NARRATIVE SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

HMM-262 flew a total of 1037.3 flight hours, the majority of which were in support of III MARINE DIVISION & III MAF. The squadron evacuated a total of 592 med-evacs as follows: 69 emergency, 165 priority and 358 routine.

The following is a breakdown on the work completed by the squadron during July including significant operational highlights.

OPERATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

2 JULY

Chatterbox Med-Evac launched at 1400 from Vandergrift Combat Base to pick up some emergency med-evacs for Showcase Golf-2 in the AD9463 grid. As the med-evac bird was setting down it came under intense small arms fire and was forced to make an emergency landing at A-4. Med-evac chase went into A-4 and picked up the crew and brought them back to Quang Tri. The small arms fire hit one of the gunners in the leg along with disabling the bird. The aircraft was later recovered and brought back to Quang Tri.

8 JULY

Chatterbox 93-1 and 93-2 launched at 0700 to perform resupply out of Vandergrift Combat Base. The turbulence was so bad and extreme that it created undue hazard for the aircraft and the mission was cancelled after three hours of flying.

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12 JULY

Chatterbox 93-11 & 93-12 launched to the YD195483 for a night emergency extract of the recon team Peepsight. The extract was completed and Chatterbox 93-11 was again called to extract League Leader, another recon team. Chatterbox 93-11 completed these extractions with no incidents although both teams had been in contact just prior to the extraction.

18 JULY

While Chatterbox Med-Evac was making a pickup in the YD135750 grid, it came under severe small arms fire and was forced to land at A-4 for repairs. The oil line was replaced to the aft transmission and the aircraft was flown back to Quang Tri. No injury to personnel was incurred.

31 JULY

Chatterbox Med-Evac and chase launched on an emergency med-evac in the YD065684. Mortars had been received in the zone prior to the attempted med-evac. Seaworthy guns worked the area over and the med-evac decided to attempt going in. Once in the zone the casualties were taken aboard and med-evac lifted out. At about 75 feet, a RPG round struck the aircraft causing severe damage to the controls and the aircraft. The aircraft was landed near the ground unit and the med-evacs aboard were removed along with the injured crew members. One gunner was killed, another was severely wounded resulting in the loss of his right arm. The Crew Chief received shrapnel wounds in and about the eyes resulting in the possible loss of sight in one eye. The corpsman had minor facial lacerations and both the pilot and co-pilot received some shrapnel wounds in the arms. The crew stayed the rest of the night with the ground unit and was evacuated the next morning.

6. Intelligence

The month of July showed a continued marked decrease in enemy anti-aircraft fire incidents. The reporting period (1-31 July 1969) consisted of a slight increase in sorties accompanied by only half the fire-incidents total of the previous month (1-20 June 1969).

The areas receiving the largest volume of fire incidents were:

(1) Helicopter Valley area - YD0666-0662-1062-1066 (This includes the same threat area for the previous two months. This month 3-SA and 9-AW incidents occurred in this area)

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## (2) Leatherneck Square

a. West of Con Thien YD0570-0567-1170-1167 (This threat area is new and included 4-50 Cal., 6-AW, 3-SA and 2-RPG incidents)

b. Northeast of Con Thien YD1375-1371-1571-1575 (This threat area included 2-50 Cal., 5-AW, and 1-SA incident.

(3) Along Route #9 XD8741-8535-9141-9239-8531 (This threat area included 6-AW and 4-SA incidents. Pattern indicates that an enemy unit moved from West to East along Route #9 between the 20 July 1969 and 22 July 1969).

(4) Song Gam River area North XD8467-8462-9662-9667 (This threat area, three months of continuous anti-aircraft incidents, including during July 1969, 12-AW, 3-50 Cal., 2-SA and 2-Mortar incidents).

## Threat Areas Dropped:

(1) Utah Mesa area along Route #9 XD7740-7734-8634-8640.

(2) Along the Da Krong River YD0137-0135-0335-0337.

There was a total of 9 fire incidents resulting in 3 aircraft receiving battle damage and a total of 18 hits. There was a total of three aircraft forced to land, resulting in one strike aircraft and 7 casualties (1 KIA, 6 WIA). Total July fire incidents consisted of the following types of fire:

The S-2 presented a weekly summary four times this month, this briefing is an overall operational summary of the weeks intelligence, and prediction for the upcoming week based on analysis of enemy activity. This briefing has become a part of the weekly AOM's held by the squadron commander.

A total of three gunners schools were completed and 53 hours of intelligence training was accomplished. There was a total of 4 SERE classes held, with all new crew members attending.

## Significant events during the reporting period were:

- (1) On 31 July 1969, enemy antiair activity against one of our aircraft included a co-ordinated attack by fire (60MM Mort against the HL2 YD065684 and RPG-2 against the aircraft).

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The enemy was situated in a bomb-crater outside the HLZ and the mortar was located beyond this crater. The mortar pinned down the HLZ, so that it was impossible for the aircraft to return to the HLZ, while the RPG fire concentrated on the aircraft leaving the zone.
