PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The "Silver Eagles" continued with quality and quantity during the month of July. This was the squadron's first full month in Thailand aboard the not fully developed Nam Phong Royal Thai AB. After getting off to a slow start the squadron ended the month with 540.7 combat hours and 753.6 tons of ordnance delivered. This total marks the highest number of hours flown by the squadron since deployed in April. This record was

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established under most difficult operating conditions here at Nam Phong and speaks well for the individual initiative and team effort of the entire squadron. The squadron had an average of 11.2 aircraft on hand throughout the month. From the 16th through the 28th only 11 aircraft were available, and only 10 were available for the last three days of the month. Even with aircraft assets dwindling, the squadron produced 20 sorties and 27.4 hours on 27 July.

While the Southwest monsoon provided relatively good weather in Vietnam, launches and recoveries at Nam Phong were hindered by low ceilings and the field's lack of IFR capability. All things considered July was a most productive month for VMFA-115.

PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 115 opened a new page in the history of Marine Aviation when on the morning of 16 June Lieutenant Colonel K. A. MCFERREN, and Colonel K. OKEEFE left DaNang Air Base in two of the squadron's F4B "Silver Eagles". After completing close air support missions for the embattled forces of the Republic of Vietnam the two aircraft turned west

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and some thirty minutes later recovered at Royal Thai Air Force Base Nam Phong, thus becoming the first combat elements of "Task Force Delta" to arrive in Thailand. Throughout the day other Silver Eagles repeated the procedure until the entire squadron had recovered at the expeditionary strip affectionately known as "MCAS Rose Garden". Perhaps the Commandant had not promised his Silver Eagles a Rose Garden, however... On 17 June VMFA-115 flew the first combat operations from Nam Phong thus establishing Marine Tactical Fighter aviation in Thailand.

With an average of 11.3 aircraft on board the squadron flew a total of 306 combat sorties, raining 700.5 tons of ordnance on the entrenched North Vietnamese army. The 300 miles from Nam Phong to the combat area resulted in significantly increased flight hours per sortie and another first for Marine Aviation in that Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 115 became the first Tactical fighter unit required to routinely aerial refuel on every combat mission flown. This was accomplished with KC-130 tankers of VMGR-152. The significant tactical lesson learned during the month was that it is entirely feasible to aerial refuel heavily laden F4Bs at a low altitude behind the slow turboprop KC-130 "Hercules".

Thus the month of June 1972 will be remembered in the annals of Marine aviation and the "Silver Eagles" led the way.

PART III SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. LtGen METZGER, Commanding General, III MAF, arrived on 2 June for a look at Marine operations in DaNang, RVN. Capt P. M. SINGLETON, 1stLt J. T. ANDERSON, and 1stLt E. H. SULLIVAN joined VMFA-115 on 4 June. All three of these officers had their first taste of combat on 12 June. 1stLt ANDERSON has added to the confusion in the squadron by being promoted to Captain. The two Capt ANDERSON's are differentiated by initials. Captain C. J. CONLON left the "Silver Eagles" on 10 June to become the Operations Officer of the new base at Nam Phong. 1stLt R. V. KRSTIAN joined VMFA-115 on 17 June and started flying regularly in combat (also his first tour) on 23 June. LtCol K. A. McFERREN, the Commanding Officer of VMFA-115 until 24 June, has rotated back home to attend the Command and Staff College at MCDEC, MCB, Quantico, Virginia. His position is now filled by Maj G. DEJONG. 1stLt C. C. RICE joined the "Silver Eagles" on 29 June.
