During the month of October VMFA-115 flew 367 combat sorties and 487 combat hours in support of operations throughout I-Corps, Laos, and the Gulf of Tonkin.

(C) Units supported during the period 1-31 October were the First and Third Marine Divisions, Americal Division, 101st Airborne, the 7th Fleet, ARVN, ROK Marines, and the 7th Air Force.

(C) Operations Supported during the period 1-31 October include Victory Dragon, Republic Square, Iron Mountain, Pipestone Canyon, Geneva Park, Frederick Hill and AIS-an area of special interest.

4. (C) Air Operations

a. During October Lt. WHITING flew his 400th mission. Flying their 200th Mission were Captains LARSON, STULTS, SHARP and Lieutenant CAMPBELL. Flying their 100th mission were Lieutenants SATTLER, AMICK and DIBBLE.

c. Air Operations were severely curtailed during the first two weeks of October as record amounts of rain fell throughout I-Corps.

5. (C) Air Defense. The Silver Eagles flew 29 Barrier Cap Missions over the Gulf of Tonkin in support of the 7th Fleet. Also 17 Bomber escort missions were flown, generally over Laos, in support of the 7th Air Force. No MIG contacts were made, although one flight was vectored against a suspected MIG approaching the 12 mile limit offshore of NVN.

6. Training. Major HEINZERLING and Lieutenants LINK, HAYES, GOETT and MCGILL attended Jungle Environmental Survival Training at NAS Cubi Point. Captains FRENCH and MEIER, and Lieutenant DUNLAP attended ALO/FAC School at MCAF Futenma. Lieutenants PANCHISON and NELSON attended PJSS School at Clark Air Base and ALO/FAC School on Okinawa.
