

4. Important Visitors to the Command. NonePART II - Narrative Summary

October commenced the third month of combat operations for the squadron on its present and third tour in Vietnam. Although weather conditions were generally mixed during the period, the squadron continued the accelerated pace begun in mid-September, throughout October, flying 656 combat sorties, 767.8 combat hours, and setting what is believed to be a record of ordnance delivered for the F-4B of 1482.9 tons. These achievements were accomplished however at the cost of two aircraft shot down by North Vietnamese groundfire with two crewmembers missing-in-action, presumed captured, and one crewmember wounded-in-action, the highest losses the squadron has suffered yet in the war.

During October, the bulk of combat operations flown were close air support missions in support of virtually all ground operations in the I Corps Tactical Zone with emphasis in the DMZ area plus a large number of TALLY-HO strikes against interdiction targets and artillery positions in the panhandle area of North Vietnam. In addition to these, during bad weather a number of sorties were diverted to TPQ-10 radar directed bombing missions. Finally, a small number of helicopter escort, landing zone preparations, practice air alert scrambles and RESCAP missions, were also flown.

On 13 October, the squadron was shocked and saddened by the loss of its commanding officer, Lieutenant Colonel Edison W. MILLER and his RIO, 1st Lieutenant James H. WARNER. LtCol MILLER was leading a direct air support mission near the DMZ, when his flight was diverted up into the TALLY-HO area to attack two large tracked vehicles. Pulling off

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from his first pass which accounted for the two vehicles destroyed, five enemy killed (confirmed) and 15 more (probable), LtCol MILLER's aircraft was hit by at least one 37mm anti-aircraft artillery round. He reported that he was hit and unable to control his aircraft, and this was followed by ejection of the two crewmembers near a village one and half miles southwest of Cape Mui Lay. LtCol MILLER's parachute was observed to go into a treeline alongside the village, but nothing more was heard from him. Lt WARNER landed near a gully just south of the village, and reported on his URT-10 emergency radio that he was alright and gave directions to mark his position. However, almost immediately thereafter, three North Vietnamese soldiers with rifles were observed to approach Lt WARNER who was made to roll up his parachute and then was marched off toward the village. Both crewmembers have been declared missing-in-action, presumed captured.

On the evening of 13 October, at an All-Officers-Meeting in the ready room, Colonel E. N. LEFAIVRE appointed the Executive Officer, LtCol H. T. HAGAMAN to succeed LtCol MILLER as Commanding Officer. The losses of LtCol MILLER and Lt WARNER were keenly felt throughout the squadron, and efforts were redoubled which resulted in an ordnance record.

On 29 October, during a close air support mission immediately north of Con Thien, an aircraft flown by Major D. I. CARROLL and Captain J. J. HARE took at least three rounds of heavy automatic weapons fire in the wing and fuel system. The aircraft began losing fuel, and the crew were finally forced to eject overwater near Danang when the aircraft flamed out. Captain HARE sustained moderate injuries during ejection.

Some highlight missions flown during October were:

On 13 October, Captains QUILTER, O'MARA, JENSON and STIMLER attacked a force of Viet Cong, 20 miles west of Hue/Phu Bai, killing ten (confirmed) and five (probable), receiving intense small arms fire in the process.

On 22 October, Major LASSETER (RIO - Capt HARE) led a direct air support mission with Major BOOZMAN (RIO - Lt DAVIS) in support of Operation KINGFISHER south of Con Thien and accounted for 15 bunkers destroyed and 20 enemy killed by air (probable).

On 26 October, Captain LUHMANN (RIO - Capt NORTHLICH) with Captain LEIGH (RIO - Capt REYNOLDS) destroyed 15 military structures, five bunkers and received three secondaries on a direct air support mission.

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5. Maintenance. During October, the 14th aircraft since the return to Vietnam on 15 August 1967 entered Calendar Check. The squadron has averaged 5.6 aircraft checks per month since then. This naturally posed a great challenge to Maintenance to not only complete these checks in the minimum possible time, but also to support a full combat flight schedule. By dint of long hours and enthusiastic response from personnel in all Maintenance departments, this was accomplished with an average of over 21 combat sorties per day working with only 12 aircraft on board.
