PART II

During April, VMFA-115 flew 636 Combat Sorties in support of operations throughout Southeast Asia.

Operations and units supported were: The First and Second ARVN Divisions, First and Third Marine Divisions, Americal Division, Task Force Alpha, The Seventh Fleet, Maine Craig, Kentucky Jumper, Oklahoma Hills, Purple Martin, Project Delta, Massachusetts Striker, Montana Marker, and the One Hundred and First Airborne.

In April, the Silver Eagles destroyed 98 structures while damaging 11.

The Bomb Damage Assessment also included: 153 bunkers destroyed, 33 damaged; 19 hootches destroyed, 5 damaged; 10 fighting holes destroyed; 36 enemy killed by Marine Air; 840 meters of trail destroyed; 540 meters of trenchline destroyed; 9 trail cuts; 6 automatic weapons destroyed; 2 trucks and 1 sampan destroyed.

To acquire this Bomb Damage Assessment VMFA-115 expended 1447.7 tons of ordnance. Ordnance dropped by type was:

On 11 April Lovebug 031, with Captain GEIGER and Lieutenant BOOTH in the lead and Lieutenant WHOLLEY and Lieutenant COUGHLIN in the number two position, was instructed to attack an enemy mortar position. The flight working in Quang Ngai Province with Helix 19, under an eighteen hundred foot overcast, dropped twelve 500 lb bombs and six 500 lb fire bombs on target, resulting in 10 structures destroyed with 2 damaged, 3 enemy killed, 2 secondary explosions, 7 secondary fires, 100 meters of trail and 100 meters of trenchline destroyed.

Later in April Lovebug 456, with Lieutenant BAIN and Lieutenant RYAN in the lead and Major PAIGE and Captain HAYNES in the wing position, was given a fortified village as a target. The flight dropped twelve 500 lb bombs and six 500 lb fire bombs on target, under control of Helix 34, resulting in 7 structures destroyed and 3 damaged, 6 secondary fires, 1 secondary explosion and 3 enemy killed.
