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Echo Kills Six

Stubborn Viet Cong recently ran afoul of an equally obstinate unit of the Recon Platoon in action near the village of My Trang, situated four miles south of FSB Debbie along Highway 1. The afternoon confrontation left six guerillas dead.

Information gathered by S2 revealed the location of a pair of tunnels harboring armed VC/NVA. The reports were confirmed when the members of Recon, in a coordinated effort with Battalion S2, made a heli-borne assault into a rice paddy neighboring My Trang.

Immediately after insertion the men proceeded 100 meters to the bank of a winding stream where they

Hai Mon Rebuilds

Five thousand residents prospered in the sea-side fishing hamlet of Hai Mon. The brick houses and a plentiful supply of food marked the affluence of the village which was the source of the best sea food in Quang Ngai Province

That was in 1965.

"Then the VC attacked," recalled Mr Ca, the Village Chief. He added that the people migrated from the site of their ancestral homes to the larger, more secure towns of Duc Pho, Quang Ngai and even Saigon.

Encouraging developments in the area are now drawing families back to Hai Mon. The hamlet, located one mile east of FSB Bronco, is the scene of great activity. Wooden house frames are going up daily and

the villagers everywhere are seen busily applying mud and straw to the bamboo wall supports.

Assisted by MACV and elements of Charley Company, 4th Bn, 21st Inf, some one hundred families two months ago began the slow process of rebuilding the war-torn village.

"These people are coming to Hai Mon to build their homes," explained acting-Commander 1LT Robert H. Ericcsen, Fortuna, Ca. "They work by day and then return to the resettlement villages in the evening. Our job here is to work with RF 147 to maintain the security."

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HEAT WAVE SAFETY RULES

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The heat is one of the hard facts of life in Vietnam, and it can kill you if you aren't careful. Heat exhaustion, heat stroke, heat rash and sun burn can be avoided if you are careful. Heat stroke is the most dangerous of these injuries and may be fatal.

The two most important ways to prevent yourself from becoming a heat casualty are to be sure that you drink enough water and take extra salt. Approximately six to eight quarts of water per day per man should be available for troops engaged in tactical operation.

The most serious heat injury, heat stroke, is recognizable because the casualty will normally have red, dry, hot, non-sweating skin, may be unconscious or delirious, and in some cases, may have convulsions. Steps should be taken at once to lower the victim's body temperature.

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discovered a small "spider hole". "There were indications that it had been entered very recently," recalled 1LT Jerry Webster (Winston-Salem, N.C.). "Our interpreter made repeated attempts to urge the occupant to come out, but he received negative response so the decision was made to destroy the tunnel. PFC Manuel Rodriguez (Escalon, Ca) placed explosives within the hole and detonated it."

The explosion conveniently enlarged the opening through which SGT David M. Graff (San Pedro, Ca) could now enter. Added Webster, "He slipped all the way inside and returned, dragging with him an AK-47 and its owner."

An after-action search of the tunnel uncovered AK-47 ammunition, blasting caps and a pistol belt with three pineapple grenades and a ChiCom.

But a continuing search of the area was to uncover yet more Viet Cong.

The men cautiously approached an underground bunker located approximately 150 meters from the spider hole. S2 1SG Zachary, SGT Graff and Sp/4 Ronald "Beaver"

Boisse (Woonsocket, R.I.) moved to the entrance and came face to face with a Viet Cong wielding a grenade. "I knocked him all the way back inside with several bursts of fire from my M-16," said Zachary.

"Shortly after that Rodriguez pitched a frag in after him," recounted SGT Graff. "The walls and ceiling collapsed and a tunnel entrance within the bunker was exposed."

"The interpreter again asked the remaining tunnel inhabitants to surrender," explained Lieutenant Webster, "but they refused to admit their presence. We then placed Claymores around, on top of and inside the bunker."

After they were blown, Graff squirmed through an opening in the rubble. "I slipped in up to my waist--Beaver held onto me by my belt--and I saw five dead VC."

In addition to the six KIAs, the Recon team captured their second weapon--an SKS rifle protruding from the earth above the tunnel.

Hai Mon

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Tuông, the Duc Pho District Chief, the families have been convinced that this area is once again secure, and that they can return without fear to make their living.

Mr. Hai, commander of RF 147, optimistically stated that the village would be even better than the one they had in 1965. New roads, tin roofs, and culverts to alleviate drainage problems will soon be a reality in the hamlet. "The people are very happy now," noted Hai.
