SECTION 1

OPERATIONS IN VIETNAM AND LAOS

(C) The New Year opened with the officers and men of VMFA-115 enjoying a well deserved day off and with minds pondering the renewed peace talks and possible resumption of the LINEBACKER mission over North Vietnam.

(C) During the period from 2 January thru 27 January the squadron flew over 500 combat hours in South Vietnam and Laos. With the cease fire in South Vietnam going into effect on 27 January the Silver Eagles ended their involvement in the Vietnam conflict with a total of 33,553 combat sorties.

(C) The month of February found the Silver Eagles flying combat sorties in support of the Royal Laotian Government. During this month, VMFA-115 flew 218 combat sorties in the "Barrel Roll" and "Steel Tiger" regions of Laos. It was also during this time period that the Silver Eagles flew in support of operation BLACK LION IV. Raven 44 (Mr. Lew HATCH) presented the squadron with a plaque for outstanding support given by the Eagles during this operation. Mr. HATCH, in addition to the plaque, also presented the squadron with a Laotian flag that had been given to him by the wounded and medivaced people of Saravane, Laos. The flag was in appreciation for the squadron's outstanding close air support during a period when Saravane was being attacked by the North Vietnamese. Combat operations ended on 22 February at 1200 with a cease fire for Laos going into effect.

SECTION 2

TRAINING OPERATIONS

(U) Cessation of operations in Laos on 22 February brought a temporary halt to VMFA-115's combat activities. The next day saw 12 training sorties launched as the Silver Eagles trained for their primary air-to-air mission. This date marked the first time in almost twelve months that the Silver Eagles launched training sorties exclusively. With a daily training schedule of six day and six night sorties the aircrews were able to accomplish a great deal of refresher intercept training and meet annual flight time requirements. Training ranges were set up by the 7th Air Force, and the Silver Eagles utilized the Udorn and Nakhon Phanom ranges to accomplish their training. On 28 February the squadron flew night air refueling in addition to the regularly scheduled intercepts. These training missions continued into March as the Silver Eagles prepared for possible redeployment to Iwakuni, Japan.

SECTION 3

OPERATIONS IN CAMBODIA

(C) Redeployment to Iwakuni did not occur however, and on 30 March VMFA-115 once again commenced combat operations, this time in support of the Cambodian government. The squadron has since been flying a minimum of six training sorties five days a week, in addition to the six combat sorties daily. Thru 30 June the Silver Eagles have flown 449 sorties in support of the Cambodian government.

SECTION 4

MISSILE FIREX/ACM TRAINING

(C) On 26 May 1973 the Silver Eagles launched six aircraft to NAS Cubi Point to conduct a missile FIREX/ACM deployment. Support was provided by a detachment from VMER-152 which provided logistical as well as re-fueling services. VC-5 Det Cubi provided direct liaison with the GCI/drone support personnel at Wallace A.B. Poro Point. Unable to obtain A-4 type adversary aircraft, VMFA-115 resorted to using the spare aircraft of the five plane daily missile firing flight as an ACM bogey.

For the fifteen days of the deployment only one sortie was lost and all launches got off either on time or early. Some pertinent data of the deployment includes: 51 sorties flown, 111.7 hours, 19 AIM-7E-2's and 16 AIM-9G's fired. Eleven aircrews fired both the AIM-7 and 9 for initial qualification or refresher while four pilots and one RIO were limited to firing only one type missile. The Silver Eagles accomplished this highly successful deployment while still maintaining combat flight operations in Cambodia.

(C) June 16th marked the first anniversary of the Silver Eagles new home, Nam Phong, Thailand. Over the last six months VMFA-115 has been faced with many sudden changes, from combat operations to training and back again. In the middle of this very difficult period the Silver Eagles managed to have a highly successful missile shoot, thus once again demonstrating the can-do attitude of the finest fighter squadron in the Marine Corps.

1 January - 22 February VMFA-115 flew in support of the Vietnamese and Royal Laotian Government.

23 February - 29 March

The squadron flew exclusively training sorties with the emphasis being placed on ACM tactics. On 25 February the Silver Eagles launched 4 sorties in support of the Cambodian government.

30 March - 30 June

During this period VMFA-115 launched a minimum of 6 combat sorties, in support of the Cambodian government, in addition to the daily training sorties.

28 May - 8 June

The Silver Eagles conducted a missile FIREX/ACM deployment at NAS Cubi Pt.

5. Training.

During the period 1 January - 30 June 1973, the training emphasis has been placed on ACM tactics. There have been numerous briefs on F4B vs MIG series aircraft. Loose Deuce tactics have also been frequently discussed during formal training. The Silver Eagles have also flown two Air Force originated training exercises, called the "Red Baron" and "Pouncer". Both of these missions simulate a MIG CAP and BAR CAP, with adversary aircraft attacking the CAP aircraft while under GCI control. This type of training mission has further enhanced VMFA-115's ACM readiness. All ACM training finally culminated with a partial deployment of the Silver Eagles to Cubi Pt. to conduct a phase II/phase III missile shoot and conduct further ACM training.

6. Operations Supported.

During the month of January VMFA-115 continued to fly combat sorties in the Republic of South Vietnam. With the formal ending of the Vietnamese conflict on 27 January 1973, VMFA-115 had flown a total of 33,553 combat sorties since entering hostilities. From 28 January until 22 February the squadron flew combat sorties in support of the Laotian government in the "Barrel Roll" and "Steel Tiger" areas. On 25 February the Silver Eagles flew their first combat sorties in support of the Cambodian government. The squadron was not to fly another combat sortie until 30 March, and has been flying in support of the Cambodian government since then. To date the squadron has flown a total of 449 combat sorties in Cambodia.

These flags that I've enclosed mean a lot to me. They were presented to me, to give to you, by a group of people who had been wounded and medivaced from Saravane. You all did shit hot work. I know it, the ground pounders know it, and the NVA know it. (The PL doesn't exist that far South).

At any rate, thanks a bunch.
