

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. General (C) Marine Air Control Group Eighteen continued to operate air control/anti-aircraft warfare and air support facilities for the First Marine Aircraft Wing throughout the month of March. Operations for which support was provided by MACG-18 are as follows: Scotland, Lancaster II, Kentucky, Saline/Napoleon, Fortress Attack, Sumari 4, Hudson, Mingo, Ford, Jeb Stuart and Regasus. In addition, a Hawk FIREX was conducted by the 1st and 2nd LAMN Battalions from 17 March through 24 March 1968.

2. Personnel (C) MAB-2, MAB-3 and MACS-4 all joined sufficient personnel to compensate for normal rotation losses and remain in category C-1. The 1st and 2nd LAMN Battalions are categorized as C-2; while H&HS-18 is placed in category C-3.

3. Administration (U) Routine administration progressed throughout the reporting period.

4. Morale/Welfare (U) Liberty remained secured throughout the month of March in Da Nang and Hoa Phut Village, outside of Da Nang Air Base. Consequently, the majority of recreation was provided through the utilization of the facilities provided by Special Services. In addition, R&R flights were conducted to the following locations during the month of March:

5. Casualties (C) The Group experienced twenty-two casualties during the month of March: twenty-one (21) nonhostile and one (1) hostile.

6. Intelligence (U) The below listed tasks were accomplished by the S-2 Section during the month of March:

7. Air Operations (C) Throughout the reporting period MASS-2 provided air support control for the Dong Ha and Phu Bai areas, while MASS-3 provided air support control for the Khe Sanh, Da Kang and Chu Lai areas. MACS-4 furnished air control facilities for all of the above mentioned areas. In addition, to the air support/control provided the 26th Marines at Khe Sanh; approximately 60 resupply missions were coordinated involving over 700 helicopter sorties and over 800 fixed wing sorties in support of First Marine Aircraft Wing's Operation Plan 3-68. On 27 March, MASS-3 fielded a detachment to augment 1st Air Cavalry Division Headquarters for Operation Pegasus. On 27 March 1968 the Chu Lai DASC was disestablished and its functions were assumed by the Americal Division. Due to the introduction of a "Single Manager" concept on 7 March 1968 which placed some of 1st MAW assets under control of the 7th Air Force, a realignment of many of the DASCs/ASMTs functions was necessary, and have been accomplished. 8. Training (U)

a. Troop Indoctrination Lectures and Individual Weapons Safety Lectures were conducted for newly joined personnel.

b. General Military Subjects training was conducted by all units of this command.

c. Technical Training, at the Squadron/Battalion level, took the form of technical instruction and on-the-job training.

9. NBC Defense (U) No significant events occurred during the month.

10. Communications/Electronics (U) The communications sections of all units of this command continued to provide the communications to support the air control/defense system for the First Marine aircraft wing operations in the Republic of South Vietnam.

11. Logistics (U)

a. Motor Transport The cargo/mileage of MAOG-18 vehicles was 6,400 short tons of cargo transported and a total mileage driven of 127,243 miles. Of the above, 3,230 miles and 102 s/t of cargo was as a result of "Rough Rider" convoy participation.

b. Embarkation (1) In-Country movements in support of combat operations

(a) 8 generators, for a total of 33,998 lbs.

(b) 38,498 lbs. of miscellaneous equipment

c. In addition to the above, the Group S-4 coordinated the relocation of the Group Staff Headquarters and MAIS-18 headquarters to its present location in Tango Sector Alpha of the Da Nang complex.
