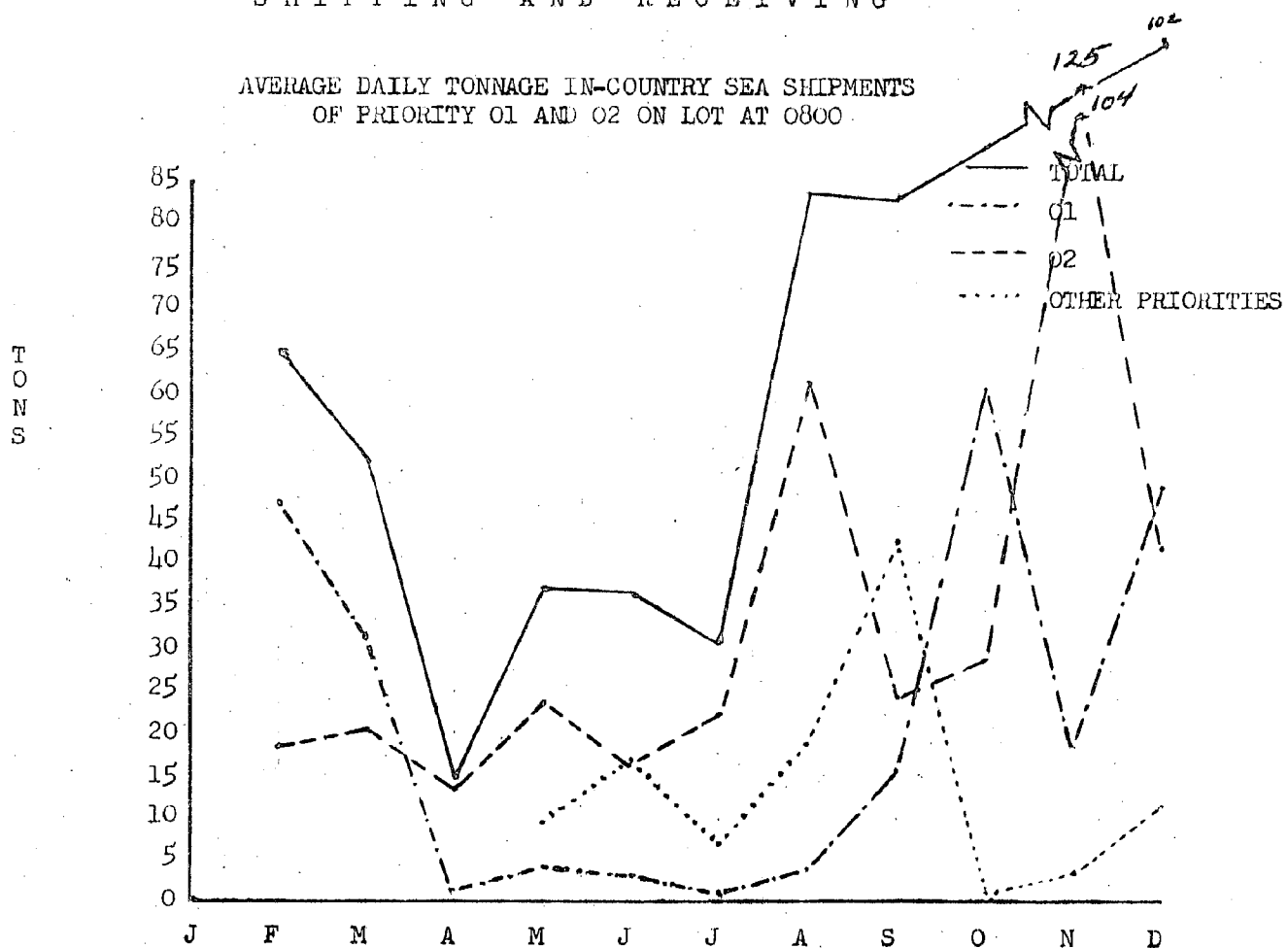
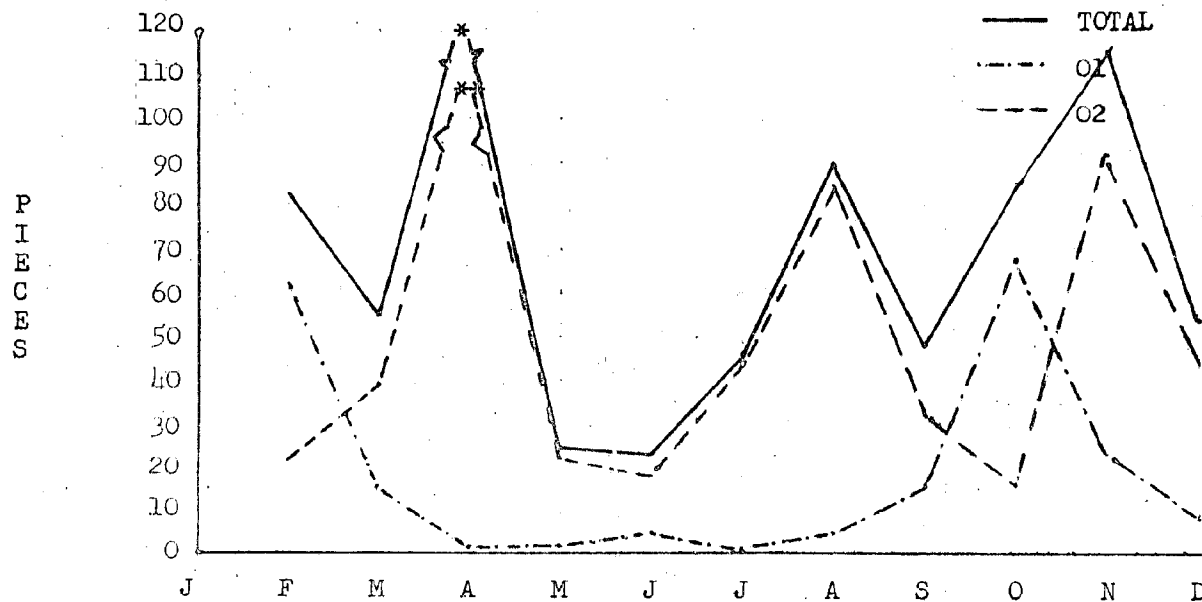
