TIPS FOR THE JUNIOR NCO

This space will be utilized by me to communicate with the enlisted members of the 3d Bn 1st Inf. The topics that I choose each week will, I hope, come from talks I may have with you in the field, at LZ Bronco, and from advice from the officers of this battalion.

I will spend a lot of time dealing with the problems of the Fire Team Leader and those of the Squad Leader. You are the ones who have to do the job and any guidelines that I and the Senior NCO's can give you may enable you to avoid some of the mistakes that we made when we were in a position similar to the ones you now hold.

In the last few years there has been many suggested ways of improving the prestige of the NCOs. Some of the methods suggested have been distinctive uniforms, revamping the grade structure and much more. To me, it seems that some people have not taken a close look at the NCO that enjoys prestige in his unit. An NCO can not be given prestige; he must earn it by winning the respect and confidence of his men. This is leadership in its simplest form. With this in mind, I will try to help the junior NCO's of this Battalion to gain that prestige by giving them guidelines to help them deal with the various situations that they may meet.
