SPECIAL ADVANCE ISSUE BRIGADE CHANGES COMMANDERS

LZ BAYONET—At 10 o'clock this morning COL Jere O. Whittington relinquished command of the 198th Inf. Bde. to COL Joseph G. Clemons in a change of command

ceremony here, as MG Lloyd B. Ramsey, Armerical Div. commander, passed the brigade colors from the old commander to the new.

MG Ramsey praised COL Whittington's efforts as commander of the 198th, and noted the brigade's achievements since May when Whittington assumed command.

Joining the division band for the ceremonies were the commanders and troops from the 1st Bn., 6th Inf.; 5th Bn., 46th Inf.; 1st Bn., 52nd Inf; H Troop, 17th Cav.; HHC, 198th; and 57th Inf. Plat. (Scout Dog) elements.

With his departure, COL Whittington was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star and the Air Medal with 3rd through 10th OICs.



NCOS HONOR 198TH C.O.

LZ BAYONET — Departing 198th Bde. Commander COL Jere O. Whittington was honored Monday night by NCOS of the brigade at the HHC Mess Hall here.

The men gathered for a buffet-style dinner to pay their respects to COL Whittington, who this week assumes new duties as the commander of Long Binh Post — home of Hq USARV — near Saigon.

Brigade CSM Buford W. Parnell, on behalf of the NCOS, presented the colonel with a memento of his tour of duty with the "Brave & Bold" — a four-by-six-foot white rug woven in the colors and design of the brigade patch. The rug had been specially made for the 198th in Hong Kong.

Parnell also voiced publicly the comments of the men present, complimenting HHC mess personnel on their evening's efforts.

Speaking informally, the

out-going commander expressed his thanks to the NCOS of the brigade and its attached units.

Displaying an understanding of the situation, he remarked that many times an NCOS's only reward for his work is his own knowledge that the job had been well done.

He pointed out the progress made by the 198th Bde., recalling that earlier this year the 1st Bn., 52nd Inf. had difficulty moving in their AO because of enemy forces; the 5th Bn., 46th Inf. found it advisable not to move in the Batangan Peninsula area in anything less than a company-sized element; and the 1st Bn., 6th Inf. had been hard put to cover a zone less than half the size of their present area.

Whittington said those and other advances made by the brigade would not have been possible without the help of the NCOS.

COOKS PREPARE TO TALK TURKEY

LZ BAYONET -- Mess halls in the 198th Bde. are gearing up for their big effort one week from today. COMMANDERS-CAPSULE CAREERS

Colonel Jere O. Whittington begins a new phase in his 23-year Army career as he leaves the 198th Inf. Bde. to take over command of USARV's Long Binh Post.

Since graduating from West Point as an infantry lieutenant, he has had a variety of assignments which have taken him to every corner of the globe. Col. Whittington's overseas tours include Japan, Spain, Germany, Ethiopia and two tours in Vietnam.

Between service in foreign countries, Col. Whittington has spent time as a commander and as a student in the United States, including his return to the U.S. Military Academy as a foreign language instructor. He has also attended the Army Language School, the Command and General Staff College, the Army Special Warfare School, and the Army War College. Before beginning this tour in the Republic of Vietnam, the colonel commanded a battalion of the 24th Inf. Div. at Ft. Riley, Kans. and then served on the staff of the Joint Chiefs of Staff in the Pentagon.

His flair for languages sent him on some unusual assignments, such as to the Universities of Madrid and Mexico to study Spanish. His European tours included command of an infantry company and serving as side-de-camp to MG Halley G. Maddox. In Africa, Col. Whittington was a military attache to Ethiopia. During his first tour in Vietnam, he was a MACV sector advisor at Tuy Hoa in 1964-65.

Although he is a native of Kilgore, Tex., Col. Whittington now makes his home with his wife and four children in McLean, Va. His awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Bronze Star,

Colonel Joseph G. Clemons is no stranger to the Americal Division or to the operations of the 198th Inf. Bde. From July to September he held the reins of the Division Support Command and since Sept. 23, he has been the Chief of staff.

Col. Clemons enlisted in the Army in February 1946, and served with the 5th Photo Reconnaissance Squadron in the Pacific until June 1947 when he received an appointment to the United States Military Academy.

He graduated from West Point in June 1951 and, like Col. Whittington, was commissioned an infantry lieutenant. He served as a platoon leader with the 31st Inf. Regt. in Korea in 1952 and received the Distinguished Service Cross and the Silver Star during that conflict.

Upon his return to the United States in 1953, the colonel was assigned as an instructor at Ft. Bragg, S.C. and later at the Airborne School at Ft. Benning, Ga. A tour in Europe saw him as the commanding officer of the 2nd Bn., 54th Inf. of the 4th Armored Div.

After he returned to the U.S., he was assigned to the Office of the Assistant Vice Chief of Staff in Washington, where he was promoted to colonel.

Besides the Military Academy, Col. Clemons has also graduated from the Infantry School, the Army War College, the Air Command Staff College, the Armed Forces Service College and other schools.

The colonel's wife and three children reside in Kailua, Hawaii.

WASHINGTON--The Army's Adjutant General wants all mail addressed to Army personnel to carry Social Security numbers (SSANs) in place of Service numbers (ASNs).

The Army moved to the nine-digit Social Security numbers on July 1.

Since then, MG Kenneth G. Wickham said, the longer set of numbers has become the key for establishing positive identification of the addressee.

He asked for "whole-hearted cooperation" from the public. (AFPS)

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Dethorn moves to brigade headquarters to become an assistant operations officer.


Natzet comes to the brigade from the Americal Divs.'s 1st Sqdn., 1st Cav., where he commanded Hq & Hq Troop.


