

LTC COMPTON TAKES COMMAND

LTC James McVey Compton became the new commander of the 1st Bn., 82d Artillery last Thursday.

Col. Compton replaces LTC John J. Luxemburger Jr., who is moving to a new assignment with Americal Division Artillery.

The new commander is a 17-year Army veteran who received an ROTC commission after attending Washington University in St. Louis.

A bachelor, Col. Compton was last assigned to Division Artillery where he served as its executive officer.

He came to Vietnam last November from the 4th Army Division in Germany where he served as commander of the 2nd Bn., 16th Artillery.

In addition to his duties in Germany and in Vietnam, Col. Compton also spent three years in Okinawa and one in Korea.

His stateside assignments include a total of five years at Ft. Bliss, Tex. and Ft. Sill, Okla. plus another 2½ years at the Pentagon.

Col. Luxemburger has become assistant fire support coordinator at Division Artillery, re-

placing LTC Paul D. Cothorn, the first commander of the 1/82d when it was reactivated in January, 1968.

Col. Luxemburger replaced Col. Cothorn as battalion commander last November, four months after the unit arrived in Vietnam.


During his tenure, the battalion made extensive improvements in its physical plant, in-

cluding a swimming pool, an enlisted men's club and a battalion medical facility.

The battalion also registered ~~#~~ ^{the} ~~landmark~~ its 100,000th round fired in Vietnam, midway through Col. Luxemburger's term of command.

Prior to joining the 1/82d, he had been assigned to the Pentagon. His 22 year military career spans three wars and numerous foreign tours.

ADVANCE PARTY PREPARES FOR RETURN TO STATES

The homeward trip for the first 10 members of the 1st Bn., 82d Artillery to arrive here last year will begin this week.

That's when the members of the battalion's advanced party will depart Chu Lai to return to the states—either for a leave and reassignment or for discharge.

Their departure will mark the beginning of the large exodus of more than 500 battalion men who came to Vietnam last July as the 1/82d moved from Ft. Lewis, Wash. to the Americal Division.

Approximately 120 of them are still with the unit while the others were infused to numerous outfits throughout Vietnam during the year.

Among those to be departing within the next three weeks are a number of key officers and NCOs who spent their entire tours with the unit.

Topping the list of officers is the battalion's executive officer, MAJ. Charles W. Higgins, who has held that position since the unit was reactivated early last year.

Also among those leaving is CSM Thomas M. Van Horn Jr., the 1/82d's senior NCO for more than a year.

Also among those returning home this month is LTC Paul D. Cothorn,

the former battalion commander, who is now with Americal Division Artillery.


Col. Cothorn headed the 36-man advance party to Vietnam last year.
