PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

The "Silver Eagles" continued their support of South Vietnamese forces during the month of August. The role of VMFA-115 was slightly altered in that we were flying true close air support missions in support of friendly forces. This was a change from the direct air support mission primarily flown in previous months. Another item differing from previous

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months, was that the majority of 115's sorties were flown without the aid of Tankers. A crew would fly one mission out of Nam Phong, land at Danang AB, RVN, rearm and refuel, then fly an additional mission prior to returning to MCAS "Rose Garden".

VMFA-115 began August with only 9 aircraft on hand, and ended the month with an average of 10.6 on hand. This was reflected in combat hours and sorties flown, but not in the number of tons of ordnance delivered. The "Silver Eagles" flew 425.8 combat hours and dropped 765.4 tons of ordnance.

The squadron began to reorient it's ground and air training program during August. Ground Training was focused on Air-to-Air tactics, and Air Combat Maneuvering training missions were flown. This along with aircrews being sent to Udorn AB to attend briefings with the 432nd TacRecon Wing missions, provided the squadron with the information required for augmentation of Marine BarCap missions flown in support of 7th Air Force Ops.

It is significant that the "Silver Eagles" operations during August were accomplished under the stringent conditions imposed by the facilities at the "Rose Garden", continuing to demonstrate the ability of Marine Fighter Aviation to successfully operate on an expeditionary basis as "a force in readiness".
