

PART TWO

From 1 January to 31 January, VMFA-314 conducted air operations out of MCAS Chu Lai, Vietnam. No aircraft were lost during this reporting period.

PART THREE1. Personnel/Administration

During this reporting period VMFA-314 joined 5 officers and transferred 2. A total of 7 enlisted were joined and 5 were transferred.

Three enlisted were promoted in January, the breakdown is as follows: 1 to Private First Class, 2 to Gunnery Sergeant.

2. Awards

Aircrew members of VMFA-314 were awarded 34 air medals.

3. Casualties

No combat casualties occurred this month.

4. Air Operations

The squadron flew 457 sorties and 590.9 flight hours during the month of January.

Squadron efforts during this month were devoted to accomplishing assigned combat missions and toward the indoctrination of newly assigned aircrews.

Four aircraft received light damage as a result of enemy ground fire during bombing missions.

Total ordnance expended during January was 826.8 Tons.

5. Schools

Two aircrew members attended jungle survival school at Naval Air Station Cubi Point and one aircrew member attended the PACAF Survival School at Clark Air Force Base during January.

6. Aircraft Maintenance

During the month of January, 16 aircraft were assigned to this command, with 1 enroute to PAR at Atsugi, Japan. Two aircraft were picked up, one from PAR at Atsugi, Japan and one from Combat Operational Support Aircraft pool at Atsugi, Japan.
