### 6/11 Btry Takes R&R

The afternoon silence is broken by the sound of radio communications between the Fire Direction Center and the Battery Executive Post.

SSG Paul Blackburn alerts the battery that a fire mission is on its way. Combat veteran cannoneers pour from their culverts and man the immaculately clean 105mm Howitzers.

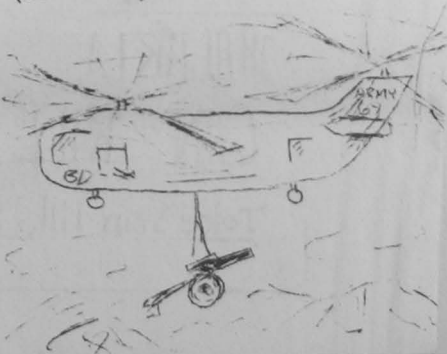
SSG Blackburn, Chief of Smoke, confirms and relays firing data to the gun crews. The Battery Commander, CPT Harold Lance, arrives at the Executive Post and finds the guns "safe and ready."

With the microphone in hand CPT Lance gives the command... "Battery--FIRE!" In perfect harmony, the 105's send their regards to "Mr. Chuck."

Moments later, the Artillery Forward Observer contacts FDC and sincerely says, "BEAUTIFUL! Right on target."

Since its inception in mid-68, D Btry has compiled an impressive combat record as 6/11 "jump" battery. The "Delta-Dancers" (a name given because they hang from choppers so often) have more than 15 combat jumps to their credit.

## D Btry R&R (cont)

When D Btry arrived at their present location, the men thought that a big mistake had been made. Instead of having to dig-in and fight for their lives (as they normally do on a jump) they were greeted by a company of Engineers.

The Engineers were already well-established and for the first time since October of 1968, the men of D Btry eat three hot meals a day and do not have to ration water.

SP5 Bob Winfield summed up the attitude of most of the men in D Btry. "Being here is just like an extended R&R. We love it," he added.

Winfield has a right to boast. He is the last of the original members of D Btry and has participated in all of their jumps.

One factor remains constant for D Btry, and follows them regardless of where they go; They get the job done ON TIME, SIR!
