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USIA IPS/NEWS ROUNDUP (FEF-106)

SAIGON--Government communique indicates government plans to hold only Buddhists "who have actually plotted against the security of the state 'during war against Communists, according to report approved by Vietnamese censors.

BANGKOK--Prime Minister Sarit Thanarat says Thailand is willing to host conference of Buddhist countries to discuss fate of South Vietnamese Buddhists.

NEW DELHI--Prime Minister Nehru wins 346-61 parliamentary vote of support, defeating no-confidence motion advanced by non-Communist opposition.

JESSELTON, NORTH BORNEO--U.N. fact-finding team indefinitely postpones meetings with North Borneo leaders on Malaysia because of absence of Filipino and Indonesian observers; team reportedly feels report would be rejected if observers were not present.

SINGAPORE--Sarawak, Singapore, North Borneo government leaders say they will insist on formation of Malaysia by August 31 despite Indonesian objections.

PEIPING--Chinese Communist party newspaper accuses Khrushchev of championing India in border dispute and collaborating with "United States imperialism to ally with India against China."

WASHINGTON--With strike deadline less than a week away, Senate Commerce Committee considers legislation to settle railroad dispute.

CIVIL RIGHTS:

--In Chicago, Martin Luther King says unless persons responsible for recent bombings are brought to justice, there may be "terrible race riot" in Birmingham, Alabama; the bombing of Negro attorney's home brought on session of rock throwing in which several policemen were injured.

--Birmingham mayor Boutwell says he has received phone threats his home will be bombed.

--Fifteen Lexington, Kentucky, demonstrators protesting hiring practices are arrested after declining to leave department store at closing time.
