PART II

During June VMFA-115 flew 658 combat sorties in support of operations throughout the I Corps area.

Operations and units supported were the First and Third Marine Divisions, Americal Division, 101st Airborne Division, Second ROK Brigade, the 7th Fleet, Task Force Alpha, Virginia Ridge, Apache Snow, Lamar Plains, Kentucky Jumper, Utah Mesa, Cameron Falls and Pipe Stone Canyon.

While supporting these units and operations, the Silver Eagles were credited with the following damage assessment:

On 3 June a flight, led by Major LEWIS and Captain HAYNES with Lieutenant WHOLLEY and Captain WENRICH in the wing position, was given a target in support of a surrounded Reconnaissance Team. The Forward Air Controller informed the flight that the weather was 600 broken with rain and the terrain was very mountainous. The flight using a low angle of delivery was able to put one hundred percent of its ordnance on target, (twelve-five hundred pound bombs and six-five hundred pound fire bombs) thus freeing the Reconnaissance Team.

Later in the month Task Force Alpha was the recipient of some excellent work by the Silver Eagles. On 15 June a flight, led by Captain CANNAVA and Lieutenant BLAHNIK with Captain LARSON and Lieutenant WATSON in the number two position, was given a target in the Steel Tiger area with COVEY 584 as the Forward Air Controller. Manual 43 dropped one hundred percent of its ordnance on target destroying a vital bridge.
