NARRATIVE SUMMARY (C)

- 1. (U) During November, VMA-211 continued to conduct combat operations from Bien Hoa AB, Republic of Vietnam.
- 2. (U) Of 906.8 hours flown in November, 766 sorties for 893.5 hours were flown on CAS/DAS missions in MR III and MR IV, Republic of Vietnam and in the Khmer Republic.
- 3. (U) Operations for this month were marred by the loss of one squadron aircraft:

On 9 November, 1stLt J. M. KEMPER, ejected from CF-08, BuNo 151191, while on take-off roll. The aircraft blew a tire just at rotation airspeed and began to decelerate. It KEMPER attempted to abort his take-off but was unable to control a severe right drift and ejected as the aircraft departed the right side of the runway. The pilot received no injuries. The aircraft plowed through the grass for a few thousand feet before burning. It was a total loss.

5. (U) AIRCRAFT MAINTENANCE

a. General. Due to the nonavailibility of data in the time frame allowed for this report, all information is for the month of October.

- (1) There were 8280 items processed and 17,159 man hours expended in general support of flight operations. The man hours per flight hour were 9.7, a reduction from the previous month.
- (2) Much emphasis was placed on the CP-741 Weapons Release Computer which accounted for 76 items processed and 463.4 man hours expended. The daily availability of Up CP-741's was about 70%. The ASQ-17 was again a high usage item, 86 items being processed. Direct maintenance of ECM equipment accounted for 160 items processed and 364.6 man hours expended.
- (3) There were 67 items cannibalized in October. This is a slight decrease from the previous month but still remains quite high. Supply support remains a problem forcing this high rate.
- (4) Data processing readouts and reports are either non-existant or are so late that they are of little use to the maintenance supervisor. Local logs must be utilized to offset this deficiency
