

6. Narrative of Events

1 Feb 67 - The squadron flew 147 sorties for a total of 56.4 flight hours. Six hundred and seventy-six troops and 17 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Desoto - Six point four flight hours were flown in support of this operation. Thirty-two troops were carried.

Operation Estuary - Four squadron aircraft received intense small arms fire. All aircraft were hit, with three pilots and two crewmen sustaining wounds.

2 Feb 67 - The squadron flew 227 sorties for a total of 89.6 flight hours. Nine hundred and forty troops, 20 tons of cargo and 21 ned-evac's were carried.

While on mission H-0202-73, (recon extraction, emergency) one aircraft received intense small arms fire during landing. The pilot lifted out, observed no adverse effects, and returned once again to the zone. The recon team was extracted. No injury.

Sparrow Hawk Operation - One Sparrow Hawk Operation was flown for a total of 4.7 flight hours. Thirty-six troops were extracted from BS778826.

3 Feb 67 - The squadron flew 206 sorties for a total of 64.3 flight hours. Seventy-two passengers, 794 troops and 22 tons of cargo were carried.

Ten aircraft were utilized for mission H-0203-69, a ROKMC retraction. Six hundred and twenty-one troops and 4 tons of cargo were moved. It was accomplished in 38.7 flight hours and 93 sorties.

Operation Desoto - Forty-seven point two flight hours were flown in support of this operation. Six aircraft were utilized to carry 102 troops and 70 tons of cargo.

- 4 Feb 67 The semedron flew 186 sorties for a total of 75.7 flight hours. Two hundred and twenty-nine troops and 81 tons of cargo were carried.
- 5 Feb 67 The squadron flew 214 sorties for a total of 85.1 flight hours. Four hundred and fifty-five troops, 15 passengers and 47 tons of cargo were carried.







Operation Desoto - Nineteen hours were flown in support of this operation. Ten aircraft were utilized, 323 troops were carried for a total of 57 sorties. Aircraft received hits while enroute to the zone. The hits were a result of automatic fire from the vicinity of BS638388, BS826384, and BS838392. This strike marked the first helicopterborne assult on a fortified position.

6 Feb 67 - The squadron llew 298 sorties for a total of 91.2 flight hours.
One thousand and eighty troops, and 60 tons of cargo were
carried.

Operation Desoto - Forty-four point two flight hours were flown in support of this operation. One hundred and thirty-six troops and 56 tons of cargo were transported for a total of 104 sorties.

Four aircraft returned from MMAF where they flew 27.7 flight hours in support of MAG-16.

Operation Independence - While at MMAF, two aircraft participated in this operation. A total of 6 sorties were flown for a total of 2.9 flight hours.

7 Feb 67 - The squadron flew 306 sorties for a total of 113.8 flight hours. Five hundred and eighty-four troops, 90 passengers and 119 tons of cargo were carried.

Sparrow Hawk Operation - Mission H-0207-53A was launched with two HMM-165 aircraft. Three point seven flight hours were flown and 37 ARVN troops were carried.

Operation Desoto - Fifty-six point five flight hours were flown in support of this operation for a total of 152 sorties, there were 163 troops and 62 tons of cargo carried.

8 Feb 67 - The squadron flew 126 sorties for a total of 76.2 flight hours. One hundred and forty troops and 48 tons of cargo were carried.

On mission 0208-69 (routine ARVN resupply) from Quang Tin to BT328082. Three aircraft noved 11 tons of cargo.and 12 ARVN troops for a total of 20 sorties and 9.5 flight hours.

Operation Desoto - Thirteen point six hours were flown in supported of this operation for a total of 32 sorties. Twenty-five passengers and 18 tons of cargo were carried.

- 9 Feb 67 The squadron flew 194 sorties for a total of 67.5 flight hours.
 Two hundred and ninty-seven troops, 4 passengers and 75 tons of cargo were carried.
- 10 Feb 67 The squadron flew 211 sorties for a total of 75.5 flight hours. Eighty-nine passengers, 107 troops and 113 tons of cargo were carried.





Operation Desoto - Sixty point three flight hours were flown for a total of 172 sorties. One hundred and forty-three troops and 103 tons of cargo were carried.

- 12 Feb 67 Operation Desoto Eighteen point six flight hours were flown for a total of 37 sorties. Eighteen troops and 9 tons of cargo were carried.
- 13 Feb 67 The squadron flew 92 scrties for a total of 38.3 flight hours.

 Three hundred and eighty-seven troops and 11 tons of cargo were transported.

On mission H-0213-62A - Two CH-46's were assigned to transport 21 US troops from BS731377 to BS844256. On climb out from pick-up zone at 700 feet AGL, 70 kts, both aircraft received light snall arms fire. On post-flight inspection, after the completion of the mission, the lead aircraft was discovered to have received one hit. There were no injuries.

Operation Desoto - Fifteen point seven flight hours were flown for a total of 35 sorties. Twenty-seven troops and 11 tons of cargo were carried.

14 Feb 67 - The squadron flew 330 sorties for a total of 96.1 flight hours. The squadron carried 10 passengers, 452 troops and 135 tons of cargo.

Operation Desoto - Two missions were flown in support of this operation. The first utilized six aircraft and flow 145 sorties for a total of 33.4 flight hours. Fifty-six troops and 75 tons of cargo were carried.

The second mission utilized eight aircraft and flew 94 sorties for a total of 34.1 flight hours. Two hundred and ninty-one troops and 50 tons of cargo were carried.

15 Feb 67 - The squadron flew 260 sorties for a total of 79.0 flight hours.

Three hundred and eighty six troops and 139 tons of cargo were carried.

While on mission H-0215-53A (emergency troop lift) the lead aircraft received two hits at BS540890. The aircraft was in level flight 400 feet AGL and 100 kts when small arms fire was received. Mission was continued until completion. Weather was approximately 400 ft and 1 mile.

The gunner of the aircraft, received minor shrapnel wounds.

Sparrow Hawk Operation - Sparrow Hawk Operation was launched with four other squadron aircraft on mission H-0215-55A at 0745H. Two hundred and eleven ROKMC were lifted from BS634909 to BS589833, for a total of 8.6 flight hours. Fifteen KMC (KTA) and 34 KMC (WIA) were also carried.





Sparrow Hawk aircraft were launched on H-0215-53A at 1255H, for a total of 4.2 flight hours. Fifty-one US Marines were lifted from LZ Dove to BS518872, and then to BS505902. One hour later they were returned to LZ Dove.

Operation Desoto - Mission H-0214-70 and H-0215-73. Fortytwo point nine flight hours were flown in support of mission H-0214-70, for a total of 145 sorties. Twenty-nine troops and 10 tons of cargo were carried.

One point two flight hours were flown on mission H-0215-73 for a total of 4 sorties. No troops or cargo were carried.

16 Feb 67 - The squadron flew 224 sorties for a total of 68.8 flight hours. Four hundred and eighty two troops and 82 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Desoto - Thirteen aircraft were utilized in support of this operation for a total of 55.5 flight hours with 182 sorties being flown. Four hundred and seventeen troops and 66 tons of cargo were carried.

While on mission H-0216-77 (Combat strike in support of Operation Desoto) six aircraft received hits approaching and departing both landing zones. Mission was completed.

17 Feb 67 - The squadron flew 392 sorties for a total of 109.5 flight hours. Eighty-seven tons of cargo and 1828 passengers were carried.

Operation Desoto - Eighty-six sorties for a total of 28.4 flight hours were flown. One hundred and ninty-seven troops and 37 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Rio Grande - One hundred and eleven sorties were flown for a total 25.1 flight hours. Fifty troops and 8 tons of cargo were carried.

One aircraft was in drop zone when it received one small caliber hit. No serious damage was done so pilot lifted off and continued mission.

Operation Giant Dragon - One hundred and ninteen sorties were flown for a total of 40.9 flight hours. Six hundred and six troops and 12 tons of cargo were carried.

One aircraft in the flight of ten received one .30 cal round through the yellow blade while making an approach to the landing zone. Aircraft continued mission.

Operation Lien Ket 81 - Forty-five sorties were flown for a total of 14.6 flight hours. Three hundred fifty-three troops and 16 tons of cargo were carried.



Support of MAG-16 - Four aircraft returned from detechment. Two hundred and forty-two sorties were flown for a total of 73.1 flight hours. Seven hundred and thirty-three troops and 76 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Chincok - Fourteen sorties were flown for a total of 3.8 flight hours. Thirty-five troops and 4 tons of cargo were carried.

18 Feb 67 - Two hundred and nineteen sorties were flown for a total of 66.0 flight hours. Thirty-seven passengers, 275 troops and 83 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Desoto - One hundred and six sorties were flown for a total of 26.3 flight hours. Fifty-eight troops and 74 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Giant Dragon - Six sorties were flown for a total of 2.2 flight hours. One troop and 3 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Lien Ket 81 - Six sorties were flown for a total of 3.4 flight hours. Thirty troops were carried.

19 Feb 67 - One hundred and forty-six sorties were flown for a total of 64.4 flight hours. Sixty-four passengers, 100 troops and 18 tons of cargo were carried.

On mission H-0218-75 one aircraft received light small arms fire from the vicinity of BS512743 and BS528722. Aircraft was in approach to drop zone passing 500 ft and 100 kts when two hits were received. Mission was completed and aircraft returned to home field.

Operation Desoto - Sixty-eight sorties were flown for a total of 25.5 flight hours. Thirty-four troops and 10 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Rio Grande - Eighteen sorties were flown for a total of 7.8 flight hours. Twenty-seven troops and 4 tons of cargo were carried.

While flying in support of this operation one aircraft received two hits from the vicinity of BS799419. Mission was completed.

20 Feb 67 - Two hundred and thirty seven sorties were flown for a total of 92.4 flight hours. Eighty-four troops, 128 passengers and 141 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Desoto - One hundred and fourteen sorties were flown in a total of 43.8 flight hours. One hundred and thirty-four troops and 97 tons of cargo were carried.





21 Feb 67 - One hundred and soventy sorties were flown for a total of 62.7 flight hours. Ninty-seven passengers, 140 troops and 102 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Desote - Eighty-one sorties were flown for a total of 28.6 flight hours. Fifty-two troops and 79 tons of cargo were carried.

22 Feb 67 - Two hundred fifty three sorties were flown for a total of 87.2 flight hours. Thirty-seven passengers, 265 troops and 145 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Desoto - Mission H-0221-70&70A, mission H-0222-70&73. The first mission flew 215 sorties, the second, 155 sorties. A total of 139 troops and 107 tons of cargo were carried in 55.0 flight hours.

HMM-262 under the command of LtCol U. W. SHADRICK broke their previous record of hours flown in country. As of this date the Squadron surpassed the last month's mark of 1706.8 flight hours.

23 Feb 67 - Two hundred ninty-six sortles were flown for a tetal of 106.8 flight hours. Thirty-one passengers, 831 troops and 98 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Descto - One hundred and eighty-nine sorties were flown in a total of 49.6 flight hours. Three hundred and forty-six troops and 92 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Deckhouse Siz - Detachment returned from Operation Deckhouse Six where 136 serties were flown in 27.1 flight hours. Ninty-one tons of cargo and 300 troops were carried.

24 Feb 67 - One hundred thirty-eight sorties were flown for a total of 50.4 flight hours. Twenty-five passengers, 354 troops and 42 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Desoto - Two reports were sent covering this operation. The first was for 11.6 flight hours, 27 troops and 8 tons of cargo carried.

The second was for 28.4 flight hours with 79 sorties flown. Three hundred and twenty-four troops and 19 tons of cargo were carried.

25 Feb 67 - One hundred fifty-two sorties were flown for a total of 58.1 flight hours. One hundred and twenty-one passengers, 272 troops, and 81 tons of cargo were carried.





Operation Desoto - Two reports were sent covering this operation. The first had a total of 69 sorties in 17.0 flight hours. Sixty troops and 46 tons of cargo were carried.

The second reported a total of 32.9 flight hours with 86 sorties being flown. Sixty one passengers, 267 troops, and 35 tons of cargo were carried.

26 Feb 67 - At 0915H this day, the 2000th hour was logged for the month.

The aircraft was flown by Major J. W. ALBER on mission H-0226
-71, in support of the ARVN's.

This day 432 sorties were flown for a total of 177.0 flight hours. Ten passengers, 1022 troops, and 170 tons of cargo were carried. This time included late entries.

Operation Desoto - Sixty-six sorties were flown for a total of 55.9 flight hours. Four hundred and sixty-three troops and 42 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Deckhouse Six - For the period of 221600H to 251835H HMM-262 deployed two CH-46's to LPD-2 in support of their operation. One hundred and thirty-six sorties were flown in 34.9 flight hours.

- 27 Feb 67 The squadron flew 54 sorties for a total of 32.2 flight hours. Seventy-two troops and 17 tons of cargo were carried. One aircraft, while flying on mission H-0227-70,77, 79 in support of Operation Desoto/Deckhouse, received one hit from BS825384. The aircraft continued the mission.
- 28 Feb 67 One hundred sixty-eight sorties were flown for a total of 57.3 flight hours. One hundred and two passengers, 289 troops and 68 tons of cargo were carried.

Operation Deckhouse Six - Two aircraft returned from detachment aboard the LPD-2 where they flew 122 sorties for a total of 28.0 flight hours. One hundred and twenty-two troops and 59 tons of cargo were carried.

While mission H-0227-69A both aircraft received hits from the vicinity of BS799480. The crew chief of one aircraft and a passenger in the second aircraft were wounded and the aircraft returned to the ship.

THE PROFESSIONAL PRIVATE SPEAKS:

Ole Sol is with us once again! Now that the sun is here and the monscons gone, precautions should be taken to prevent the excruciating pain of a sunburn. Being we are at a higher altitude than what we are used to, the magnitude of Infra-red rays, which cause a sunburn, reaching us enhances your chance of getting a sunburn. There are several precaution-any-measures that should be taken:

- 1. Avoid over exposure to the sun's rays. Allow yourself 15 minutes per day until you have a fairly good tan started.
- 2. Always use a sunburn preventitive olntment while sun-bathing.
- 3. If you ever get a bad sunburn, don't pumper it, see a Doctor. Burns are very serious here in Vietnam.

"On behalf of the members of this command involved in the subject mission, I wish to express our deep appreciation for the courage and determination of the pilots and crews of Switch 5-6 (HMM-262) and Klondike 4-2 (VMO-6).

At about 1700, 28 December 1966 the Sparrowhawk was inserted in the vicinity of AP HAI (3) with the mission of locating the Chicken Pie reconnaissance patrol which had been without communications for 15 hours. Almost immediately upon insertion, the Sparrowhawk force comprised of 16 infantry marines and 7 reconnaissance marines began taking sniper fire. In the subsequent close combat of troops on the ground, the supporting helicopters remained in close proximity to provide suppressive fire as well as continuous communications and extraction support if required. The enemy sniper fire resulted in one Marine DOW and one WIA. Under heavy cloud cover, negligible light conditions and running dangerously low on fuel, the extraction helicopters unhesitatingly answered the call of the beleaguered unit and landed under fire in an insecure landing zone. Upon extraction several hits were scored on the helicopters as automatic weapons fire was received from an overlocking hill crest.

Through the efforts of these men, 22 marines are alive today to continue their mission. Again, please convy our appreciation to the officers and men of HMM-262 and VMO-6 for this superlative exhibition of skill and aggressiveness This letter was signed by the Commanding Officer, 1st Reconnaissance Battalion, D.
