

a. General Leonard F. CHAPMAN Jr., Commandant of the Marine Corps, visited Marine Aircraft Group Thirteen on 7 Jan 1968 and viewed the operating areas of all squadrons including VMFA-323.

PART II - Narrative Summary

The month of January was the sixth month of combat operations for the squadron on its present tour in the Republic of Vietnam. Weather conditions were unexpectedly good for the month of January as the appearance of the dreaded monsoon was virtually non-existent. The squadron flew 513 combat sorties during this period, which is an increase of 85 sorties over the previous month. Combat hours flown totaled 546.0. The squadron flew a total of 524 sorties, 580.6 flight hours, and expended 1178.61 tons of ordnance during this reporting period.

Close Air Support and Direct Air Support missions were flown in support of all Marine ground operations in the I Corps Tactical Zone (ICTZ) including operations Kentucky, west of Dong Ha; Lancaster, west of Dong Ha; Oseola, southeast of Dong Ha; Scotland, in the Khe Sanh area, and Neosho, northwest of Hue-Phu Bai. VMFA-323 supported the Americal Division in operations Muscatine and Wheeler/Wallowa in the ICTZ.

Tally-Ho strikes in North Vietnam and Steel Tiger interdiction strikes in Laos, along the Ho-Chi-Minh Trail, were deemphasized during January because of the increased tempo of Communist activity in I Corps.

The squadron flew a few sorties in support of recon team extractions and insertions, helicopter escort, landing zone preps, and visual reconnaissance missions. Night TPQ-10 radar directed bombing missions increased during January due to low cloud cover in late evening and early morning hours particularly in the Khe Sanh area. The Air-to-Ground pad had great success the week of 20-27 January launching 80 sorties, mostly in support of Operation Scotland. Air-to-Air pad activity was sporadic due to the up and down status of Da Nang's primary pad. Most Air-to-Air scrambles were for practice with new and inexperienced RIO's in order to gain more Air-to-Air Intercept training.

Enemy opposition increased to fever pitch with the new "Spring Offensive". The month of January saw baptism under fire for many of the "Snake" crews. Ten Aircraft sustained battle damage; 9 of which were hit incidents recorded as "echo" damage, and one being "alpha". The alpha damaged aircraft was an accident due to direct enemy action on 22 January 1968. (See Highlight Missions below.)

During January there has been a large officer turn over and re-shuffling of collateral duties. FAC commitments and staff jobs have taken a good bite into our experienced Pilots and RIO's. Seven officers were transferred and three joined; however, two officers were killed in action during a rocket/mortar attack on Chu Lai in the early morning hours on 31 January. The enlisted numbers continued to deteriorate with 40 transfers and only 27 personnel joined.

At 0400 on 31 January this command was subjected to an intense rocket and mortar attack with devastating results. The MAG-13 area received some 48 rounds of 122MM rocket fire of unbelievable accuracy. One rocket impacted directly on one of the bunkers killing three of the seven occupants. Capt Arthur J. DELAHOUESSAYE was killed immediately and 1st Lt Richard A. KERR died after a tremendous effort to save his life aboard the USS Sanctuary hospital ship where he had been med-evacued. The other officer killed was Lt(MC) LEWIS USN of VMFA-314. The remaining occupants sustained minor to severe injury. Captain Daniel J. SULLIVAN Jr. of VMFA-323 escaped with a minor ear laceration and was flying again the next day. The acts of heroism and calm clear headed thinking of both officer and enlisted personnel of this command during this attack will be long remembered by everyone assigned to VMFA-323. Aircraft damage was amazingly slight considering the terrific pounding the entire MAG-13 flight line received. Two 323 aircraft had slight skin damage and were both repaired in a few days. Extensive damage was done to the 323 hangar and officers hut area. The huts were quickly repaired and the hangar and revetment area was cleared up in record time. Flight operations commenced again on the afternoon of 31 January.

Some of the highlight missions flown during January were:

18 January: Major BOOZMAN (RIO 1/Lt KERR, WM Major TAYLOR/Capt STIMLER) destroyed 7 bunkers and had 4 KBA's confirmed.

22 January: LtCol HAGAMAN (RIO Capt BRANDON, WM Major TAYLOR/Capt DRAGE). LtCol HAGAMAN's flight was diverted to a target south of Khe Sanh suspected to be an active enemy artillery site. On the first run, when not cleared to drop his ordnance, Col HAGAMAN was pulling off target when he was severely hit by a round of unknown caliber.

The aircraft immediately began to tumble in an upward moment and was completely engulfed in flames. He and Capt BRANDON ejected immediately, however, no one observed their chutes. They were subsequently picked up by helicopters that were in the immediate vicinity and transported to Khe Sahn. The aircrew arrived back at 323 the same evening via a circuitous route through Wing Headquarters. Both LtCol HAGAMAN and Capt BRANDON received minor injuries in their ejection and rescue but are hail, hearty and flying again. God bless Martin-Baker and the invention of the helicopter.

22 January: Capt CONLON (RIO 1/Lt PAWLOSKI, WM Capt LYMAN/Lt BARRON) scrambled from the hot pad to a target in close proximity to troops. Both aircrews destroyed two bunkers with pin point accuracy within 50 meters of a friendly recon team allowing the team to break contact and move to a better area for extraction. Well Done !!

23 January: Major BOOZMAN (RIO 1/Lt KERR, WM Capt SULLIVAN/Capt DRISCOLL) destroyed 15 enemy bunkers under intense ground fire.

24 January: Major FERDINAND (RIO Capt DRISCOLL, WM Capt CONLON/Capt NORTHLICH) scrambled from the hot pad on a priority target and received the following BDA: 1 KBA, 16 Secondary Explosions, and 30 meters of Trenchline destroyed.
