4. Base Services

- a. During the month of October, Motor Transport vehicles traveled a total of 21, 303, miles. Water hauled and delivered for messhall, showers, and drinking water amounted to 175,000 gallons. Cargo hauled amounted to 2,792 tons, and passengers carried exceeded 13,000. The Squadron hauled a total of 57,267 gallons of diesel fuel, 20,000 gallons of Mogas, 27,442 gallons of JP-4 and 61,308 of 115/145.
- b. The various shops completed a total of two hundred and thirty one (231) work orders.
- c. The Utilities Section provided MAG-36 with electricity, refrigeration, potable water, and 86,500 pounds of fresh laundry. The Engineer Equipment Section maintained its equipment in a state of readiness to enable it to meet 178 of 199 committments. The Carpenter Shop constructed a 1500 sq. ft. semi-permanent building for the laundry, a South East Asia Hut for IRO, and completed 59 other minor construction projects. The plumbing, electric, refrigeration and carpenter shops all continued with small installations and improvements as required by the MAG-36 to improve the working and living areas.
- d. Base Services picked up and disposed of all trash during the month. There were also several extra police calls for the entire base due to visits by various VIPs. Base Services also disposed of human waste products from all heads on base, and repaired heads as necessary. Sanitary conditions in the heads were maintained by sweeping and scrubbing daily with disinfectant solution. Base Services installed 10 urinals and disposed of 6 during the month. Urinal screening was replaced as necessary and diesel fuel was put in urinals on a weekly basis.
