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PART II - NARRATIVE

During the period covered by this report, 1 Jan 72 - 30 Jun 72, Marine All Weather Attack Squadron 533 flew 790 sorties, accounting for 2300.9 accident free flight hours. This brings the squadron total since the beginning of the fiscal year to 3,878.2 accident free hours and qualifies the squadron for the CNO Aviation Safety Award. In compiling this record of accident free flight time, squadron aircraft flew training missions over Japan, Okinawa, Korea, and the Philippines. These missions were flown to maintain the Command's status as the only combat ready A-6A unit in the Western Pacific. In addition to these training flights the squadron flew in support of such commitments as "Operation Golden Dragon". The main theme for this entire period was one of intransigence caused by the squadron's ever changing status, the massive turnover of personnel and material that was experienced and the period of uncertainty surrounding the squadron's anticipated deployment to S. E. Asia.

The first portion of the reporting period began with the squadron amassing a total of 377.8 flight hours during the month of January, the highest since 1969, and attaining an operational ready time of 70.6% and a full system availability of 32.5% for the month. These figures were the highest ever recorded until that time. This record breaking start, however, was only an indication of things to come. The high for the reporting period followed on the heels of this initial success in February when the Hawks flew 400.6 hours, the highest on record, and maintained an operational ready time of 80.8% and a full system availability of 43%. This amount of flight time for an A-6 squadron equates very closely to an 800 hour month for an A-4 squadron and establishes a lasting precedent for peace time aircraft utilization and amounts to 40 hours per aircraft for the 10 A-6A's assigned. Also during the month of February the squadron launched 9 of it's 10 aircraft to Naha, Okinawa while participating in a NOREX. All aircraft remained operationally ready throughout the exercise and were flown back to Iwakuni in a 9 plane formation. In February the Hawks received three "Well Done's" for their superior performance during the month of January; from CG, FMFPac, CG, 1st MAW and CGO, MAG-12.

The middle portion of the reporting period (March and April) was only slightly less impressive than the first period. During the month of March the squadron received "Well Done's" from COMFAIRWEST PAC for assistance rendered to the two Trans-Pac crews; and from CG, 1st MAW for the squadron's "Superior Appearance" on the CG's personnel inspection. During this period 26 enlisted technicians and 2 flight crews were transferred TAD to VMA(AW)-224 to augment their West Pac Cruise aboard the USS Coral Sea. Even so, the squadron flew 373.6 hours and maintained an operational ready time of 66.6% with 30.9% full system availability. The month of April brought "Golden Dragon", a combined exercise, in which the Hawks

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flawed 18 sorties and 49.0 hours in support. During the month of April the squadron flew a total of 378.3 hours and maintained an operational ready time of 66.1% and a full system availability of 24.1%. Also during the month of April the squadron had a second detachment of 6 officers and 23 enlisted TAD in Naha as a part of MAG-12's Alpha detachment. During the month of April the squadron transferred 4 full system aircraft to other units and received 6 different aircraft, thus increasing the squadron's Table of Equipment to 12 while the Table of Organization remained that of a 10 plane squadron. This continued to strain the operations and maintenance efforts.

The final portion of the reporting period was characterized by high expectations as the squadron was on 12 hour alert for 5½ weeks pending immediate deployment to South East Asia. During this period the squadron operated out of embarkation boxes and from pallets as all was in readiness for immediate deployment. Even operating under this handicap, the squadron managed to fly 397.0 hours during the month of May, a figure just 3.6 hours short of the record breaking month of February. The month of May also brought the only blemish upon the squadron's record. During May, just as the word came down to prepare for deployment, the squadron was undergoing it's NTFI inspection upon which a grade of unsatisfactory was received. The inspection debrief stated that failure was due to recent turnover in many critical billets, but that the morale and drive of 533 was outstanding. Also during the month of May, 533 went C-2 for personnel due to a shortage of aircrews. The month of June closed out the reporting period with many significant events occurring. The squadron received a new Commanding Officer as LtCol. J. C. BROWN assumed command during change of command ceremonies held on 9 June 72 in Iwakuni. Shortly after this ceremony, the squadron, after 5½ weeks in limbo, was committed to the South East Asia area for combat duty. The move to the new base, Nam Phong, Thailand, commenced on 20 June with the Commanding Officer leading the forward element, 4 A-6A's to Nam Phong, followed by the other 8 aircraft the next day. The squadron flew it's first combat sorties on Saturday, 24 June 72 and has been averaging 10 sorties a day ever since. During the month of June the squadron flew 373.6 hours 116.5 of which were in combat.

- 15 Feb While participations NOREX the squadron launched 9 of its ten aircraft. The Commanding Officer led a 9 plane formation on its return to Naha.
- 10 Mar The squadron sent a detachment of 4 officers and 26 enlisted men to VMA(AW)-224 aboard USS Coral Sea.
- 25 Mar The squadron received a well done from CG, 1st MAW for superior appearance at CG's personnel inspection (Encl 4).
- 31 Mar The squadron received a well done from COMFAIRWESTPAC for assistance given to transpac crews in Msg 310453Z Mar 72 (Encl 5).
- 17 Apr 3 A-6A aircrews and maintenance personnel left for Naha, Okinawa to be part of MAG-12's Alpha detachment.
- 13 May The squadron underwent NIPI upon which a grade of unsatisfactory was received.
- 13 May The squadron was placed on 12 hour alert for deployment to South East Asia.
- 9 Jun LtCol. J. C. BROWN relieved Maj. D. E. CATHCART as Commanding Officer.
- 15 Jun The squadron's Naha detachment returned.
- 15 Jun General CUSHMAN, CMC, toured the squadron area during a visit to Iwakuni, Japan.
- 17 Jun The squadron's detachment aboard USS Coral Sea returned.
- 20 Jun The squadron was committed to South East Asia for combat duty.
- 22 Jun The squadron completed its move to Nam Phong, Thailand.
- 24 Jun The squadron flew its first combat sorties.
