b. On 16 November MajGen Anderson awarded VMO-6 the Naval . Aviation Safety Award at Quang Tri. He then proceeded to Phu Bai where he presented personal decorations and awards to members of HMM-263.

c. On 20 November MajGen Anderson again visited Phu Bai and presented awards to members of HMM-164.

- 1. During this reporting period MAG-36 provided support to:
 - a. III MAF
 - b. Second Republic of Korea Marine Forces
 - c. I Corps Republic of Vietnam Forces
 - d. US Army Special Forces
 - e. Special Landing Forces (SLF)
- 2. Missions flown by the group include strikes, medical evacuations, reconnaissance inserts and extracts, troop and logistic movements, search and rescue, quick reaction, sparrow hawk, administrative and courier flights.

- 3. Aircraft of this Group received hostile ground fire on 74 sorties during the month. Sixteen aircraft received battle damage from this enemy fire.
- (1) 9 November 1967 VMO-3 accident number 4-68A UH-1E. Aircraft experienced power loss and crash landed short of zone. As a result of a hard landing, the main rotor blades severed the tail rotor drive shaft and tail cone. The aircraft was externaled by CH-53 on 10 November to Phu Bai.
- (2) 14 November 1967 VMO-3 accident number 5-68A UH-1E. The aircraft disintegrated in flight resulting in alpha injury to six individuals and alpha damage to the aircraft. Cause of the accident

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was undetermined.

(3) 25 November 1967 VMO-6 accident number 3-68A UH-1E. After picking up into a hover, the aircraft started to disintegrate and crash landed. Cause of the accident was undetermined, no injury to the Crew.

Incidents

- (1) 1 November 1967 HMM-163 incident 33-68I UH-34D. While attempting to get into position to hoist a medevac out of a high, confined zone, The aircraft settled into the trees due to insufficient power. The aircraft sustained damage when it contacted trees and as a result was rendered unflyatle. The crew was evacuated and the aircraft extracted the following day by CH-53.
- (2) 5 November 1967 VMO-3 incident number 41-68IUH-IE. While on a mission in support of the 3rd MAR DIV, .50 Cal. ground fire resulted in a forced landing when one round went through the engine compressor section. The crew was evacuated uninjured, but due to the tactical situation the aircraft was destroyed.
- (3) 11 November 1967 HMM-163 incident number 4-68I <u>UH-34D</u>. While in the zone picking up a medevac, the aircraft was hit by a heavy caliber weapon and rendered unflyable. The crew was extracted the next day, but recovery attempts were prevented by enemy fire and the aircraft was destroyed.
- (4) 24 November 1967 HMM-362 incident number 50-68I UH-34D. While climbing out of a medevac zone, the aircraft was hit by enemy fire and forced to land when the main fuel line was ruptured. The crew and medevacs were extracted by escort aircraft, and the damaged aircraft was externaled by CH-53 the same day.
- 4. The Group Intelligence Officer conducted daily briefing's with each tactical squadron and briefed the Staff and Commanding Officer three times a week. Liaison was conducted with the Thrid Marine. Division G-2 and the MACV Special Intelligence Officer at HUE. The majority of the intelligence available to the Group is supplied by the 1st C. I. team attached to the Third Marine Division.
- 5. Forty-six individuals of this command attended formal schools during the month. NBC teams were formed in each squadron. The Group conducted an aerial gunners school for personnel assigned to this Command.
- 6. Construction at MAG-36 Phu Bai was slow during the first part of November due to the beginning of the monsoons, and a recent rotation

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of Seabee battalions. During the second half of the month there was a definite increase in verticle and horizontal contruction. The Group Administration Building neared completion and was manned by the Staff. Seven (7) of the scheduled fifteen (15) two story enlisted barracks were completed enough to let the troops move in. Construction of our messhall was started and is making good progress with an estimated completion date of 14 January. General grading of our 90,000 SY apron was started with the first 45,000 SY's due for completion on 15 January. Heavy rains slowed down concrete work on our second large hangar, but we were assured that it would be ready also by 15 January. Siting for future construction began, and minor new construction projects were changed from the Ky Ha area to the Phu Bai area as well as assuming MAG-16 projects. At MAG-36 Quang Tri, the month of November provided limited maintenance, administration, and living facilities. The erection of two SATS hangars neared completion and the TAFDS, tower, MATCU facilities became operational. Southcast Asia huts were under construction for administration and maintenance facilities, and by the end of the month there was sufficient living space for flight crews.

Plans for a complete siting of the Quang Tri base were started, and a minimum construction list was being prepared for istMAW and III MAF approval.

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PART III SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. Air Operations. Late in the month the capabilities of the group increased significantly with the arrival of 32 CH-46D helicopters for HMM-364 and the return of some of the CH-46A's from the modification program. The CH-46A's were returned to HMM-164 and HMM-165. During the month of November MAG-36 accomplished the following:

2. Re-location of Units

- a. HMM-165 completed its move from Ky Ha to Phu Bai.
- b. VMO-6 completed its move from Phu Bai to Quang Tri.
- 3. Intelligence. The most intense hostile fire was received from grid coordinates YD 5126, YD 5022 and ZC 0896. Fire incidents were as follows:
 - a. Incidents 74
 - b. Aircraft hit 16
 - c. Total hits received 26
 - d. Fire incidents to hours flown 72
 - e. Hours flown per hit incident 332.9
 - f. Hit incidents to total hits 1.6
 - g. Fire incidents to hit incidents 2.2

4. Base Development

a. The Group Staff moved into the new headquarters building.

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- b. Seven two story barracks were completed.
- c. Construction of a new mess hall commenced.
- d. Enlargement of the parking apron commenced.
- e. Hot water was made available in the showers.
- 5. Maintenance. Due to two accidents, all UH-lE tail rotor hubs were removed and inspected and the main rotor masts x-rayed.
