PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The month of June was marked by a crescendo of events which peaked on the morning of 18 June with the assault on C-1. Early days of June saw much of ProvMAG-39 flight time spent in working with emergency coverage of recon teams along the DMZ. Both transport squadrons had two CH-46's shot down in the early days of the month.

The events of 17 June saw the night Medevac aircraft shot down with an RPG and one of the escort gunships hit causing serious injury to the pilot and gunner.

The remainder of the month tapered off in enemy activity to the monthly low on 30 June 1969.

PART III SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

Chronological Sequence of Events

- 1Jun69: With the support of Seaworthy UH-1E gunships Chatterbox Medevac extracted emergency medevac under intense enemy fire.
- 2Jun69: Chatterbox 93-5 was diverted from resupply missions to accomplish an emergency recon extract. While in the landing zone the transport aircraft come under intense enemy small arms fire. The pilot remained in the LZ to complete the extract. Cattlecall medevac while hoisting emergency medevacs received heavy small arms fire and upon attempting to depart the hoist site, the aircraft was shot down and burned on impact.

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- 3Jun69: Chatterbox medevac while working the medevac mission for Task Force Hotel came under small arms fire. The medevacs were extracted and the gunners on Chatterbox medevac were credited with 2 confirmed KIA's.
- 5Jun69: At dawn Seaworthy 97-14 while on a general VR. of the Dong Ha area, observed 5 rockets on launchers aimed at Dong Ha Combat base. 97-14 firing Naval Gunfire and working with Seaworthy 98-5 who controlled three flights of fixed wing air on the site attempted to divert the enemy attack. The assaulting aircraft received heavy .50 Cal. fire. The results of the attack were 27 NVA 122MM rockets destroyed and 10 KBA's.
- 7Jun69: Working with two recon teams along the DMZ MAC-39 aircraft encountered intense small arms and .50 cal. fire. Both Chatterbox and Cattlecall had an aircraft shot down and consumed by fire. Seaworthy, OV-10A's and UH-1E gunships assisted the recon team in linking up with the downed crew of the Chatterbox aircraft. Seaworthy, OV-10A's controlled artillery and fixed wing air around the teams position for 48 hours while a reaction force moved into the area.
- 10Jun69: Working with additional recon teams Seaworthy had one UH-1E gunship shot down along the DMZ. Cattlecall resupply A/C were diverted to extract an emergency medevac. During the extract the medevac aircraft took heavy .50 cal fire and made a forced landing near the LZ.
- 17Jun69: Cattlecalls night medevac section while working with the ARVN forces at C-1 took a direct hit with an RPG round and made a forced landing near the LZ. The crew remained in the LZ overnight. While supporting the night medevac section Seaworthy UH-1E gunships received intense automatic weapons fire. One of the Seaworthy pilots and one crew chief were seriously wounded. Seaworthy gunships and OV-10A's remained on station throughout the night killing over 200 NVA within 500 meters of the besieged out post during the encounter.
- 25Jun69: Seaworthy OV-10A's working with fixed wing aircraft accounted for five KBA's, one .50 cal machine gun and numerous secondary explosions and fires along the DMZ.

e. Civic Affairs

Twenty (20) Civic Affairs trips were made in the MAG-39 Civic Action area of responsibility. 91 persons composed the teams implementing personal response and Civic Action Projects. 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03A197697. Intelligence

a. Enemy activity remained at a low level during the month with the enemy generally avoiding contact with major units, with the exception of the Utah Mesa area. The enemy employed forces ranging from platoon to up to two (2) companies on occasions around the Khe Sanh area during the month. The enemy sustained heavy casualties during these encounters while friendly casualties were light. Mining incidents continued throughout the TACR.

b. Enemy action against PMAG-39 consisted of a rocket attack at midnight on 10 June 1969 when five (5) 122MM rockets impacted in the MATCU area causing the destruction of one (1) hootch and moderate damage to a generator, while wounding five (5) Marines. This was the second consecutive month that Quang Tri Air Base was targeted by enemy rocketeers. The number of aircraft receiving fire decreased by 13 from the previous month with an increase in aircraft hit of two (2).

c. Evidence of possible attacks by fire and sapper attacks against various installations is again accumulating. If such attacks materialize, they will more than likely occur sometime during the time frame of the 1st through the 23rd of July which is being considered as the enemy's 3rd phase of the summer campaign. This includes the period of low lunar illumination between the 11th through the 23rd with possible emphasis on the morning hours of the 12th, 16th and 23rd. However, the enemy retains the capability of launching such attacks at any time and with little warning. During the coming month the enemy is expected to continue to avoid significant contact, concentrating on foraging, reorganization, relocation and training. Scattered harassing attacks by fire and small probes can be expected throughout the area.

NARRATIVE SUMMARYAir Traffic Control:
