COMMAND CHANGE THURSDAY

Command of the 1st Bn., 82d Artillery will change hands Thursday when LTC James McVey Compton becomes the third leader of the unit in Vietnam.

He will be replacing LTC John J. Luxemburger Jr., who has headed the battalion since last November.

Col. Compton moves to the battalion from Americal Division Artillery where he served as executive officer.

Col. Luxemburger will be reassigned to Division Artillery where he will become the assistant fire support coordinator.

He will be replacing LTC Paul D. Cothorn, the first commander of the 1/82d after the battalion was reactivated in January, 1968. Col. Cothorn will return to a stateside assignment next month.

Col. Luxemburger, a 22-year Army veteran, began his military career in 1943 as an enlisted man. He rose to the rank of sergeant.

He left the service in 1946 and returned to LaSalle College in his native Philadelphia where he received his bachelor's degree in accounting.

Col. Luxemburger reentered the service in 1950 and became an officer the following year.

A FAREWELL MESSAGE

(EDITOR'S NOTE: On Thursday, LTC John J. Luxemburger Jr. will turn over command of the 1st Bn., 82d Artillery to LTC James M. Compton. The following is Col. Luxemburger's farewell column to the men of the 1/82d.)

As they say, all good things must come to an end and for me, the finest assignment of my life, that as commander of the 1st Bn., 82d Artillery (Construction) Battalion, will end on July 3, 1969.

As I will not be able to talk to each of you personally, I'll take this opportunity to thank each of you personally for the willing cooperation and fine support I have received, without which the battalion would not have been able to accomplish its mission and bring so many things into being.

When I came to this battalion, I said that my aim was to put "iron on the target" and up-grade living conditions. Together we have done all of this and more.

As the battalion nears its first full year in Vietnam and many of you are preparing to leave Vietnam and go home, you can be proud to say you have served with the 1/82d-- a unit that "put iron on the target," manned its howitzers while under fire, did an outstanding job of fighting as infantry, had one of the best maintenance records in Vietnam and still managed to live as human beings.

You have all lived up to the motto of the battalion, "Can and Will". Whatever the task has been, you have not only undertaken it, but you have excelled while accomplishing it.

In short, I'm proud to have been a member of and to have had the good fortune of commanding such a fine artillery battalion.

I will be replaced by LTC James McVey Compton, an outstanding officer and a fine artilleryman. In the

difficult days ahead, I'm sure you will continue to give him the fine support I have always received and you will continue to enhance the fine reputation that this battalion now enjoys.

In my remaining four months in Vietnam, I will be the Assistant Fire Support Coordinator of the Americal Division Artillery. While in this position, I expect to hear that you were outstanding in the USARV AGI (July 11) and that in spite of the massive July turnover of personnel, you will continue to be the finest of field artillery battalions.

Just live up to the battalion motto of "Can and Will". Approach all tasks with how can we do them and never with why we cannot accomplish them.

Goodbye, good luck and good shooting. It's been a ball.

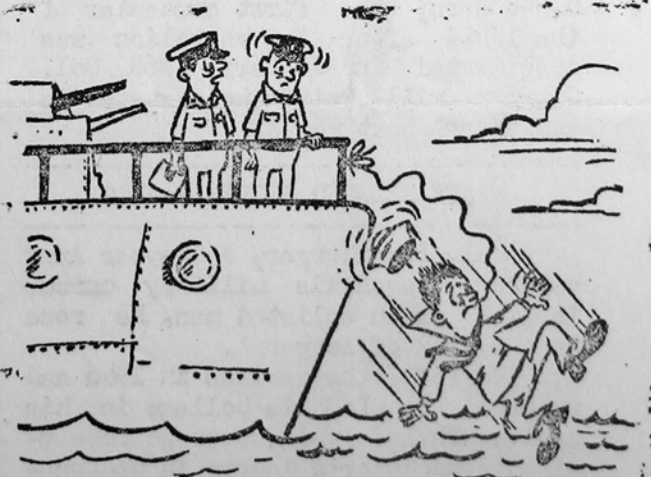
