

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. (U) All operations during the reporting period of Ol through 30 April 1969 were conducted from Chu Lai, Air Base, Republic of Vietnam.
- 2. (U) The following awards were recommended or awarded:

3. (C) At 1513H on 4 April 1969, Lt Ronald D. LAYTON scrambled from the alert pad of VMA-211 as flight leader of a section of A-4E Skyhawks. He and his wingman, Lt Robert R. RIVERS, rendezvoused after take-off, proceeded to the target area, and contacted the ground FAC, Quizmaster-14, for their mission. The target was an enemy harbor site just off the Hoi An River 17 miles southwest of Da Nang. No enemy hostile fire had been reported in the area. The weather was clear, yet visibility was extremely poor due to the heavy haze layer. The nearest friendly troops were 300-500 meters southwest of the target.

After a 81mm mortar marking round, Lt LAYTON skillfully maneuvering his Skyhawk rolled in for his initial attack. With the pinpoint accuracy for which he was well known, he dropped his napalm right on target. Exhibiting quick thinking and mature headwork, he aborted his second run high and dry because of confusing corrections given by the FAC.

By now, however, his target was nearly obliterated by smoke and haze yet Lt LAYTON, exhibiting the cool expertise that marked him as a truly outstanding attack pilot, rolled in for another pass. Miraculously he acquired the target and dropped four MK-81 snake eye's precisely where Quizmaster had requested.

Lt LAYTON had started his recovery, unknown to anyone, however, was the fact that enemy gunners had opened fire on the flight. As the gallant young aviator pointed his Skyhawk at the sky, enemy guns found their mark. The





- (C) Skyhawk rolled to the left and dove into the earth. Lt Ronald D. LAYTON had made the ultimate sacrifice for his country. This young Marine Aviator's conspicuous dedication to duty and uncommon loyalty to his country cost him his life. His actions were certainly in keeping with the highest traditions of the U. S. Marine Corps and the U. S. Naval Service.
- 4. (U) During April the squadron flew 773 combat sorties for 868.1 combat hours, while delivering 1,140.29 tons of ordnance on enemy positions and in support of operations listed in Part III, paragraph 2.(c).
- 5. (U) Despite the heavy rigors of a combat environment as well as the loss of one aircraft to enemy ground fire, and the battle damage inflicted on others, the maintainance department was able to provide an availability of 72% of all aircraft for each morning's launch.
- 6. (U) The month of April was one of activity for the squadron S-4 department. Work was completed on the new ready room, construction was comenced on a new aircraft hangar, and a project to supply deckedge power in the squadron's parking revetments was started.
