LTC GARCIA RECEIVES BSM

LZ HURRICANE--Lieutenant Colonel Eliseo J. Garcia, the commanding officer of this battalion, was recently awarded The Bronze Star Medal for meritorious achievement.

The award was presented by Colonel Donald M. Dexter, Jr., the commanding officer of Americal Division Artillery, during a ceremony at HHS Battery.

While serving in the capacity of Senior Advisor to the 6th Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division, Army of the

Republic of Vietnam (ARVN), LTC Garcia distinguished himself by his accomplishments in regard to operations against a hostile force in Vietnam during the period from October 16 to 25, 1969.

During this period he "planned, coordinated and executed" the Eagle Flight operations within the 12th Division Tactical Area. The effectiveness of these small unit, air mobile operations is largely due to Lt. Col. Garcia.

CARNAHAN CITED FOR HEROISM

LZ SNOOPY--Specialist 4 Russell A. Carnahan, Battery C, 1/82d, was recently awarded The Soldier's Medal for heroism not involving actual conflict with an armed enemy in Vietnam.

While riding down Highway #1 during monsoon season, Carnahan's vehicle was washed off the road by surging water as the driver attempted to turn the vehicle around.

As one of the soldiers attempted to climb out of the submerged vehicle his foot slipped and he was pulled

under water by the current of the raging drainage ditch.

When Carnahan saw what was happening he jumped into the water and swam to the aid of the drowning man. For approximately five minutes Carnahan managed to keep his comrade's head above water. Upon the arrival of assistance, both men were pulled to safety.

Specialist Carnahan's actions were directly responsible for saving the life of a fellow soldier.

NEW INCOME TAX LAWS

The income tax law signed recently by President Nixon will not help in filling out 1969 tax returns. It will have significant effect in 1970 and following years.

The major tax changes include higher standard deductions and special relief for single persons.

The personal exemption will go up to \$650 on July 1, 1970, which means wage earners may see a slight increase in their take home pay in the following months.

In 1971, each exemption is to be worth a \$650 deduction. After that, exemptions go to \$700 in 1972, then to \$750 in 1973.

For single persons there will be a new rate schedule starting in 1971 that will hold their tax to no more than 120 per cent of the amount owed by married couples with the same income. The taxes now paid by a single person can run as much as 141 per cent of a married couple's taxes.

ARMY CAPITALIZES ON AIR FORCE TEST

Using an idea tested by the Air Force, Army engineers have discovered a way to prevent premature detonation of artillery shells.

Engineers at Frankford Arsenal in Philadelphia developed a capping device made of polyurethane to cushion the nose tip of artillery shells. So severe is the rainfall during the tropical storms here in Vietnam, and so sensitive is the fuze tip, that detonation frequently occurred during projectile flight.

The polyurethane "rain cap" acts as a shock absorber to cushion the impact of raindrops on the nose tip. Tests conducted have shown that the rain cap does not impede normal functioning of the detonating element.

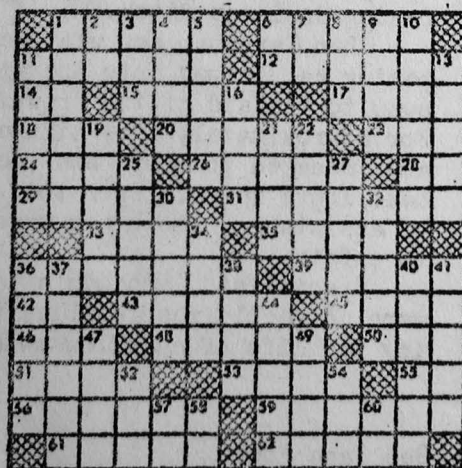

NO TOUR CHANGE FOR MEN IN RVN

WASHINGTON (AFPS) -- The twelve-month tour established in 1965 for troops serving in the Republic of Vietnam has been "frequently reviewed," according to Defense officials.

So far, the officials report, circumstances have precluded any reductions in the tour length.

Among reasons given are:

- The effect of tour length on the operations readiness of the overseas forces.

- The ability of the services to support short term rotation within authorized numerical strength and skill resources.

- The movements generated by increased movement of personnel to and from overseas areas.

Officials also cited the "turbulence" that would be created in activities located in the United States which must continually supply personnel for overseas shipment and absorb returning personnel.
