NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. General (C) Marine Air Control Group Eighteen continued to operate air control/anti-aircraft warfare and air/support facilities for the First Marine Aircraft Wing throughout the month of April. In addition, the 1st LAAM Battalion Coder/Decoder of the AN/TSQ-57 was emplaced and began operational checks with MACS-4, Marine Tactical Data System, which continued throughout the month. Operations for which Marine Air Control Group Eighteen provided support for are as follows: Saline, Napoleon, Kentucky, Lancaster II, Scotland II, Pegasus, Rice, Sumari IV, Sumari V, Houston, Carentan II, Jeb Stuart II, Delaware/Lam Son 216, Baxter Garden, Jasper Square, Brilliant Dragon III and Baller Valley.

2. Personnel (C) MASS-2, MASS-3 and MACS-4 all joined sufficient personnel to countervail normal rotation losses and remain in a C-1 category. The 1st and 2nd LAAM Battalions were categorized as C-2; while H&HS-18 remained in category C-3.

3. Administration (U) Routine administration progressed throughout the month of April.

4. Morale/Welfare (U) Liberty remained secured throughout the month of April in Da Nang and Hoa Phut Village, outside of Da Nang Air Base; consequently, the majority of recreation was provided through the utilization of the facilities provided by Special Services. In addition, R&R flights were conducted to the following locations during the month of April:

5. Casualties (C) The command experienced eight casualties during the month of April, all of which were the result of non-hostile action.

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6. Intelligence (U) The below listed tasks were accomplished by the S-3 Section during the reporting period:

7. Air Operations (C) Throughout the reporting period MASS-2 provided air support control for the Dong Ha and Phu Bai areas, while MASS-3 provided air support control for the Khe Sanh and Da Nang areas. MACS-4 furnished air control facilities for all of the above mentioned areas. In addition, an Air Support Radar Team was emplaced at Camp Carroll and commenced operations on 30 April. The MASS-3A Air Support Radar Team at Da Nang was disestablished on 25 April and the entire system prepared for embarkation to its parent unit on Okinawa. The Airborne DASC operated radio relay facilities for "Rash Control" in support of the 1st Marine Regiment in operation Pegasus from 1 through 7 April. The monthly data tally is as follows:

8. Training (U)

a. Troop Indoctrination Lectures and Individual Weapons Safety Lectures were conducted by all units of this command.

b. General Military Subjects training was conducted by all units of this command.

c. Technical Training, at the Squadron/Battalion level, took the form of technical instruction and on-the-job training.

9. NBS Defense (U) No significant events occurred during the month of April.

10. Communications/Electronics (U) The communications sections of all units of this command continued to provide the communications to support the air control/defense system for the First Marine Aircraft Wing operations in the Republic of Vietnam.

11. Logistics (U)

a. General: There were no major logistical problems within MACG-18 during April.

b. Military Construction: CG, FMAW has requested that funds in the amount of \$24,900.00 be diverted from a MAG-11 project which is no longer required and reallocated to W/R #M18-17-68 (MACG-18 Headquarters Buildings).

c. Motor Transport: The cargo/mileage of MACG-18 vehicles was 6889 short tons of cargo transported and a total driven mileage of 101811 miles. Of the above, 2332 miles and 68 short tons of cargo was a result of rough rider convoy participation.

d. Embarkation: During the month of April the MACG-18 Embarkation Section moved 75,457 lbs., 8,515 cuft. and 14 personnel within the RVN. 60,845 lbs., 7,153 cuft. and 14 personnel from RVN to Okinawa. Total 136,302 lbs., 15,668 cuft. and 28 personnel.
