

- 4. Civic Action: Support continues to be provided to the Thuy Luong Refugee Camp. Seventy-five Vietnamese received medical treatment during MEDCAPS and 60 Vietnamese received dental treatment during DENTCAPS. Work was continued on the new Saint Joseph's Orphanage in Phu Luong Village.
- 5. Communications: During September 1969, the Communications Center processed 3250 incoming messages and 979 outgoing. The Radic Section performed routine functions and the Wire Section improved cable routes in various areas of the compound. The Radio Repair Section performed routine maintenance on equipment.
- 6. Weather: The Weather Section performed routine functions. Average Painfall for the month of September 1969 is 15.0 inches and the total rainfall for September 1969 was 22.10 inches. Weather during the month had no effect on the accomplishment of the squadron's mission.
- 7. Medical: 2053 patients were treated at sick call. 80 physical examinations were conducted and 1244 immunizations were given.
- 8. Dental: 500 military patients and 60 Vietnamese received dental treatment at the Dental Clinic.
- 9. Air Freight: 186,434 pounds of cargo was processed by the Air Preight Section. 32,400 pounds were incoming and 154,034 were outgoing. 287 passengers were manifested to various destinations.
- 10. Tactical Airfield Fuel Dispensing System: The TAFDS Section dispensed 630,722 gallons of JP-4 jet fuel and 93,998 gallons of 115/145 aviation gas.
- 11. Crash Crew: The Crash Crew Section maintained rectine alert, responding to medical evacuation, fires and emergencies.
- 12. Base Operations: Normal Base Operations were conducted during September 1969, including directing parcraft ramp traffic.
- 13. Materiel: The Materiel Section provided routine supply support for the squadron including Navy and Marine Corps requisitions, surveys, disposal turnin and equipment repair turn-in.
- 14. Base Services:
- a. Motor Transport Section's vehicles traveled 58,691 miles. The Operations Section hauled 1152 tons of cargo, 120,082 gallons of potable water, 99,437 gallons of diesel fuel, 16,635 gallons of mogas, 33,810 gallons of JP-4 fuel, 66,135 gallons of 115/145 aviation gas and 15,310 passengers. The Maintene Section completed 205 work orders of which 83 were second echelon, 11 were third echelon, 21 in the body shop, 57 in the carburation and ignition shop and 33 in the welding shop.
- b. The Utilities Section continued to support Group in it's areas of responsibility during the month of September 1969. The Generator Section assisted Public Works in providing power for the Group, maintaining and repairing organic generators as required. The Laundry processed 12,640 pounds of bulk



laundry, 9,300 pounds of lot work and 640 individual bundles. The plumbing shop made a survey of all the hot water heaters in the showers, repaired all that they were capable of, and submitted work requests to Public Works for maintenance and repair on the remaining heaters. The plumbing shop also supplied 73,500 gallons of water and answered several trouble calls. The engineer equipment section supported the Group with forklifts and other items of heavy equipment, which totaled 895 hours on the job operating time. There were 200 commitments completed and the equipment was maintained in a satisfactory state. The carpenter shop repaired the Group Commanding Officer's walkway, built 4 bunkers, remodled the enlisted club, moved a hut at sickbay, covered the COC Bunker with plastic, and constructed approximately 500 boxes. The shop completed 51 work orders. The electric shop completed 44 work orders, rewired all of the living quarters and working areas for the Crash Crew Section and took care of all minor electrical troubles. The refrigeration shop completed 21 work orders and minor trouble calls.

- c. The Base Police and Sanitation Section picked up and disposed of garbage, trash and human waste, maintained sanitary cinditions in heads and showers, and performed general police of the Group compound.
  - d. Food Services Section fed an average of 1,775 rations daily.
- e. The Post Exchange operated daily, providing murchendise and health and comfort items to the base personnel. Total sales during September 1969 amounted to \$81,732.76.
- 15. Rifle Company: Rifle Company performed it's mission of defending sector "A" of the Phu Bai perimeter and conducted day and night patrols inside and outside the perimeter. Bunkers and other defensive positions are continually improved, including defensive barrier wire.
- 16. Chaplain Section: The Protestant and Catholic Chaplains conducted religious services for base personnel and participated in civic action projects.
