PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of July 1969, VMA-223 flew 910.5 hours and 819 sorties of which 889.2 hours and 796 sorties were flown in support of combat operations in the Republic of Vietnam. Squadron pilots delivered 1039.96 tons of aviation ordnance with the highest daily total being 57.14 tons delivered on 9 July 1969.

PART IIISIGNIFICANT EVENTS1. ADMINISTRATION

a. Personnel strength varied throughout the month of July. Five officers, four of them Naval Aviators, joined the Squadron along with 16 enlisted men. 2. OPERATIONS

a. VMA-223 conducted air operations on each day of July 1969 in support of I Corps, II Corps, and 7th Air Force targets. Operations and units supported are listed in Part IV.

b. At the end of July 1969 VMA-223's accident free hours totaled 9,881.5.

c. One Naval Aviator assigned to VMA-223 has reached 500 combat missions, two have reached 400, one has reached 300, nine have reached 200, and eleven have flown over 100 missions.
