

#### NARRATIVE SUMMARY

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- 1. Daily Summary of Events. The following as flown in support of III MAF, 1st MarDiv, ROKMC, OPERATION FIRESTONE CANYON, and OPERATION VICTORY DRAGON.
- 1 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 101 sorties for 28.9 flight hours, lifting 9.1 tons of cargo and carrying 11.7 troops/passengers. Eight medevac missions were flown evacuating 3 emergency, 7 priority, and 6 routins casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 2 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 7 sorties for 2.9 flight hours, lifting 0 tons of cargo and carrying 2 troops/passengers. One medevac mission was flown, evacuating 1 emergency casualty. No fire incidents were reported.
- 3 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 212 sorties for 58.5 flight hours, lifting 19.2 tons of cargo and carrying 546 troops/passengers. Ten medevac missions were flown evacuating 2 emergency, 16 priority, and 10 routine casualties. 3 fire incidents were reported with 4 hits and negative injuries. 300 rounds of .50 cal were expended.
- 4 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 112 sorties for 32.9 flight hours, lifting 1.6 tons of cargo and carrying 84 troops/passengers. Twenty-seven medevac missions were flown evacuating 8 emergency, 29 priority, and 29 routine casualties. One fire incident was reported with 1 hit and negative injuries.
- 5 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 92 sorties for 18.2 flight hours, lifting 2.0 tons of cargo and carrying 63 troops/passengers. Six medevac missions were flown evacuating 2 emergency, 4 priority, and 5 routine casualties. One fire incident was reported with negative hits or injuries.
- 6 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 31 sorties for 11.0 flight hours, lifting 0 tons of cargo and carrying h troops/passengers. Six medevac missions were flown evacuating 3 emergency, h priority, and 5 routine casualties. One fire incident was reported with negative hits or injuries.

- 7 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 92 sorties for 31.7 flight hours, lifting 15.5 tons of cargo and carrying 202 troops/passengers. Eight medevac missions were flown evacuating 1 emergency, 30 priority, and 26 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 8 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 133 sorties for 30.2 flight hours, lifting 8.8 tons of cargo and carrying 608 troops/passengers. Five medevac missions were flown evacuating 1 emergency, 7 priority, and 8 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 9 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 103 sorties for 30.0 flight hours, lifting 7.0 tons of cargo and carrying llul troops/passengers. Twelve medevac missions were flown evacuating 10 emergency, 12 priority, and 4 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 10 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 193 sorties for 53.2 flight hours, lifting 20.7 tons of cargo and carrying 728 troops/passengers. Thirteen medevac missions were flown evacuating 4 emergency, 21 priority, and 42 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 11 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 173 sorties for 50.4 flight hours, lifting 21.1 tons of cargo and carrying 335 troops/passengers. Two medevac missions were flown evacuating 3 priority casualties. No fire incidents were reported. 1000 rounds of 50 cal were expended.
- 12 October 1969 (C) RMM-263 flew 155 sorties for 36.7 flight hours,
  lifting 9.6 tons of cargo and carrying 353 troops/
  passengers. Two medevac missions were flown
  evacuating 23 priority casualties. One fire
  incident was reported with negative hits or injuries.
  200 rounds of .50 cal were expended.
- 13 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 171 sorties for 52.0 flight hours, lifting 30.5 tons of cargo and carrying 465 troops/passengers. Eight medevac missions were flown evacuating 2 emergency, 7 priority, and 5 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported. 450 rounds of .50 cal were expended.
- 14 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 160 sorties for 50.1 flight hours, lifting 2.9 tons of cargo and carrying 301 troops/passengers. Seventeen medevac missions were flown evacuating 3 emergency, 9 priority, and 62 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.



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- 15 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 190 sorties for 52.0 flight hours, lifting 18.5 tons of cargo and carrying 361 troops/passengers. Nine medevac missions were flown evacuating 1 emergency, 25 priority, and 7 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 16 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flow 218 scrties for 57.4 flight hours,
  lifting 12.9 tons of cargo and carrying 553 troops/
  passengers. Nineteen medevac missions were flown
  evacuating 26 emergency, 19 priority, and 43 routine
  casualties. One fire incident was reported with
  negative hits or injuries.
- 17 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 110 sorties for 27.0 flight hours, lifting 2.5 tons of cargo and carrying 150 troops/passengers. Five medavac missions were flown evacuating 3 emergency, 6 priority, and 1 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 18 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 294 sorties for 64.1 flight hours, lifting 15.7 tons of cargo and carrying 1208 troops/ passengers. Five medevac missions were flown evacuating 6 emergency, and 3 priority casualties. One fire incident was reported with 1 hit and negative injuries.
- 19 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 164 sorties for 66.1 flight hours, lifting 23.5 tons of cargo and carrying 263 troops/passengers. Thirteen medevac missions were flown evacuating 5 emergency, 1 priority, and 40 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 20 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 179 sorties for 49.9 flight hours, lifting 3.5 tons of cargo and carrying 479 troops/passengers. Six medevac missions were flown evacuating 7 emergency, 12 priority, and 2 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 21 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flow 124 sorties for 29.7 flight hours, lifting 19.0 tons of cargo and carrying 297 troops/passengers. Eighteen medevac missions were flown evacuating 19 emergency, 21 priority, and 4 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.



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- 22 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 131 sorties for 37.9 flight hours, lifting 2.5 tons of cargo and carrying 95 troops/ passengers. Seventeen medevac missions were flown evacuating 12 emergency, 15 pricrity, and 50 routine casualties. One fire incident was reported with negative hits or injuries. 350 rounds of .50 cal were expended.
- 23 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 134 sorties for 54.8 flight hours. lifting 11.9 tons of cargo and carrying 229 troops/ passengers. Ten medevac missions were flown The page light of the evacuating 3 emergency, 8 priority, and 14 routine casualties. Wo fire incidents were reported.
  - 24 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 138 sorties for 35.5 flight hours, lifting 1.2 tons of cargo and carrying 206 troops/ passengers. Seventeen medevac missions were flown evacuating 10 emergency, 11 priority, and 29 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
  - 25 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 214 sorties for 53.2 flight hours, lifting 22.3 tons of cargo and carrying 1014 troops/ passengers. Five medevac missions were flown evacuating 3 emergency, and 7 priority casualties. One fire incident was reported with negative hits or injuries.

  - 27 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 125 sorties for 34.4 flight hours, lifting 2.2 tons of cargo and carrying 321 troops/ passengers. Twelve medevac missions were flown evacuating 3 emergency, 41 priority, and 9 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
  - 28 October 1969 (C) HM-263 flew 97 sorties for 31.1 flight hours, lifting 1.5 tons of cargo and carrying 251 troops/ passengers. Two medevac missions were flown evacuating 1 emergency and 1 priority casualty. No fire incidents were reported.

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- 29 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 41 sorties for 19.5 flight hours, lifting 0.0 tons of cargo and carrying 127 troops/passengers. Thirteen medevac missions were flown evacuating 17 emergency, 47 priority, and 24 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.
- 30 October 1969 (C) HMM-263 flew 56 sorties for 19.0 flight hours, lifting 0.0 tons of cargo and carrying 28 troops/passengers. Six medevac missions were flown evacuating 4 emergency, 10 priority, and 1 routine casualties. No fire incidents were reported.

#### L. INTELLIGENCE



Through spot reports, fire incident reports, and other pilot debriefing forms, intelligence information was passed to MAG-16 for dissemination to higher, lower, and adjacent units.
- b, MAG-16 came under a mortar attack on 21 October 1969 at 0240. 6 incoming rounds impacted in the HMM-263 area. 3 aircraft were damaged.
- c. HM-263 was involved in 3 strikes during this period. Separate briefs were given to pilots and aircrews.
- d. To provide continued up-to-date intelligence, the Intelligence Section conducted briggs at ACM's and on recon missions.
- e. 5 officers and 2 enlisted attended Jungle Escape and Survival Training at NAS Cubi Point, R. P.
