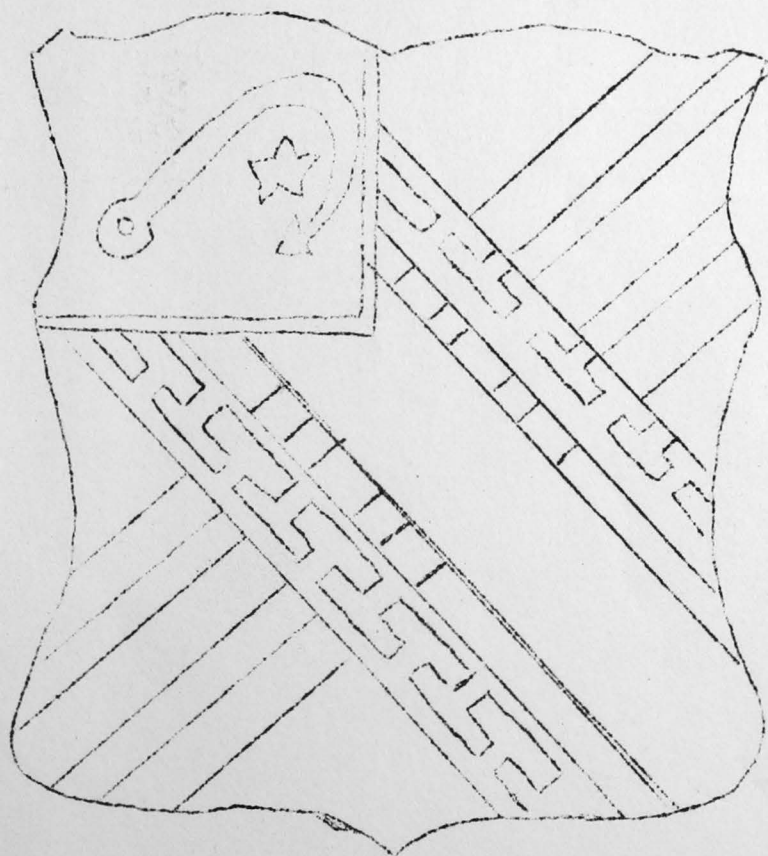

Late receipt of FST extension greatly effects port calls, outprocessing publication of orders and transportation requirements. Officers should be encouraged to submit FST extension requests prior to 120 days or DEROS. Those requests arriving at AG Personnel Actions Branch before the 120 day period may be approved at this headquarters. All other requests must be forwarded to USARV and sent on to DA for approval, causing considerable delay that could have been avoided.

#### UNAUTHORIZED HOUSEHOLD GOODS SHIPMENTS:

Recently there have been several instances where individuals purchased household goods at R&R or leave locations in anticipation of shipping these items from where purchased to CONUS, upon PCS, at government expense. Joint Travel Regulations provide for the shipment of personal effects/household goods from the last permanent duty station to new duty station or designated location only. Therefore, in the above cases, these individuals were required to pay shipment costs.

-P-R-O-F-I-L-E-

Staff Sergeant Byron J. Freemantle, Jr., the new Battalion Career Counselor, arrived in the battalion area at the beginning of April from Charlie Battery, where he occupied the duty position of gun section chief. ## CAREER COUNSELOR'S CORNER

There is a "pot of gold" awaiting those of you who reenlist for the first time and hold one of the nearly 300 military occupational specialties designated as critical by the Army.

The pot of gold is in the form of the Variable Reenlistment Bonus (VRB). It can add as much as \$8,000 (for RVN add tax free) to your regular reenlistment bonus. Unless you are a professional athlete, it is mighty difficult to get such a bonus in the civilian world.

The VRB is only available to men and women reenlisting for the first time. You must also meet the following requirements .....You must serve at least 21 months of active service in your current enlistment before reenlisting.

.....Be in the grade of E-3 or higher (in certain MOS, E-4 or higher).

.....Reenlist for at least 48 additional months of service.

.....Reenlist within three months of the expiration date of your term of service.

.....Be qualified in one of the military occupational specialties designated as a critical skill by the Department of the Army.

These skills are listed in Army Regulation 600-200.

If you meet all of the above requirements you can collect a VRB in addition to your regular reenlistment bonus.

How is the VRB figured? The nearly 300 critical MOS are divided into four categories: Multiplier of 4, 3, 2, and 1. Those in "Multiplier of 4" category are the skills in which there is a most critical need for men and women; those in "Multiplier of 1" category are skills in which there is still a critical need for men and women but not as critical as "Multiplier of 4" skills.

The multiplier category in which you fit is the prime factor in figuring your VRB. First, your regular reenlistment bonus is calculated. Then, it is multiplied by your VRB multiplier. Thus, if you are in the "Multiplier of 2" bracket, your bonus would be multiplied by two and the sum would be the VRB bonus. You would add the VRB bonus to the regular reenlistment bonus to get your total bonus.

Let's take some specific examples:

.....If you are an E-6 with four years of service and you are reenlisting for six years, your regular bonus would be \$2,000. Suppose you are also a field radio repairman. You would be in the "Multiplier of 4" bracket. We would multiply your \$2,000 bonus by four and get a VRB of \$8,000. Then we would add your reenlistment bonus to that total and come up with a total bonus of \$10,000.

.....Suppose you are an E-4 with three years of service and a combat engineer. You sign up for an additional six years and receive a reenlistment bonus of \$1,510. You are also in the "Multiplier of 3" bracket and so your reenlistment bonus is multiplied by three to give you a VRB of \$4,530. When you add your reenlistment bonus to your VRB, you would come up with a total bonus of \$6,040.

The sum of money that you first time reenlistees receive through the VRB program can mean a lot to you in the future. You can buy a car, start a stock portfolio, have enough money to get married and raise a family, or just salt it away in the bank. For tax purposes, the bonus is spread over several years so that you do not have to pay high income taxes (and remember in RVN the money is tax-free).

We have plenty of information on the VRB and the regular reenlistment bonus, including a U.S. Army pay rule that enables you to figure within seconds your reenlistment bonus and VRB. Stop by and see us. We are in the building just behind the mail room. Think about it!

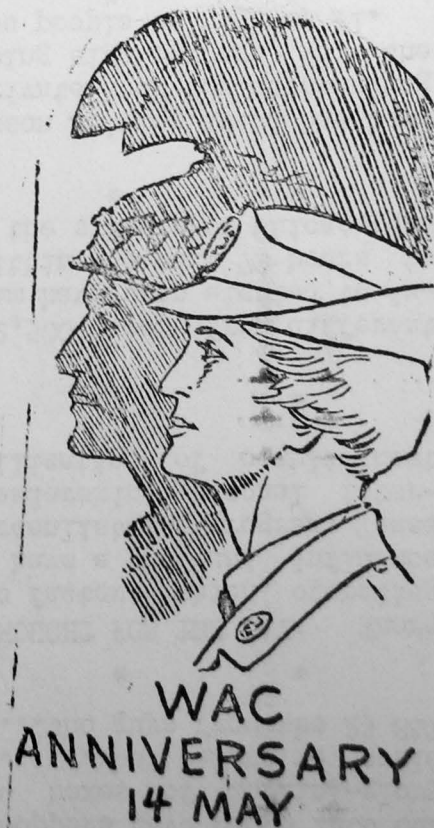
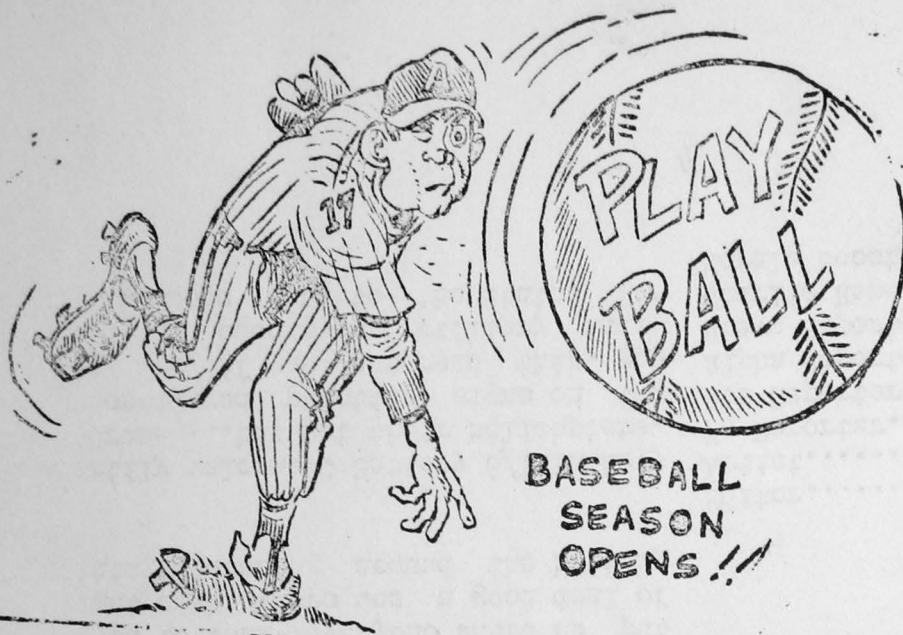
