

In April of 1966, arrangements were completed for a ~~part~~^{end} of "Officers Exchange Program" whereby Latin American and US Officers stationed with the Inter American ~~Police~~^{Peace} Force in the Dominican Republic could spend their "Rest And Recreation" leave time in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Transportation ~~of~~ for this recreational activity was ~~in~~ furnished by the Brazilian Air Force to Rio while Brazilian Officers, who so desired, could ~~work~~ spend their leaves in Puerto Rico, transportation courtesy of the US Air Force.

While the program was active, four Latin American and/or US Officers could take one of two monthly flights to Rio to spend up to ten days taking in the sights and sounds of one of the world's better known recreational ~~and~~ resort cities. Over 40 Officers participated ~~in the short-lived exchange program.~~

The journey ~~itself~~ from Santo Domingo and back was a five day affair with overnight stops ~~in~~^{on the island of} Trinidad, and ~~in~~ⁱⁿ Belem, Brazil. (Refuelling stops, and therefore quick "aerial looks" were also provided of Puerto Rico, Surinam, and the new Brazilian Federal capitol, Brasilia.)

~~While in Rio~~ There was no specific itinerary planned for ~~these~~^{the visiting} Officers ~~visiting Rio, though~~^{however,} they were invited to meet top ~~staff~~ members of the Staff supporting the Brazilian contingent in the Dominican Republic as well as top Brazilian military officials.

Outside of these brief "Official Duties", the visitors time was their own. ~~Things to do in~~^{For the single Officer,} ranged from the ever-popular Copacabana Beach, girls, nightclubs, girls, dining, girls, dancing, girls, ~~drinking, girls,~~ shopping, girls, and, of course, sightseeing...girls.

The ~~visiting off core~~^{visitors could also} ~~were also invited to~~ participate in a side trip to Brazil's industrial city, Sao Paulo. ~~Here~~ Here, they went on guided tours through three different types of industrial concerns, including foods automotive, ~~industrial~~, and research. The plants visited also represented

three different kinds of financing, i.e., foreign investment, foreign patents using Brazilian money, and totally Brazilian capital.

The trip to Sao Paulo and back, an overnight affair, also provided the visiting Officers with some unique views of well-known Brazilian landmarks such as Sugarloaf Mountain and the Statue of Christ, both in Rio de Janeiro.
