PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of May, Marine Fighter/Attack Squadron 314 continued to direct its efforts toward air to ground ordnance delivery. Operations Gold Lemon 14, Mameluke, Kentucky II, Britah, Houston, Allen Brook, Scotland II, Lancaster II, Kimchi Hawk, Carentan II, Gunsmoke 14, Vesper Belts 14G, Nevada Eagle, Delaware, High Rise, Cossack 14, Napoleon Saline Burlington Trail, and Pueblo were supported, with special emphasis on operation Houston. Included in this support were elements of the U. S. Army, Republic of Korea, and ARVN forces.

The squadron assumed the air to ground hot pad from 1 to 4 May and from 18 to 25 May. The air to air was assumed during the weeks of 4 to 11 May and 25 to 31 May. No BARCAP missions were flown.

696 combat sorties were flown for a total of 754.5 combat hours. Thus Marine Fighter/Attack Squadron 314 led Marine Aircraft Group 13 in combat sorties flown for the fifth consecutive month. Pilots averaged 54 missions and Naval Flight Officers 43.

The squadron accounted for 81 KBMA, 233 structures destroyed, 110 structures damaged, 166 bunkers destroyed, 42 bunkers damaged, 12 anti-aircraft positions destroyed, 1740 meters of trenchline destroyed or damaged, 250 meters of hedgerow destroyed, 31 secondary fires, 6 secondary explosions, 18 rockets and two launchers destroyed, 17 fighting holes destroyed, 6 boats destroyed, 6 automatic weapons positions and four mortar positions destroyed, 3 .50 caliber positions destroyed, and 1 truck destroyed. 25% of the squadron missions were TPQ-10 missions and no EDA was available.

Aircraft availability during May contributed materially to the squadron's accomplishments. 18 aircraft were assigned during May, and a daily availability of 11 aircraft was maintained.

On 1 May 1968, Capt. D. C. EVANS and 1stLt. I. F. HUNSAKER were shot down and ejected safely. The rocket attack of 14 May killed Cpl. J. A. BAKER and L/Cpl. M. R. NIEMI while 4 serious and 6 minor wounds were reported.

Major G. E. WALSH and 1stLt. M. M. JOHNSON, exceeded 300 missions during May. Completing 200 missions were LtCol. R. H. SCHULTZ, Major M. W. MEREDITH, Capt. G. E. FRANKLIN, Capt. K. D. EDELEN, and 1stLt. R. J. RIORDAN. Capt. M. F. WALSH, Capt. E. J. SMITH, Capt. G. H. ROBINSON, and 1stLt. L. S. LARSON passed the 100 mission mark.

PART IIISEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

A. PERSONNEL ADMINISTRATION. During this period VMFA-314 joined 5 officers and transferred 2. 21 enlisted men were joined and 11 transferred, including 3 Medevacs that were dropped from the rolls.

B. CASUALTIES. Capt. D. C. EVANS suffered second degree burns of the left hand and neck and 1stLt. I. F. HUNSAKER suffered a strained neck due to the ejection from VW-6 on 1 May. The rocket attack of 14 May resulted in the deaths of Cpl. J. A. BAKER, and L/Cpl M. R. NIEMI and the wounding of Sgt. J. M. HESS, Cpl M. L. HALE, H. R. ANDERSON, J. S. CACACE, J. D. COX, B. D. KING, and J. A. SHIPEK, L/Cpls S. R. LAURENCE and R. D. JACKSON, and P. F. C. J. L. RUSSELL.
