## Recon Kills Two

For the second time in as many weeks, elements of the 4th Battalion 21st Infantry moved to drive persistent Viet Cong from their retreat in the elaborate tunnel and cave complexes on the eastern-most slopes of LZ Debbie. Two VC were killed in the action and one AK-47 was confiscated.

Members of the Recon platoon, accompanied by 20 ARVN soldiers, made a late - morning march to the base of Hill 164 to engage a reported reinforced squad of well-armed guerillas.

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## 4/21 Wrap-Up

31 July: The Recon Platoon killed two Viet Cong while on a search and clear operation near Pho Trung. One individual KIA was the Pho Trung VC village security chief. Grenades and an M-1 carbine were confiscated in the action.

3 August: Bravo's SRRP team engaged three individuals in the act of setting hand frag booby traps. Result: 1 VC KIA, 2 NVA KIA; M-16, binoculars and grenades CIA.

7 August: Bravo Company, 4th squad, 1st platoon discover 400 pounds of rice wrapped in plastic buried inside hootch.

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## Bravo Cleans Out Base Camp

An August 4 th search and clear mission conducted by elements of Bravo Company uncovered a platoon-size NVA base camp in the foothills three miles south - west of LZ Debbie. Medical supplies and an M-60 machine gun were confiscated during the operation in the heavily canopied sanctuary.

hastily abandoned," recalled PFC William J. Frisby. "Supplies were laying all over"

Added PFC Daniel S. McQueen, "We found medical equipment in ammo boxes near a hootch which had been used as an aid station. We also picked up an M-60 wrapped in a plastic poncho.

In addition, Bravo Company found 75 feet of "dot" cord 25 pounds of salt, 200 rounds of M-16 ammunition and several ChiCom grenades.

"We had advanced only 25 meters when Sp/4 Jack Rice (Kearns, Utah) spotted a pair of Viet Cong carrying AKs," explained Specialist 4 Kenneth D. Hurt, Lincoln, Nebraska. "They saw us and began moving out at great speed. Rice, though, got off a couple of rounds before they jumped behind large boulders."

Squad leader Robert M. Gilman, Kewpy, New Jersey, added, "We were pursuing in and around the heavy brush and rock formations when we noticed frantic movement in the brush on our left flank. We began to draw a considerable amount of AK fire from that area and we put the MAX on them"

The Recon team pounded the area with grenades, M-79 and small arms fire until

the movement and the firing ceased.

"We pushed through the thicket and found one of them we had wounded," stated Hurt. "He was laying on his back in the brush with a weapon at his side. We approached him to investigate and he rose suddenly. I shot him as he lifted his AK-47."

Recon then followed a recently broken trail and discovered blood trails and a pair of sandals.

"There the trail ended," commented Sergeant Gilman, "so we ended our search. An ARVN sweep the following day uncovered the freshly dug grave of the second VC."



## Getting Along (USARV) In Vietnam

If you work in a headquarters area, you will more than likely have frequent day - to-day contact with the same Vietnamese people. There are several good points to bear in mind in this sort of situation.

Don't look down your nose at Vietnamese working at menial jobs, and don't under-estimate their intelligence. Remember that some of these people have gone through extremely difficult times. Always try to be pleasant with these people and try to pick up some of their language. They will probably be flattered to see that you are interested in learning.

In a permanent area, you will probably have minor business dealings with the Vietnamese people. For instance, you may have a woman working in your hootch who takes care of

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## Why Does He Fight?

The enemy has a number of reasons for fighting. Some honestly believe the propaganda which they hear every day from the unit political officer. Some may have personal reasons. The NVA regular serves primarily because it is considered a social disgrace to refuse to bear arms. In North Vietnam draft dodging is cause for a severe loss of "face".

Morale is a constant problem for the enemy. He is often quite far from home, poorly equipped and supplied. To combat these morale problems, his superiors rely heavily on political indoctrination. The enemy soldier is constantly reminded of his mission, and the reasons for it. Unit

indoctrination sessions, conducted daily, include self - criticism, during which each man is told what his future actions must be. Then he must explain his reactions and publicly confess his shortcomings.

After every fight there is an almost immediate critique, with no holds barred. This gives every man a chance to let off steam, and at the same time lets superiors know what their men are thinking.

Discipline and courtesy are maintained in much the same manner as in other military organizations, with minor punishment for minor offenses. After every battle, too, there is always an awards ceremony which gives recognition to outstanding soldiers.

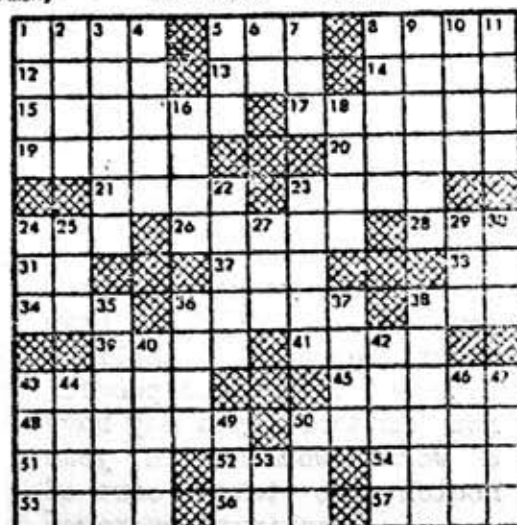

Even if in fun, never joke around and say something to the effect that you think your cleaning lady is a Viet Cong. This would hurt her very deeply, and she would resent you for it. Remember, it is not unheard of for a woman to be killed by the VC for doing nothing more than working on an American post as a laundry maid. These people are sometimes placed in serious danger because they work for Americans.



## Classics of Combat Cuisine

Soldiers of the U.S. Army are the best fed soldiers in the world. They are also some of the most ingenious and creative chefs around when it comes to making the most of combat rations.

Yankee ingenuity demonstrated in battlefield kitchens by Army troops can stagger the imagination. Not unexpectedly, a few "classics of combat cuisine" have resulted.

In recognition of the many contributions to soldier morale being made daily by the Army's most innovative soldier-chefs, some culinary classics are described below.

One favorite is called tanker's stew. Sometimes dubbed hobo's stew, ingredients for this tongue-tingling delicacy vary with what's available and taste preferences. Generally, this curiously-named mixture is nothing more than ham

and eggs and rice from "LURP" rations. Seasoned Experts in brewing tankers stew enthusiastically suggest adding tomato sauce and franks for increased dining enjoyment.

Another C-ration delight is easily prepared by blending melted cheddar cheese with beans and franks.

Heating blackberry jam and turkey loaf together adds variety to any foxhole menu.

Beef and potato juices mixed with water and salt and pepper boils to a now yet-unnamed soup.

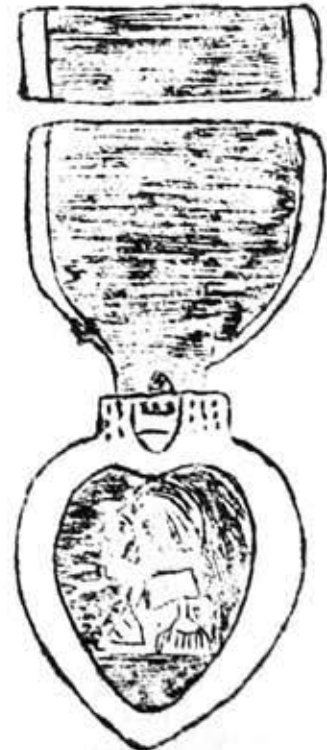
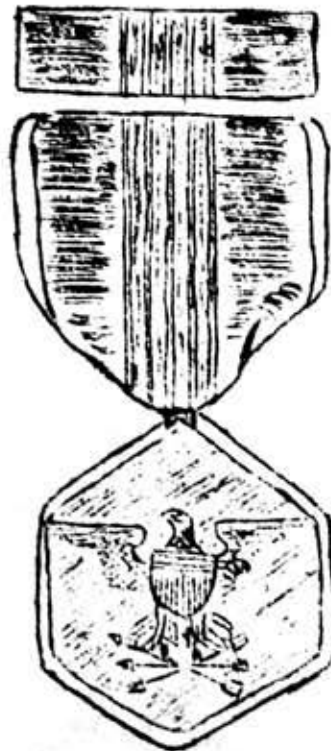

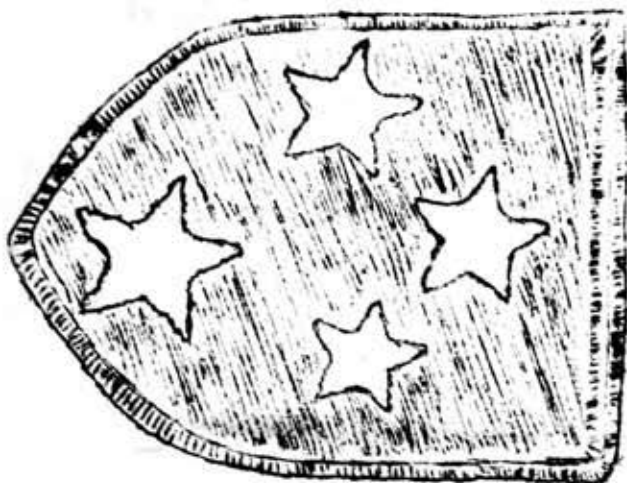
