# 4. Important Visitors to the Command

a. There were no important visitors to the Command during the month of February.

## PART II - Narrative Summary

The month of February was the seventh month of combat operations for the squadron on its present tour of duty in the Republic of Vietnam. Weather conditions in Southern I Corps were very good considering it was a monsoon month. Squadron combat sorties were restricted mostly by target weather in Northern I Corps which was very poor most of the month. The squadron flew 356 combat sorties during this period. Combat hours flown totaled 383.3. The squadron flew a total of 358 sorties, 387.8 hours, and expended 704.3 tons of ordnance during the month of February.

Close Air Support, Direct Air Support, and TPQ missions were flown in support of all Marine ground operations in the I Corps Tactical Zone (ICTZ) including operations Kentucky, Lancaster, Scotland, Neosho, Khe Sanh, and two new operations: Houston, near Phu Loc; and Tampa, west of Danang. The predominance of ordnance and sorties went to the Khe Sanh area due to the massive NVA/VC build up in that area. Steel Tiger missions were deemphasized in favor of in-country sorties.

January went out with a real bang and February was more or less a recover and regroup period. Aircraft availability and sortic rate decreased for many reasons.

This squadron spent two weeks on a six plane air-to-ground hot pad. The entire aircraft availability and maintenance effort was needed to support such a responsibility. Some outstanding strikes were flown during this period and will be enumerated below. Due to the concerted effort applied to Khe Sanh, BarCap missions were cancelled more than flown, although VMFA-115 was supported with back-up aircraft for one week.

The air-to-air pad activity was very limited due to the sporadic up and down status of Danang's primary pad. Our pad was launched only twice during the week. Night and day TPQ-10 radar bombing missions were prevalent during this period due to reduced ceiling and visibility in Northern I Corps. The increased Communist activity around Khe Sanh introduced more anti-aircraft weapons and firing incidents resulted in fine aircraft sustaining battle damage.

Two of the mime aircraft sustaining battle damage this month required many man hours and extensive repair work to become operational. Aircraft availability received a shot in the arm with the receipt of four aircraft transferred from other squadrons and the loss of only one aircraft; transferred to VMFA-542 in Iwakuni, Japan. No aircraft were sent to PAR or the modification programs this month.

There has been a constant threat of attack since the spring offensive began in late January. Squadron morale and a "can do" spirit is evident in the effort exerted by all hands in their primary duties and in extracurricular activities such as bunker building, guard duty, and the myriad of tasks to be performed in a combat zone. The three rocket attacks during this period have had a profound effect on the no longer complacent attitudes of all personnel. Protective battle dress is worn to and from work spaces during hours of darkness and an excellent state of readiness prevails throughout the squadron.

Several officers and men have been transferred to this squadron from VMFA-122 on a reciprocal basis to alleviate a simultaneous rotation of that squadron's personnel in the same month.

Some of the highlight missions flown during February were:

8 February: LtCol HAGAMAN (RIO Capt BRANDON, WM Capt O'MARA/1/Lt PAWLOSKI) flew a Tally-Ho mission in the DMZ and received a BDA of multiple structures destroyed with 7 KBA confirmed.

lk February: Major BOOZMAN(RIO 1/Lt BARRON, WM Major TAYLOR/Capt HIGBEE) was scrambled from the hot pad on a mission to Khe Sanh where they subsequently received a BDA of 3 anti-aircraft positions destroyed and 7 KBA confirmed.

14 February: Major FERDINAND(RIO Capt BRANDON) scrambled from the pad to Danang and their BDA was 35 KBA confirmed.

15 February: LtCol HAGAMAN (RIO Capt BRANDON, WM Capt LEIGH/1/Lt BARRON) was scrambled from the hot pad to the Danang area which resulted in 16 KBA confirmed.

15 February: Major BAILEY(RIO Capt MARZIOLI, WM Capt PATRICK/1/Lt SAN DERS) scrambled from the hot pad to work in very close proximity to friendlies in the Danang area. The resultant BDA was 31 enemy KBA confirmed.
