1. During July 1969, MAG-36 participated in the following operations providing support to III MAF, U.S. ARMY, Republic of Vietnam Forces and Republic of Korea Marine Corps.

2. Operational Highlights

a. During the month of July, MAG-36 provided a daily average of 8 UH-34D, 4 CH-53A, and 5 UH-1E aircraft to augment FMAG-39 in support of the 3rd Marine Division. In addition, two UH-1E aircraft were provided in support of "Prairie Fire", four CH-46A aircraft were provided to augment MAG-16 on six different occasions and two CH-53A aircraft augmented MAG-16 on nine different occasions. Also on nine different occasions, from one to three UH-1E aircraft were provided to augment MAG-16.

b. On 15 July, a UH-1E aircraft from HML-367 was shot down while participating in operation "Prairie Fire". The aircraft received strike damage but all crew members were rescued. One crewmember received minor injuries.

PART III

1. Air Operations

a. MAG-36 accomplished the following during the month of July:

2. Intelligence

a. Enemy Action.

(1) There were 4 rocket attacks during the month of July. These attacks took place on the 7th, 11th, 22nd and 25th of July. There were negative casualties or damage to MAG-36 area.

(2) Enemy activity for this reporting period was light with only minor contacts in the local villages that were mostly political and terrorist type activity. The next two weeks could possibly show an increase in enemy activity. This feeling is based on agent reports that indicate the enemy will be commencing an offensive during August.

3. Logistics

a. The Tactical Airfield Fuel Dispensing System (TAFDS) performed smoothly again this month. The peak day for fuel dispensed was 19 July 1969 with 6,927 gallons of 115/145 AvGas and 22,214 gallons of JP-4. Total fuel dispensed for the month was 127,297 gallons of 115/145 and 512,268 gallons of JP-4.

c. Base Development

(1) The air-conditioning of the EM Club has been further delayed due to extensive rewiring requirement and the lack of a power source.

(2) A new 150 KW generator is in place and ready to be wired to the dispensary as soon as the required parts can be procured. This will liberate the existing 75 KW generator to fulfill the EM Club requirement.

(3) Resurfacing of the helo parking area between "B" and "C" taxiways is still in progress and should be completed in September.

(4) All 1st MAW sponsored MILCON project at MAG-36 are on temporary hold due to lack of construction funds.

(5) Lack of the proper materials has temporarily halted the construction of the Armaco revetments around the jet engine test cell.

(6) The Group Supply Administration Bldg. is completed except for light fixtures. Lack of material is again the problem.

d. Administration

a. During the first two weeks in July, the personnel level in MAG-36 decreased in both officer and enlisted ranks, however, a subsequent increase during the latter part of the month returned the personnel situation to normal.

b. The Provisional Rifle Company experienced a continued build up of permanent personnel joining, one officer and six enlisted.

c. The Civic Action Section reports that the addition to the dispensary in Thuy Phu Village is completed. Construction has begun on a four room school house in Phu Bai III.

d. Fifteen children from Thuy Phu Village were brought to MAG-36 for a picnic and a movie.

e. Eighty orphans were taken on a sightseeing tour of the Hue Citadel.

f. Construction was completed on a five room school house in the Phu Long refugee camp.

h. Weekly visits to hospitalized Marines at 22nd Surgical Hospital, Phu Bai, and the 85th Evacuation Hospital, Phu Bai, were made by senior officers of the Group.

5. Inspections

a. There were no inspections of MAG-36 Units during the month of July.

6. Off-Duty Education. The MAG-36 off-duty education program continued during July. Progress is as follows:

a. C-151 General Math 1. This course was completed in July. Eight students took the end of course test.

b. E-100 Ninth Grade English 1. This course was completed in July. Five students are ready to take the end of course test.

c. D-300 Bookkeeping and Accounting 1. This course was completed in July. Four students are ready to take the end of course test.

d. C-108 College Preparatory English. One student completed the course in July.

e. The following tests were given.

7. Chaplain Services

a. During the month of July, the assigned Chaplains conducted Divine Services for personnel of the Protestant and Catholic faiths. Divine Services were available for Latter Day Saint personnel at the 26th General Support Group Chapel and for Jewish personnel at the XXIV Corps Chapel.

b. The Catholic Chaplain conducted Divine Services at PMAG-39 and MCB-1 each Sunday and for MCB-1 each Wednesday evening. The Catholic Chaplain also conducted weekly masses for outlying CAG units. The Protestant Chaplain conducted Divine Services at NSA, Colco Beach each week throughout the month. Hospital visits were made to MAG-36 personnel at the 85th Evacuation Hospital.

c. A total of 51 services were conducted aboard the MAG-36 compound with 978 personnel attending. Off-base services totaled 22 with 488 in attendance. There were also 3 religious film showings with a total attendance of 105.

d. Three memorial services were conducted for men from 3rd CAG.

e. In addition to their primary duties, the MAG-36 Chaplains maintained contact with their Vietnamese counterparts. Visits made and assistance given was to the American Nuns, Christian Brothers and Catholic Orphanage in Hue; the Tin Lanh Church, School and Orphanages in Phu Luong and Hue; the An-Kanh Thuy-Luong-Hung Orphanage in Phu Luong and the refugee village in Phu Luong. Chaplain Civic Action gifts for the month consisted of 34 truckloads of fill dirt, 6 truckloads (6 x 6) of scrap lumber, 40 pounds of assorted foodstuffs, 70 pounds of assorted school supplies, 240 pounds of clothing, and substantial amounts of building materials including cement and sheet metal roofing.

f. The Chaplains arranged for four tours of Hue with a total of 57 men participating.

g. A Protestant Retreat was arranged by Chaplain STRUTHERS for all Wing personnel at the China Beach R&R Center, 4-6 July. About 70 men participated. Dr. Stuart HARVEYSON, a Missionary Doctor to the Hroy Montagnard Tribesmen was the principal speaker.

h. A piano, vocal and organ recital was presented at the Chapel on 3 July 1969. Featured were Miss Kim Van and Mr. Vinh-Hung both from Hue. The presentation was most favorably received by the men.

i. Stone fencing and planting of shrubbery in front of the Chapel has been completed. Construction of small chapels on the second floor are nearing completion.

9. Communications

a. The Communications Center processed 3,181 incoming and 771 outgoing messages for a total of 3,952 messages during the month of July. This is approximately 25 percent below the monthly average.

b. Installed a Radio Set RL-524 in the Operations Bunker to increase range and reliability of VHF communications.

c. Installed a Radio Set AN/GRC-125 in the MAG-36 Provost Marshal vehicle to enhance the Coordination of military police activities.

d. Provided public address support for the MAG-36 Change of Command Ceremony on 9 July and for an Awards Presentation by Major General THRASH on 10 July. Public address support was also provided to XXIV Corps and I Corps during this reporting period.

e. Installed a Radio Set AN/PRC-25 in the Phu Bai Control Tower to provide an additional VHF capability.

f. Reworked the H&MS-36 TOM-20 cable system and replaced cable to increase reliability.

g. A TEMPEST Survey Team visited and inspected installations in the MAG-36 Communication Center. Preliminary verbal report of the team indicates that modification of some teletype equipment is necessary to lower electronic emanation to an acceptable level. A formal report will be forwarded through the chain of command on the overall results of the visit and inspection.

h. Continued to update the MAG-36 telephone system of installing a pair cable to service the MABS-36 Headquarters and the Quonset Hut area.

10. Base Defense

a. There were no fire incidents on the bunker line during the month.

b. Day and night patrols saturated the MAG-36 section of responsibility with no enemy sighting or contacts.
