d. Important Visitor to the Command

1. Major General Frank C. THARIN - Informal visit to Squadron Flight-Operations area where he received a ten minute briefing by the squadron commanding officer concerning this units current operations. Particular area of interest was the helicopter resupply missions at Khe Sahn.

PART II. NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- a. During March, VMA=211 flew 1,039 sorties for a total of 1,257.0 flight hours and dropped 1,522.7 tons of ordnance. These figures are the highest for the squadron since May of 1967. Factors that contributed to this successful month were:
 - 1. An all hands effort.
 - 2. Reduced aircraft turn-around times by manually loading 250 lb.

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bombs to supplement the small number of assigned SATS bomb loaders.

- 3. Increased familiarity with the tempo of operation in RVN since the squadron arrived back in country in December 1967.
- μ_{\bullet} A better than normal availability of aircraft during the latter part of the month.
- b. One of the major missions of the squadron during the month was helicopter escort flights at Khe Sahm. The squadron flew 122 sorties for the helicopter resupply of the reinforced companies located on hills 881 South, 861, and 861 Alpha. The success of the cover given by the fixed wing aircraft was evident by the high number of missions that were completed without any of the helicopters receiving hostile fire or battle damage to their aircraft.
- c. During the month twelve squadron pilots completed their 100th mission in RVN. As the combat experience of the pilots increased, the efficiency and bombing accuracy also increased. In the future, the squadron can be expected to more successfully complete its assigned missions.
 - d. Especially noteworthy flights for the month were:
- 1. On the 29th, eight sorties supported Army Special Forces in "Fanger Valley"; 22 miles west of Phu Bai. Responding to an emergency request for air support, the squadron pilots delivered their ordnance in very close proximity to 180 friendly troops which were being pinned down by enemy fire-power. As the last aircraft pulled off target, the FAC stated that the enemy guns had been silenced.


