PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

For the month of March as well as the month of February 1971, HMH-463's flight operations went hand in hand with those of Operation Lam Son 719. As the ARVN thrust into Laos wound down, the squadron's flight operations decreased proportionately. On 11 March 1971 and thereafter, the squadron concentrated on performing only heavy lifts, as opposed to full resupply, for the 1st ARVN Division. A total of 6806 sorties and 332 tasks were flown in 872.0 hours. Payload for the month was 167.6 tons internal cargo,

3392.8 tons of external cargo and 9058 passengers (4380 U.S., 3890 ROK Marines, and 788 ARVNs).

During the early part of March 1971, a day's work for the pilots and crews assigned to Lam Son 719 consisted of braving nearly constant mortar fire, sporadic machine gun fire, and occasional flak. Many individuals from the squadron distinguished themselves as ton after ton of critically needed supplies were delivered to beleaguered ARVN and South Vietnamese Marine forces. For the entire month, the squadron demonstrated the versatility of the CH=53 and the skill of its pilots and crews while carrying heavy loads, such as 155mm howitzers and D=4 bulldozers in support of Lam Son 719. Also carried were strike troops, administrative passengers, downed tactical aircraft, and resupply cargo in Quang Nam Province, RVN.

As Operation Lam Son 719 neared completion, HMH-463 played a major role in the redeployment of the ARVN troops, supplies, and equipment. Again the squadron demonstrated its versatility and flexibility as it carried sundry loads, varying from bulldozers and howitzers, through ammunition and general cargo, to troops. The squadron was also assigned the task of redeploying the Marine ASRT units from Khe Sanh airfield.

During the final week of the month, the squadron participated in night flare drop missions in cooperation with HML=167 and HML=367. HMH=463 provided the illumination, playing a significant role in reducing the enemy's capability of launching a rocket or mortar attack against the Danang complex.

The squadron recovered 10 tactical aircraft during the month, 4 of which were administrative and 6 of which were in the field.

HMH-463 participated in 2 strikes with a total of 3 aircraft taking part, and two troop extracts with a total of 5 aircraft taking part. One of these extracts was from an insecure area, with the USMC infantry taking heavy mortar and automatic weapons fire during the final phases of the extract.
