


VIE TNAM THE LAND AND THE PEOPLE

Service men witness two New Year observances during a normal tour in Vietnam - 1 January, our holiday, and Vietnam's "TET" or New Year which in 1967 fell on 9 February and began the Year of the Goat.

Tet is the most important of Vietnamese holidays and, just as Americans expect visitors to the United States to respect their national and religious holidays, so the Vietnamese expect proper consideration for Tet.

Your actions as an American Serviceman during Tet symbolize for the Vietnamese your behavior for the year that follows.

The three-day event signifies the new lunar year and the beginning of spring. Like that of our Easter, the date for Tet is based on the lunar calendar. It usually occurs in late January or early February.

For the Vietnamese it is a time of solemnity, gaiety and hope. It is a time to pay homage to ancestors, visit family and friends, observe traditional taboos, and of course to celebrate.

Tet also is the time to correct faults, forget past mistakes, pardon others for their offenses, and pay debts. To owe money during Tet is considered bad luck.

This is the time when the Vietnamese people look back on the past, enjoy the present and look forward to the future. It is truly a comprehensive holiday, and all Vietnamese give it full observation.

To appreciate the customs of Tet an understanding of some ancient spirit-world legends is necessary because Tet is a mixture of religion and mythology and local variations are found from village to village throughout Vietnam. Tet, like all other Vietnamese religious holidays, is family oriented.

Legend tells us that in the closing days of the old year the good spirits report to the Heavenly Jade Emperor on events of

the past year. One good spirit, Ong Tao, the Spirit of the Hearth, reports on what he had observed in the home.

During this pre-Tet period, then, good spirits are absent, leaving men without defense against evil spirits. On the last day of the old year, these are released from hell for seven days. The need to ward off or protect against these evil spirits explains many of the customs of Tet.

Some of the customs are the bamboo pole or "Cay Neu", the circle of life, the peach tree, the narcissus, the Bong Mai (apricot flower), and the unicorn dance. Some of these are used to ward off evil spirits while others bring good luck and prosperity for the new year.

Tet is a fine time to make real friends among the Vietnamese people.

Small gifts to the children are the accepted thing. Visiting Vietnamese families is an important event. One should greet the honored ancestors by bowing slightly to the family altar before greeting the family. If gifts are offered, accept them. It would be unpardonably rude to refuse.

Appreciation of Tet depends on understanding customs, traditions and the ceremonies. Respect for the beliefs of others is fundamental to all democratic peoples. We can illustrate this by showing the proper spirit.

It is well to remember that Tet is a good time to show Vietnamese friends that we indeed are friends. This war will never be won by bullets alone. Using an often overworked phrase "the hearts and minds of the people", we feel that this will play the most important role in the final outcome. Remember this the next time you throw away excess food and you have the poor around your field position. Also if you have some excess soap, etc, from a sundry pack, give some of it to the people. Help some hamlet near your location.

If you are worried about aiding the Viet Cong, Forget It! In the long run, you do more to influence these people by the simple fact that you are there as a friend and not as a conqueror. Treat these people as friends and try to think what you would do if you had been oppressed for as long as you could remember.

Stop, whatever else you do, treating these people like they were dirt. They are human beings who have been pushed around by every nation that has swept through this land. Let's not be classified in the same group.

The sooner you help these people, the sooner the fighting will be over. You can by your bad actions cause this war to go on in your area for longer than would be necessary.

The conduct of US personnel, military and civilian, can often hinder civic action efforts. Riding down the roads in vehicles and "grabbing" or yelling at the Vietnamese does not help. Reckless driving or lack of consideration for pedestrians is not only hazardous, but also reflects poorly on the US. Needless to say, courtesy pays off!! Remember this when you are dealing with our Vietnam allies.


CROSSWORD PUZZLE



VEHICLE SECURITY MEASURES
