NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the period 1-17 January, 1969, the squadron was engaged in deployment to WestPac. The advance party arrived early in the month and immediately began making preparations for the arrival of the main portion of the squadron. All squadron aircraft and equipment left CCNUS late in December and arrived in Danang at the Deep Water Fier in mid January. The small detatchment of officers and men that had accompanied the aircraft and equipment on the trans-pacific voyage, together with the advance party did a yeoman's job in moving all squadron cargo, vehicles, and aircraft from the Deep Water Pier, at the base of Monkey Mountain, to Marble Mountain Air Facility, a distance of over 5 miles. This job was finished in slightly over 8 hours. The main body of squadron personal began to arrive at Marble Mountain on the 17th of January. Due to the deployment no flight operations were conducted during this period.





- 1. Daily Summary of Events
- 18 January 1969 HMM-263 transferred from MAG-56, CONUS to MAG-16, Marble Mountain, Republic of Victorian.
- 19-22 January 1969 No flight operations or significant events this poriod.
- 23 January 1969 HMM-263 Mew 46 sorties for 20.6 flight hours, lifting 317 troops/passengers and 8.5 tons of cargo, in support of the following Operation and units: TAYLOR COMMON, 1st MARCIV, III MAF and HMM-263.
- 24 January 1969 HNM-263 flew 27 sorbles for 9.7 Might hours, lifting 79 troops/passengers and 5.5 tons of cargo, in support of Operation TAYLOR COMMON, 1st MARDIV, III MAF and HMM-263.
- 25 January 1969 HMM-263 flew 64 sorties for 21.7 flight hours, lifting 124 troops/passengers and 12.8 tons of cargo, in support of Operation TAYLOR COMMON, 1st MARDIV, III MAF and HMM-263. One fire incident was reported at ZCO79432.
- 26 January 1969 HWM-263 flew 103 sorties for 31.1 flight hours, lifting 34 troops/passengers and 23.2 tons of cargo. One Emergency, 27 Priority and 1 Routine med-evacs were also flown in support of Operation TAYLOR COMMON, lst MARDIV, III MAF and HMM-263.
- 27 January 1969 HMM-263 flew 179 sorties for 56,9 flight hours,
 lifting 368 troops/passengers and 37.1 tons of cargo.
 One Emergency, 2 Priority and 1 Routine med-evacs were performed in support of Operation TAYLOR COMMON,
 lst MARDIV, III MAF and HMM-263.
- 28 January 1969 HMM-263 flew 380 sorties, for 111.3 flight hours, lifting 830 troops/passengers and 51.1 tons of cargo. Eight Emergency, 3 Priority and 10 Routine med-evacs were flown in support of Operation TAYLOR COMMON, lst MARDIV, III MAF and HMM-263.
- 29 January 1969 HMM-263 flew 206 sorties for 62.9 flight hours, lifting 770 troops/passengers and 27.0 tono of cargo. One Emergency, 2 Priority and 3 Routine med-evacs



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were flown in support of Operation TAYLOR COMMON, 1st MARDIV, 131 MAF and HMM-263. Two fire incidents were reported with EG-5 receiving 4 hits and EG-21 receiving 5 hits and 1 WIA.

30 January 1969

HMM-263 flew 66 sorties for 22.4 flight hours, lifting 153 troops/passengers and 3.1 tons of cargo with 2 Emergency and 2 Priority med-evacs also flown in support of Operation TAYLOR COMMON, 1st MARDIV, III MAF and HMM-263.

31 January 1969

HMM-263 flew 160 sorties for 52.0 flight hours, lifting 266 troops/passengers and 31.9 tens of cargo plus 5 Emergency, 2 Priority and 3 Routine medevacs were flown in support of Operation TAYLOR COMMON, 1st MARDIV, III MAF and HMM-263. Two fire incidents were reported with EG-23 receiving 2 hits and EG-22 receiving 1 hit.

2. HMM-263 flew a total of 1,231 sorties, 405.9 flight hours, lifting 2,941 troops/passengers and 201.0 tons of cargo with an average aircraft availability of 9 aircraft for the period.



4. INTELLIGENCE
