## COMPANY NEWS

### HHC "BASKETT'S BANDITS"

Tragedy struck a heavy blow for Headquarters and Headquarters Company when "Charlie" and his counterparts from the North struck a devastating blow.

On the night of 18 January, on or about 2330 hours, LZ Cork came under a mortar attack. Defensive positions were alerted but it came too late. Immediately preceding the mortar attack, an estimated NVA force of about 20 to 30 men were able to break into the perimeter from the north and, armed with satchel charges and grenades, damaged the TOC, perimeter defenses, and leveled the Battalion Commander's bunker along with a CP. They went on through screaming and carrying on until they broke and exited through the south side of the perimeter.

Communications were lacking and the Battalion S-1 staff waited, prepared and tense for the first reports to arrive. At first, it was reported that the TOC was still on fire at about 0145 hours on 19 January but this proved to be false. To sum the damage up, MAJ OGLESBY described it sufficiently by saying "It looked like a little hurricane went through the place."

Tragedy struck again the following night when "Charlie" tried to knock out the communications CP on LZ Cork. Initial reports indicated that LZ Cork was under a rocket attack but again, this resulted in another falsification. It turned out that the Communications CONEX was severely damaged from a direct hit by either a recoilless rifle or a 122mm rocket.

Steps are now being taken to in-

tensify the defensive positions there so that the next time "Charlie-gook" decides to mess around, he's gonna get greased, good.

Meanwhile, back on LZ Bronco, the men of HHC and the Headquarters sections of all the companies are making preparations for intensifying the defenses of LZ Bronco. On January 21, a practice Red Alert was staged under a simulated attack and insertion by enemy forces. All went off rather well, with the "Always First" reaction force being deployed in an efficient and speedy manner.

This week, we welcome back SGT FRANCIS W. DUBAY, SGT PAUL J. BRIHN, SGT THOMAS L. DRIER, and SP4 ROBERT F. SHEAKER back to unit after their well deserved rest. SGT DUBAY and SGT BRIHN had been home for their rest while SGT DRIER and SP4 SHEAKER spent their time off in Sydney and Hong Kong, respectively.

Also, this week, added to the strength of Headquarters and Headquarters Company are PFC DONALD K. CUDD, PFC GEORGE P RUSSO, SSG WILLIAM B. AUSTIN, PFC LEON SANDERS, and PFC HAROLD SMITH. A hardy welcome is extended to these men and we hope they have a pleasant stay here.

If you can say that you were responsible for saving one man's life by making him prepare a good defensive position, it is worth more than all the gripes and complaints you may receive from your men during your entire tour here. Also it can be said that you are a qualified leader.

In being a leader, you will have to work harder than any man in your squad. When you have beat the bush all day are are tired, you still have the job of taking care of your men. They have needs to be taken care of. You must check to see if they need medical attention for their feet and that they take their malaria pills. Their malaria pill is especially important since malaria is a reoccurring disease and can cause them trouble when they get back to the states. They may complain now but they are sure to be grateful when it comes time for their DEROS.

You must also check their equipment to see that it is functioning properly, especially their weapon for this is their safeguard against the enemy.

I could go on and on about various things that you can do to

take care of your men. Most of them are things that they don't exactly like and you may earn the name of "Hard-Core" or some other unpleasantry when your back is turned. But always remember that a man who makes his men do their duty is doing it for them and any lacking on your part makes you just one of the boys, and not an NCO.
