PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

VMFA-115 started the new year by deploying to Naha, Okinawa on 7 January. While at Naha, the "Silver Eagles" conducted training in four areas - Air Combat Maneuvering, Air to Ground Ordnance Delivery, Electronic Countermeasures, and Radar Intercept/Missile Firing. ACM was conducted within the squadron and against A-4E's from VC-5, while the bombing was done at local ranges. ECM training was conducted with the aid of EA-6A's from VMJ-1 and USAF EB-57's from Kadena AB. Intercept practice was completed with Marine Air Control Squadron 4 acting as the GCI controller. A very successful missile shoot against maneuvering targets was conducted with 16 Sparrow and 4 Sidewinder missiles launched. Air to air gunnery training was also accomplished using the TDU 10/B, Dart towed target. The completion of such varied training at Naha increased the skills and knowledge of all personnel involved and greatly aided the squadron in becoming combat ready.

VMFA-115 received orders to commence an immediate move to DaNang AB, RVN on the morning of 6 April. The "Silver Eagles" were in DaNang to provide close air support for the defending South Vietnamese by the evening of the 6th. After 2 days of briefings by the USAF, 115 flew 12 combat sorties on 9 April. April was almost over when the "Silver Eagles" were greatly saddened by the loss of our Executive Officer, Major T. K. DUFFY, who was killed in a mid-air collision with a VNAF O-1.

On the morning of 11 May, 115 received a request for the scramble of two aircraft ASAP for an emergency mission in Military Region III. Capt. W. J. HOLVERSTOTT, Capt. A. B. TOZZI, Capt. S. R. TOMLINSON, and 1stLt. S. A. HEINRICH were sent to provide CAS in the vicinity of An Loc. Being re-armed and refueled at Bien Hoa AB, these crews flew a total of eight CAS sorties. May was also a good month for BDA. Capt. TOMLINSON, 1stLt. LONG, 1stLt. TRECKER, and Capt. TOZZI received credit for 100 KBA in MR I after the completion of one mission.

### 3. OPERATIONS SUPPORTED

After arriving "In Country" on 6 April, the "Silver Eagles" supported the South Vietnamese in their defense against the invading North Vietnamese Army by providing CAS. VMFA-115 provided the majority of this support around the cities of Quang Tri, Hue, Pleiku, Kontum, and Phu Cat. The squadron continued with CAS and also provided interdiction against NVN when the South Vietnamese began their counter-offensive to regain lost territory in May.

VMFA-115 was one of the units participating when the Commandant of the Vietnamese Marine Corps congratulated all units providing close air support for the amphibious landing and helicopter assault, SONG THAN 6-72.

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On the morning of 16 June, VMFA-115 began another move. The "Silver Eagles" flew eleven combat sorties leaving from DaNang and recovering at the newly established Nam Phong Royal Thai Air Base. VMFA-115 became the first combat squadron of Task Force Delta to arrive at Nam Phong. On the 17th, our first full day in Thailand, the "Silver Eagles" flew a full combat schedule and began refueling with VMGR-152's KC-130 tankers. This was to become commonplace, as the distance between our home base and the target areas in Viet Nam precluded flying missions with more than a few minutes of loiter time.

VMFA-115 completed the first six months of 1972 with a successful deployment at Naha, Okinawa, and then three months of intensive combat flying in RVN. The "Silver Eagles" led the way into combat at DaNang and in the move to Thailand. The squadron continues to display its typical "Can Do" attitude in our new place of residence, MCAS "Rose Garden", Thailand.
