PART II NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During early September the "Silver Eagles" continued to fly close air support missions for friendly forces in South Viet Nam and simultaneously continued intensified training in Air-to-Air warfare.

(C) On the sixth of September VMFA-115 began flying Barrier Combat Air Patrols in support of U. S. operations in North Viet Nam. The first

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flight was led by the Commanding Officer, LtCol. H. C. IVY and Capt. R. R. RENIER. Flying wing were Capt. N. G. G. KERR, 1stLt. C. V. LONG, Capt. W. J. HOLVERSTOTT and Capt. V. M. RUSSILLO. By the end of September, all but a few of the aircrrew members had been qualified and participated in the BARCAP. Upon completion of the Air-to-Air mission, the three crews would engage in Air Combat Maneuvering (ACM) practice prior to returning to Nam Phong thus gaining valuable ACM training within the flight.

(C) VMFA-115 flew 437.0 combat hours and dropped 309.1 tons of ordnance. This reduction from previous months was caused by the broadening of our combat mission. The squadron continued to demonstrate versatility and the broad capabilities of USMC fighter aviation by conducting refresher ACM training and then assuming an additional Air-to-Air role while continuing the air to ground mission in support of the South Viet Name.

On 30 September 1972 Capt. W. J. HOLVERSTOTT and his RIO 1stLt. B. D. WILSON completed the 32,000th combat sortie flown by the "Silver Eagles" since the beginning of USMC involvement in the Southeast Asian conflict.
