6. Communications

7. Motor Transport

a. Operations. MAG-36 Motor Transport Vehicles traveled 44,831 miles. Approximately 341,000 gallons of water was delivered to MAG-36 units for showers, mess halls, and drinking purposes. 98,300 gallons of fuel was delivered to Quang Ngai and Tam Ky. In addition, 255,000 gallons of JP-4 and 91,220 gallons of Av/Gas were delivered to TAFDS at Ky Ha. MAG-36 used 37,200 gallons of Mogas. Diesel fuel delivered to and used by MAG-36 amounted to 55,800 gallons.

b. There were no accidents during this period

c. 172 work orders have been completed, with 37 work orders remaining open at this time.

8. Materiel. The Materiel Section continued to perform routine duties during January. The large number of personnel joined necessitated above averages of individual equipment.
